



The untold story of Jamdani


In the early hours of every Friday near the Demra Staff Quarter on the outskirts of Dhaka, a market comes alive with a frenzy of activities. This is a traditional haat, a place where a large number of saris and Jamdani fabrics are available at wholesale prices. This is where traders like Al Amin, who is known as a mahajan, deals in the fabled and signature handloom of Bangladesh -- Jamdani.

While the role of a handloom weaver and a factory owner is easy to understand, the mahajan's role is somewhat confusing, especially to an outsider. In essence, his role is to sell the weaver's products to customers or shops using their contacts, which makes them "agents" of sorts.

The weekly market operates within a short window of three hours, from 3:00am to 6:00am. All people involved in the trade production and sales of Jamdani attend the bazaar, and Al Amin is among those who serve as the bridges between them. Al Amin himself is also a weaver and owner of a Jamdani factory.

"It is very difficult to remain within a single role here," said Al Amin. It is here SEE PAGE 13 COL 6

'IS-linked' radical kills French police couple

Films part of assault live on Facebook before being shot dead

A suspected Islamist attacker stabbed a French police commander to death outside his home and later killed his companion, a policewoman, in an attack claimed by Islamic State and denounced by the government as "an abject act of terrorism".

The assailant, a 25-year-old Frenchman of Moroccan origin, was jailed in 2013 for helping Islamist

Larossi Abballa militants go to Pakistan and had been under security service surveillance, including wiretaps, at the time of the attack, police sources said.

The attacker filmed part of the assault live on the social network Facebook, according to David Thomson, a journalist specialized in radical Islamists. In his Facebook message, he linked the attack to the Euro 2016 soccer tournament now under way in France, saying: "The Euros will be a graveyard."

The attacker, named by police and justice sources as Larossi Abballa, knifed the 42-year-old commander SEE PAGE 2 COL 4

US-BANGLA DIALOGUE Security to top agenda

Bangladesh and the United States are set to hold their 5th Partnership Dialogue in Washington on June 23-24 amid concerns over the recent systematic assaults and killings in the South Asian country.

A series of terrorist attacks targeting minorities, secular bloggers, intellectuals and foreigners took place in Bangladesh in the last few months, which IS and Al-Qaeda claimed responsibility for. That raised concerns over the terrorist groups taking

roots in the country. Since October last year, the US has been suggesting that terrorists with links to the Islamic State have been preparing to increase their activity within the territory of Bangladesh.

Bangladeshi clerics said Monday they have issued a fatwa against the killings of minorities and secular campaigners in the mainly Muslim country, where police have arrested over 10,000 people in a crackdown on militancy.

Fatwa against

secret killings

Nearly 50 people have been killed over the last three years in a wave of gruesome attacks by Islamist militants targeting Hindus, Christians, Sufi Muslims, activists and foreigners. Many were hacked to death with machetes. Farid Uddin Masuod, who heads the

Council of Bangladesh Clerics, said over 100,000 clerics had signed the fatwa, or religious edict, which will be made public on June 18. "The fatwa unequivocally said these killings

of non-Muslims, minorities and secular activists are forbidden in Islam," he told AFP. "We've said these killings are illegal and

are crimes against humanity," Masuod added.

Last week an elderly Hindu priest was found nearly decapitated in a rice field and a Hindu monastery worker was hacked to death, while a Christian grocer was murdered near a church.

Other victims have included liberal activists and secular bloggers along with two foreigners and two gay rights activists.

The Islamic State (IS) group and a South Asian branch of al-Qaeda have claimed responsibilities for many of the

60BC computer predicted future

An astronomical calculator dating back to 60BC Ancient Greece may have also been used to predict the future, researchers have revealed.

The Antikythera Mechanism, described as "the world's first analogue computer" was created 2,000 years ago and discovered in 1901 in a shipwreck off the Greek island of the same name.

Remaining fragments of the device have been pieced together over the past 12 years using x-ray imaging technology, revealing the secrets of the device. It was previously revealed the calculator had been used by the

Greeks to map the movements of the planets and stars across the

sky, as a means of navigation. However, scientists have now decoded the broken inscriptions on the surface of the device, which appear to reveal an

astrological purpose. Professor Mike Edmunds, from University of Cardiff's
