Illegal int'l calls thrive on Teletalk

22 lakh unregistered Teletalk SIMs still not blocked

State-owned carrier Teletalk's failure to kill around 22 lakh unregistered connections is allowing a huge volume of illegal international calls to be made, depriving the government of revenue.

Citing security concerns, the government announced that subscribers would be disconnected after May 31 if they failed to biometrically re-register their SIMs. But its own carrier, Teletalk, continues to allow unauthorised connections making a farce of the re-registration move.

In May, Teletalk had 44.63 lakh subscribers but about 22 akh of them reregistered their SIMs before the deadline. Industry sources said unregistered but active Teletalk SIMs are now being used for making and receiving illegal international calls. In the first half of June, Bangladesh Telecommunication

Regulatory Commission (BTRC) detected 27,464 SIMs being used for illegal international calls. Of them, it was detected that 41 SIMs were from

Banglalink, 36 from Robi, 19 from Grameenphone, 1 from Airtel and 260 from Rankstel.

The remaining 27,143 SIMs were from Teletalk and all of SEE PAGE 2 COL 5

Stay or go?

Britain votes to decide whether to remain in EU after tight, divisive campaign

Millions of Britons were voting yesterday on whether to stay in the EU or quit, in a momentous referendum that has polarised the country and could change the face of Europe.

The evening wave of voters headed to cast their ballots after work before the polls close at 2100 GMT, after a close-fought and often vitriolic campaign focused on immigration, the economy and Britain's very identity.

A record 46.5 million people registered to vote in the once-in-a-generation referendum being nervously watched across Europe and the world.

European leaders fear a so-called Brexit would trigger the biggest crisis in the 60year history of post-war integration on the continent.

The final opinion polls put the "Remain" camp narrowly ahead and financial markets duly bet on a

He has not joined any of the 134 sittings of parliament in the last one and a half years. This says all about his failure to do parliamentary business as a lawmaker. Yet, like other MPs, tax payers' money has been spent on

his remuneration and other benefits. An MP gets more than Tk 1 lakh a month in remuneration and allowances. Regardless of his failure to perform as a lawmaker,

nobody bothered about it until his latest attempt to retain his MP status.

Fugitive in the eyes of law and wanted by the police in a murder case, Amanur Rahman Rana, Awami League MP from Tangail-3 constituency, entered the parliament building on Monday and signed an attendance book kept at the House lobby and left the area. And he had no difficulty in doing so.

Just a signature in the register book will allow him to dodge parliamentary business for one more year, as he will not need to show up in parliament for the next 90 consecutive sittings.

Extorted, now in fear

The two Buddhist traders, who recently bought freedom from confinement by a CID sub-inspector for Tk 20,000, now fear reprisal from policemen after a Buddhist federation leader raised the matter at a 14party meeting.

"As the news was published in the media, we are apprehending that policemen might create further trouble for us," a close relative of the traders from Rampura Bazar told The Daily Star.

The traders -- Sabuj Barua and Sourav

Barua who are brothers -- were picked up by SI Israfil Shamim and three of his colleagues from their shop around 1:00pm on June 19.

They were then kept confined to the office of Israfil for three hours and threatened with implicating them in a case. One of the policemen then demanded Tk

1 lakh for their release. The two were allowed to walk out of the Criminal Investigation Department at Malibagh only after they gave them Tk 20,000. This happened with the intervention of some Buddhist community leaders, said one of
