RMG workers block Gazipur road after bus hits guard

Agitated RMG workers vandalised a bus and blocked a road after the vehicle hit a motorbike injuring three persons, including a guard of a garment factory, in Konabari of Gazipur yesterday.

The workers also torched another bus of the same company while it was passing through Itahata area in Konabari after the accident, said Konabari Highway Police Sub-inspector Mozammel

The guard, Fozlul Haque, 50, of Diganta sweater factory, and the other two, whose identities could not be ascertained immediately, were admitted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

The road was blocked for about one hour.

SCC too bringing city under CCTV surveillance

22 cameras will start operating from today on experimental basis

Sylhet City Corporation (SCC) is installing CCTVs in some of the major thoroughfares in the city in an effort to ensure security of the residents.

The already installed 22 cameras will begin operating from today on an experimental basis, said a SCC official. According to SCC, the camera installation project involv-

ing Tk 18 lakh will cover the Taltala-Zindabazar road, City Point-Sobhanighat road, and Sobhanighat-Naiorpul road. Sohel Ahmed, officer-in-charge of Kotwali Police

Station, said a monitoring cell of the police station will also be operational from today to check security in the areas through the high powered cameras. "We are optimistic about the initiative. I believe it will

help us detect criminals and monitor crimes and traffic system in the city."

Contacted, Enamul Habib, chief executive officer of SCC, said the CCTV installation was an initiative to ensure security of the residents, and the police would do this task under the auspices of SCC.

"The operation will go on for seven days experimentally, and after that it will be running in full swing. If the initiative gets paid off, we will plan to bring the whole city under CC camera surveillance," added the CEO.
