Let's start with something basic. How did the name "Black" come about?

Back then, we were not sure what specific genre to pursue. The guitarist from our first line up, Asif, along with us was pondering on what to name our band. At that time we used listen to and cover songs by Deep Purple, Black Sabbath, White Snakes, etc. We noticed that all these bands had one thing in common: Colour. So Asif threw around the idea of naming the band Black and we all felt a positive vibe to it.
