## Chandika in charge till 2019 WC

Bangladesh national coach Chandika Hathurusingha's contract has been officially extended till the 2019 World Cup.

The expected extension was officially confirmed in a board meeting at the Bangladesh Cricket Board's (BCB's) headquarters in Mirpur yesterday afternoon.

The contracts of the national team's spin coach Ruwan Kalpage and trainer Mario Villavarayan have also been extended, BCB president Nazmul Hassan Papon informed reporters following the meeting.

The BCB has also brought about several changes in the national selection process. The most highlighted among those was the exclusion of former national captain Habibul Bashar from the three-member selection panel, replaced by Sajjad Ahmed Shipon. Bashar will now work with the

It is a surprising development because Bashar's record of recruiting players from domestic competition has been good. For instance, he played an important role in bringing Mustafizur Rahman to the national team.

team will be selected. "A three-member selection panel will first select the team. There will be no interference from anyone. However, before submitting the team to me, they will sit with the coach and the manager in a meeting, convened by the cricket operations chairman. Once they all sign the team, only then will it come to me for the final approach," Papon explained.

"There are many who expressed doubts regarding the new system, however, this is how it has been running informally ever since my arrival. I have just made it formal," he added.

Furthermore, the BCB president also said that the board will take legal action against The other change deals with the way the the Bangladesh Premier League franchisee, Sylhet Superstars.

"They still owe around Tk 3-4 crores to the board and to the players. Since they didn't pay that, we went to cash their bank guarantee. However, we couldn't do that due to some technical issues, which they created. As a result we have decided to take legal action against them," said Papon.

He further added that the Bangladesh

Premier League will begin on November 6.

Papon also said that the board has directed the clubs of the Dhaka Premier League to complete the payment of its players within the next 72 hours.

"If they don't, the BCB will pay on behalf of them and then take the sternest possible action against the clubs," said Papon.

As of now, the majority of the clubs have only paid 20 to 30 per cent of the required dues. The board wants them to complete them within the next three days.

With regards to the Abahani-Prime Doleshwar clash at the BKSP last Sunday, which was postponed indefinitely after the umpires had decided not to continue the game, the president said that they would form a committee -- comprising BCB's umpires committee chairman Nazmul Karim, Disciplinary committee chairman Sheikh Sohel, match referee Rakibul Hasan and Athar Ali Khan -- to determine what exactly happened in that game. The committee has been directed to submit the report within 72 hours.

"Actually, never have we faced such a situation before. We never had to stop a match for a reason like this. There have been cases when players have angrily reacted against umpires. There have also been cases when umpires have fallen sick. So, honestly speaking, we don't know how to continue from here," said Papon.

Furthermore, the BCB president also revealed that the board has formed a fourmember bowling action review committee, which will be headed by BCB director Jalal Yunus.

While the process of judging the bowlers' action is still uncertain, Yunus revealed that it will be confirmed as soon as the league is over.

"For now, we will focus on those who have been suspected. We are even thinking of building a mini bowling lab in the near future," said Yunus.

# 'I won't be part of new system'

The Bangladesh cricket team's chief selector Faruque Ahmed has said last night that he will not work under the new selection process which was officially adopted in the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) board meeting earlier yesterday.

"The decision has been taken, I will not work under this system," Faruque told The Daily Star over phone from the United States, where he is currently away on holiday. "I will officially submit the letter of resignation to the BCB once I return."

In two separate stints as a national selector Faruque has had his hand in selecting teams that broke new ground in making the second round of the World Cup for the first time in 2007, played Asia Cup 2012 and 2016 finals, made the World Cup 2015 quarterfinals and won home series against Pakistan, India and South Africa in 2015.

The board meeting confirmed the plans for the

new selection process -- namely expanding the personnel involved beyond the previous three-member committee to include the head coach, team manager and the cricket operations committee chairman, all three of whom now have to endorse the team before it goes to the BCB president for final approval.

"I have made my position clear before, that it will be difficult to work in this system. We have to have scope to work and work without interference. Selection is an area where you have to work with freedom without interference, because then you have accountability. Then people will know who is behind the decisions," Faruque said.

"Till now, before we sat down to select the team we used to call the coach and take his suggestions. Sometimes we called the captain if he had any special preferences. We then used to finalise the team, sign on it and send it. Then, just to make it official, the cricket operations chairman signed it and sent it to the president," he explained the system as it has been running

The key player for Rupganj will be SoumyaSarkar. The national batsman scored a quick 47 in the last game and seemed to be getting back to form. This game will be the perfect time for him to recapture the magic.

As far as Abahani is concerned, they will depend quite a bit on Dinesh Kartik. The Indian batsman scored a century in his first game here and then calmly took Abahani over the line in the last game.

In yet another crucial encounter, Mominul Haque's Victoria Sporting will take on Nasir Hossain's Prime Doleshwar in Fatullah. Victoria are

third with 17 points, while Prime Doleshwar are fourth with 16 points, but have a game in hand. With both these teams still in contention for the trophy, the match could be an interesting one.

#### Wedson leaving


Wedson Anselme is set to leave Sheikh Jamal Dhanmondi Club within a few days as the Haitian forward is keen on playing in his domestic league to draw

attention of the national team. The 30-year-old forward, who is currently spending his third season in Bangladesh wearing the Sheikh Jamal shirt, is believed to have already acquired a no-objection certificate from the club.

"The initial contract with Wedson was till the end of June. But he is not interested to stay here anymore as he has cited family reasons. He is supposed to collect his release letter from the club president today [Sunday]," said a Sheikh Jamal official anonymously.

The Haitian goal machine was lured to Bangladesh football in the 2013-14 season by his compatriot Sony Norde, who had made a name for himself in the previous season with Sheikh Russel KC. The two played for Sheikh Jamal in the 2013-14 season, winning the league and the Federation Cup titles. But while Sony has since been lured by the riches of the Indian Super League, Wedson stayed back in Bangladesh, playing a key role in Sheikh Jamal's league and Federation Cup titles in the following season as well as Sheikh Jamal's King's Cup triumph in Bhutan in 2014.

But while Sony, and another Haitian forward Pascal Millien who spent a season with Sheikh Russel, have been constant fixtures in the Haitian national team including recent participation in the Copa America Centenario, Wedson has failed to get back into the national fold since his only appearance in 2012 despite becoming the top-scorer in Bangladesh Premier League in 2014 and the second-top scorer in 2015.



lack of chances for the national team as well as Sheikh Jamal's floundering fortunes in recent times have spurred him for a move back to Haiti.

"To be honest, I am not enjoying it here anymore and it is good for me as soon as I can leave here," the 30-year-old striker told reporters after his side lost to Arambagh KS in the first quarterfinal of the Federation Cup on Friday.

"I want to return to the national fold as I have seen some of my colleagues play for the national team in Copa America. It is not possible to draw the attention of the national team if I continue to play here. If I want to make my dream true, I must play in the domestic league in Haiti," added Wedson.

#### Major ODI revamp in the works

The ICC is pushing for the creation of a new ODI league for the world's top 13 countries to give 50-over cricket new context and relevance.

Plans are well-advanced to create a new league from 2019 for 13 nations - believed to be the ten Test teams, Afghanistan, Ireland and one other Associate, with Nepal advocated by some as a

favoured option in a debate that still has some way to run. The league will see all countries play each other over three years, with the top two nations playing a play-off series

to determine the overall winner of the league. It is hoped that the proposals will give ODI cricket a new context and sense of purpose, amid fears that the format fits awkwardly between Test and Twenty20 cricket, insuffi-


ciently loved either by traditionalists or newer fans. Under the plans, each team would play a three-match series either home or away against every other country, amounting to 36 ODIs each over a three-year basis. The fourth year of each cycle would be reserved for World Cup preparation.

It is envisaged that the ODI league would progress towards a play-off series, likely to be either three matches or five, to determine the overall winner, giving bilateral ODI cricket a global showpiece it has previously lacked.

The system, if adopted, would also be used to determine automatic qualification, and seedings, for the World Cup. The side finishing bottom after three years would face relegation to the World Cricket League Championship, the second tier of one-day cricket, possibly after a play-off with the winners of the World Cricket League Championship.

As with the proposed reforms to Test cricket, the structure is intended as a minimum schedule for each country, and they would be free to organise extra ODIs, which would not count towards the league.

The most obvious beneficiaries of the schedule would be Afghanistan and Ireland, who would have a guaranteed set of fixtures to develop their teams and have a more attractive set of matches to sell sponsors. While both have enjoyed an upturn in fixtures since their inclusion on the 12-team ODI rankings table, the proposed new ODI league would bolster this further.
