An American-born man who'd pledged allegiance to ISIS gunned down 50 people at a gay nightclub in Orlando -- the deadliest mass shooting in the United States and the nation's worst terror attack since 911, authorities said yesterday. Mateen carried an assault

wounding at least 53, police said. After a standoff of about three hours, police crashed into the building with an armored vehicle and killed Mateen.

"It appears he was organised and well-


prepared," Orlando Police Chief John Mina said early Sunday. Authorities have not described finding any accomplices.

There has been no claim of responsibility for the attack on jihadi forums, but ISIS sympathisers have reacted by praising the attack on pro-Islamic State forums.

"We know enough to say this an address to the nation from

the White House. While the violence could have hit any American community, "this is an especially heartbreaking day for our friends who are lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender," he said.

Cause of death still unknown

2nd autopsy report does not suggest rape

It has been nearly three months since her murder, but the cause of her death is still unknown. Like the first autopsy, the second one could not determine how she died.

The second autopsy on Sohagi Jahan Tonu also did not suggest rape; it only found evidence of "sexual intercourse" before her murder.

48 'militants' among 2,000 new arrestees

Police arrested 48 more suspected militants on the third day of their countrywide clampdown yesterday, taking the total number of captured "militants" to 85 since the special drive began following Sunday's murder of a top police official's wife by suspected militants in Chittagong.

The special crackdown began in the early

hours of Friday, and is primarily aimed at nabbing militants believed to be carrying out targeted attacks one after another across the country.

However, it is not yet clear if any of those arrested was involved in any past attacks that saw dozens of people killed in the last two years or so.


The threats, sufferings and increasing mental pressure continues on the now teacher of Comilla Victoria College. Kadar is under tremendous pressure to withdraw the case he had filed against now suspended officer-in-charge (OC) of Khilgaon police station Helal Uddin, who had arrested

him in a false extortion case and tortured him in custody. Helal was punished with three years' imprisonment for the crime in absentia but he has been moving freely securing bail.

He has been issuing threats on Kadar and his family members to withdraw the case, Kadar and his family sources said.

"I am now going through a new phase of trouble as I am being asked to withdraw the case by various people and quarters," Kadar told The Daily Star.
