De Kruif implies as Bangladesh host Tajikistan at BNS today

When Bangladesh take on Tajikistan in their home-leg fixture

of the Asian Cup Qualifiers at the Bangabandhu National Stadium today, it will be more like damage control instead of any thought of overturning that massive 5-0 deficit against the vastly superior Central Asian nation.

And ahead of the game, Bangladesh's Dutch coach Lodewijk de Kruif made no secret about that when he described his charges as 'primary school graduates playing at the university level'.

Smarting from the 0-5 drubbing in Dushanbe, Bangladesh however can only take inspiration from their last home fixture when they drew 1-1 against the same side in the World Cup qualifier last year.

The match, to be broadcast live by staterun BTV, will get underway at 4:30pm.

The 46-year-old Kruif however has promised that his charges would at least try to display a better performance than their last match at Dushanbe.

"Tomorrow [Tuesday] is our home game and I hope lots of spectators come to support us. Our target is to bring a better performance than the away match.

"I'm convinced that when my players get

onto the pitch, they give their 100%. The one thing you have to realise though is that, my players seem to be finishing primary school and directly jumping to university. Nothing in between there," said de Kruif at a pre-match briefing at the BFF House yester-

Before leaving for Tajikistan, de Kruif's target was to secure a point from Tajikistan and then notch up a victory at home to advance to the Asian Cup Qualifiers. However, having realised the difference between the two sides, the Dutchman can no longer dare to even say that they wish to play for a draw.

"It was a disappointing result and it became clear from that that we need time to build a good side. In the home game, if there is a possibility, we have to go for a better result, but if it is a draw, we're still happy. If we lose giving everything, I'll still be satisfied as the opposition are much better [than us]," concluded de Kruif.

Captain Mamunul Islam was also as pessimistic about producing a good result, even going as far as blaming himself and his colleagues for not carrying out the instructions from the coach properly.

"There was no shortage of information from the coaching staff about the opponents but we failed to implement it on the pitch. For the last four years, we have been

suffering from set-pieces. We are failures.

"We have been shown what mistakes we did in Dushanbe and so we will try not to repeat those and put our best tomorrow [Tuesday]," said Mamunul.

De Kruif's counterpart Khakim Fuzaylov was a bit worried though over the weather conditions, but he has high hopes of

posting another win against the home side. "We are having difficulties here with high humidity, nutrition and the hotel as well

because of the cultural differences. Even though we are motivated, the first result must be forgotten in order to prepare for tomorrow's match as this is a playoff and anything can happen."

On Sunday, BCB president Nazmul Hassan Papon said that they had contacted Aaqib and also added that they have made an alternative list of coaches.

With the Tigers off from international assignments after one-and-a-half years of hectic schedule, it gives the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) plenty of time to reflect and prepare itself to build on an unprecedented success in a magnificent 2015, which

allowed Bangladesh to emerge from the shadow of 'pushovers' to a 'real threat' to the established force, especially in the shorter versions of the game.

But is the BCB, which has every reason to wade in that success, heading towards the right direction to prepare itself for bigger battles at a time when the International Cricket Council is once again seriously contemplating a two-tier system, allowing the high and mighty more exposure and relegating the lower half to beg for the leftovers?

The BCB has agreed in principle to renew the contract of Bangladesh coach Chandika Hatuhrusingha, which can be a reward for the Sri Lankan for masterminding Tigers recent success story. It is a good decision but not an unexpected one. But then the departure of bowling coach Heath Streak is a classic example of how the board has treated an outgoing coach after every failure over the years. We are not sure if the Zimbabwean was served with a letter of appreciation from the BCB headquarters. Even if it was the case, we are sorry to say it's not decent not to make such things public.

The board is now planning to restructure the selection committee. A revamp is always appreciated if it adds value. But if we take what the BCB president Nazmul Hassan Papon said recently about the restructuring of the selection committee at face value, then we are definitely in for a shock.

"We will have a three-man selection panel and a new selection committee which will include the coach, the manager and the head of cricket operations committee along with the three selectors.

"Before every series, the selection committee will have a meeting. In that meeting the coach will provide the national selectors with a strategy. The team manager has been included here so that he can voice the opinions of the captain and the players," said the BCB boss while explaining the new-look selection policy.

The coach imparting his input is understood. But it is hard to gauge the manager's role and his proxy for captain and vice-captain. We know about one Imran Khan, who was not only an inspirational captain but played the role of a dictator when it came to selecting players. He virtually hand-picked cricketers like Wasim Akram and Inzamamul Haq to win the World Cup in 1996.

Bangladesh's one-day and T20 captain Mashrafe Bin Mortaza, who could have easily been the Test captain also had he been physically fit, may not be as big in stature as Imran. But he is more than an Imran Khan in the context of Bangladesh cricket. And he does not need someone to speak his mind via somebody. We deem the BCB president's remark as an insult to Mashrafe and what he did for the nation.

The board's ploy to add more people in the selection procedure is nothing new and the inclusion of the manger and the chairman of the cricket operations committee is a dirty game the BCB high-ups tried to play to have more control over the selection of the team. There was a time when 'Control' was the third word in the acronym BCCB. And it seems we are backtracking to BCCB from BCB at a time when Chandika's mantra of 'freedom of expression' had shown the light at the end of a dark tunnel.

Aus thrash hapless WI

David Warner scored an unbeaten half century as Australia romped to a sixwicket thrashing of West Indies in their opening Tri-Nation Series day-night game at the Guyana National Stadium on Sunday.

Warner's 55 not out saw Australia home with almost 25 overs to spare after the West Indies earlier collapsed from 50 for one to

116 all out from 32.3 overs. Australia then wasted little time in getting to the modest target, Warner anchoring the effort to ensure a victory that was never in doubt despite the loss of three wickets for seven runs with the end in sight.

The emphatic victory earned Australia a bonus point to move ahead of the West Indies in the three-team standings before Tuesday's game at Providence against South Africa.

West Indies had beaten South Africa by four wickets on Friday. Each team will play the other thrice and the top two in the table will contest the final on June 26.

Calendar Slam on Novak's mind

Having sealed his place as one of the greatest players of all time, Novak Djokovic was on Monday backed to keep breaking Grand Slam records with

little seemingly standing in his way. The 29-year-old captured his first French Open on Sunday to become only the eighth man to complete a career Grand Slam.

More impressively, he is just the third man to hold all four majors at the same time and the first since Rod Laver back in 1969.

That is something even his eternal rivals Roger Federer and Rafael Nadal

have failed to achieve. "He will be the big favourite again at Wimbledon and at the tournament after that and all of those after that one," predicted three-time French Open champion Gustavo Kuerten who was on hand

Sunday to witness Djokovic end a threefinal losing streak at Roland Garros finals with a 3-6, 6-1, 6-2, 6-4 win over Andy Миггау.

That was Djokovic's 12th Grand Slam title to add to his six at the Australian Open, three at Wimbledon and two at the US Open.

He also became the first man since Jim Courier in 1992 to clinch the Australian and French Opens back-to-back and therefore put himself in a position to grab a calendar Grand Slam which has only been achieved three times -- by Don Budge in 1938 and Laver in 1962 and 1969."Well, I don't want to sound arrogant, but I really think everything is

achievable in life," said the Serb. "I'm trying to grasp and I'm trying to cherish, obviously, these moments right now. Whether or not I can reach a calendar slam, that's still a possibility."
