# A blessing for haor families

In Sylhet's Hakaluki Haor a new generation of villagers is discovering the economic potential of duck farming. Many previously unemployed people, often from disadvantaged families, have taken up the activity as a means of selfemployment and a path to a better future.

"A decade ago the basic needs of our family could not be met on my father's farming income alone," says Nasir Uddin from Chandpur village in Sylhet's Fenchuganj upazila. "I wanted to do something to help our family."

In 2005, after completing a short training course on the subject in Derai upazila of Sunamganj district, Nasir set up a duck farm adjacent to his home. With the added income from the ducks, his dream to help support his family has

Not only Nasir, but around 200 others in the area have established household duck farms, some with NGO loans for start-up capital.

"After achieving bumper profits thanks to good prices last year," says Monur Miah, 29, of the same village, "I'm expanding my duck farm."

"I can earn over Tk 3 lakhs annually from ducks," says neighbour Quasem Ali.

"I started my duck farm two years ago," says Anwar Miah, 28, of Ferighat village in Fenchuganj. "I used to be unemployed; but then I was helping out at Monir Miah's duck farm and I learnt how to do it."

He started with 100 ducklings purchased by loan. Each SEE PAGE 11 COL 4

### Israel seals West Bank, Gaza

UN condemns 'collective punishment' of Palestinians

Israeli authorities have sealed off the West Bank and Gaza strip to stop Palestinians entering Israel as military operations continue following a terror attack in Tel Aviv. A spokesperson for the Israel Defence

Forces (IDF) said the shutdown would be in place until midnight on Sunday, preventing crossings in all but "medical and humanitarian cases". Thousands of Palestinians holding

special permits to pray in Jerusalem were exempt from the ban, according to the Coordinator of Government Activities in the Territories (Cogat).

The Israeli military body had already revoked travel permits for around 83,000 Palestinians in a move the United Nations said could amount to "collective punishment".

The UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, Zeid Ra'ad al-Hussein, condemned the shooting attack that left four Israelis dead and several injured on Wednesday, in what was the most deadly SEE PAGE 2 COL 4

## 50 hurt, 190 held after fierce clash

Traders of Dhaka Trade Centre and street hawkers clashed again in the capital's Gulistan area yesterday, barely a day after the two sides fought over eviction of hawkers from footpaths.

At least 50 people, including a police official, were injured in yesterday's

According to witnesses, as hawkers started opening their makeshift shops on footpaths in front of Dhaka Trade Centre around 11:30am, traders of the market drove them out. In response, the hawkers threw brickbats at

ing the place into a battlefield.

The clash continued till 1:30pm with brief pauses.

Vehicular movement in the area remained suspended for more than two hours, causing huge tailbacks in surrounding areas. All shopping malls and markets in the Gulistan area were shut during the clash.

Law enforcers had to fire teargas canisters to bring the situation under control, Tarique Bin Rashid, additional deputy commissioner (Motijheel

Police said around 190 traders and hawkers were detained from the spot and taken to the Paltan Police Station.

During the clash, Anwar Hossain, deputy commissioner (Motijheel zone) of Dhaka Metropolitan Police, suffered injuries to his forehead.

Google's data collection has caused concern in numerous countries.

### Women keep vigil to protect homes

Khasi women of two punjees in Moulvibazar's Sreemangal upazila have started guarding their houses and betel leaf gardens in a bid to resist any attempt to evict their families and grab their land.

They have taken it upon themselves to protect their homes as most of the male members of the punjees (villages) have fled their houses in fear of arrest following an eviction notice issued by the district administration.

The notice, issued on May 30 to some 700 Khasi people living in two villages collectively known as Nahar Punjee, asked the villagers to vacate 150 acres of the 250-acre punjee area by tomorrow.
