Siemens wins power network contract

The government has awarded a Tk 1,112-crore project to German industrial giant Siemens to help Bangladesh import an additional 500 megawatts of electricity from India through the existing grid network.

Under the project, Siemens will upgrade the capacity of the existing Bheramara-Baharampur grid interconnection in 24 months, according to a statement.

The first phase of the project of the existing 500MW power station was also completed by Siemens in 2013. The project was implemented under an India-Bangladesh power exchange programme funded by the Asian Development Bank.

Bangladesh now imports 600MW of power from India, with 500MW coming through Bheramara-Baharampur grid interconnection.

Ashraf Hossain, company secretary of Power Grid Company of Bangladesh, the state-run transmission company, and Wolfgang Richard Klear, senior director of Siemens, signed the deal at a programme at Sonargaon Hotel in Dhaka on Monday.

Power Secretary Monowar Islam and PGCB Managing Director Masum-Al-Beruni were also present.

Mobile money accounts will be verified



Ambitious budget must be matched with fast execution

Mohammed Farashuddin, former central bank governor, sits down with The Daily Star to discuss budget

The ambitious budget for fiscal 2016-17 will require faster execution of development projects and boosting of revenues by widening the tax net if the government wants to implement it in earnest, said a senior economist.

"The budget would be a step forward in the economic emancipation of people," Mohammed Farashuddin, a former governor of the central bank, told The Daily Star in an interview on Wednesday.

He cited the strengthening of the social safety net as well as the 30 percent increase in allocation for education as cases in point. "The emphasis on education will transform the manpower into human capital."

Subsequently, he called for a taskforce to ensure timely completion of projects. The taskforce will monitor the progress of the projects in every quarter and identify the problems and fix them if there is any

Revenue is one of the lifelines of the budget, but when it comes to tax-to-GDP ratio, Bangladesh is only ahead of Afghanistan in South Asia, Farashuddin said.

Govt's e-purchase jumps seven times in two years

Public procurement through electronic means rose by more than seven times in the last two years which significantly cut collusive bidding practices and transaction costs, the World Bank has said.

Four agencies of the government together invited more than 55,000 tenders online up to May 2016, up from 8,000 in June 2014, while the corresponding value rose to \$5 billion from \$700 million during the period, according to a statement of the lender.


"Bangladesh is making a transformational shift to its public procurement environment with exponential growth of electronic government procurement, known as e-GP, covering four key government agencies," the WB said.

The agencies are: Roads and Highways Department, Local Government Engineering Department, Bangladesh Rural Electrification Board, and Bangladesh Water Development Board.

The agencies, which together spend about half the country's annual development budget, also monitor procurement performance online. In addition to making public contracting more accessible, secure, efficient and transparent, electronic procurement is significantly reducing collusive bidding practices at the local levels.
