3 lakh Rohingyas staying illegally

First-phase govt census finds them in Cox's Bazar; more than 32,000 registered Rohingyas live in camps; no repatriation since 2005

Apart from more than 32,000 registered Rohingyas in two refugee camps of Cox's Bazar, about three lakh of the ethnic minorities from Myanmar are living illegally in the district.

February 1 to 23 to identify Rohingya families in Bangladesh. Often dubbed one of the most persecuted minorities in the world, Rohingyas entered Bangladesh in phases since 1978 fleeing repression in

The statistics came from the first round of government census, held from

Their repatriation has remained stalled for about a decade.

The three lakh living illegally in the district belong to 37,000 families --20,000 of which are exclusively Rohingya families. And in 17,000 others, marriages took place between Bangladeshis and Rohingyas, according to reliable sources in Cox's Bazar District Statistics Office.

Contacted, deputy director at the office, Md Wahidur Rahman, declined to divulge any information in this regard, citing restrictions from higher

The second and final phase of the census, which was to identify Rohingya individuals, took place from June 2 till Monday. Its results could not be known yet.

Besides the Rohingyas living illegally in Cox's Bazar, 32,878 registered Rohingyas along with their 5,000 unregistered children live in two refugee

camps of the coastal district, bordering Myanmar. According to the office of Relief and Rohingya Refugee Repatriation Commissioner (RRRC) in Cox's Bazar, about 2.5 lakh Rohingyas entered Bangladesh in 1978 fleeing Myanmar government's "Dragon Operations"



from February 1 to 23 to count Rohingya families.

A section of Islamic scholars set to announce a set of edicts today as part of social campaign amid spate of killings in the name of religion

Calling for peace, harmony and tolerance, more than 1,00,000 Islamic scholars from across the country are set to deliver a set of fatwas against militancy today, first of its kind in the country in the context of targeted killings by suspected militants.

It comes in the wake of continued attacks on religious minorities, intellectuals and secular writers. Such killings, mostly by hacking with machetes, have risen over the · past few months.

An 11-memebr panel of Islamic scholars led by Farid Uddin Masoud, chairman of · Bangladesh Jamiyatul Ulamma, prepared the anti-terror edicts in light of the Quran and Hadith.

The move was first initiated at a meeting between Islamic clerics and top police officials late last year. The draft of the fatwas was completed in January at a meeting of some 300 Islamic scholars.

The Daily Star has a copy of the fatwas, expected to be announced at a press conference at Dhaka Reporters Unity in the capital today.

"A total of 1,01,524 Islamic scholars and imams signed our fatwa against militancy and violent extremism," said Masoud, grand imam of the country's largest Eid congregation at Sholakia in Kishoreganj.

The 32-page document will be distributed among imams and other religious leaders to spread the peaceful message of SEE PAGE 2 COL 5

more time

Tanners are likely to ask the government to give them six to eight more months to relocate their factories from the capital's Hazaribagh area to Savar Tannery Industrial Estate.

They will also file an appeal with the Supreme Court against the High Court verdict that ordered the owners of 154 tanneries in Hazaribagh to pay Tk 50,000 each a day in compensation for damaging the environment in the area.

"We will sit on Saturday [today] to discuss the issue. We are making preparations to appeal against the High Court order. We will also urge the government to give us six to eight more months," said Tipu Sultan, former chairman of Bangladesh Finished Leather, Leather Goods and Footwear Exporters' Association.
