

MUNIA

henever I see a munia I recall a fairy tale I read as a child. While creating the world, our Creator is colouring birds and animals to His liking. He goes through them all, painting them in His favourite colours. All the colours get used up. Just then a small bird pops out from its hiding spot: a munia, looking pitiful without colour. What to do? There are just a few drops of colour left, and He sprinkles them on the bird, endowing it with its spotted colours.

Indeed, it is almost impossible not to like munias. In many families, "munia" is often an affectionate form of addressing children (after "moina" and "tia", of course!)

In Bangladesh there are five species of munia out of a total of 39 worldwide species. (There is also a related bird, the red avadavat.) Munias are smaller than sparrows, ten centimetres long and weighing twelve grams. They are gregarious birds, staying in groups and often playing with each other.

In my experience, our most common munia is the scaly-breasted munia, which might be the one that inspired the fairy tale. Its backside is reddish brown, with a dark area around the face. Its breast has a redand-black scale pattern on white background.

It is harder to find the whiterumped munia. I have seen it in the Moulvi Bazar area. It is a darker bird that often eats grains of rice from harvested paddyfields or rice drying areas. We also have black-headed and tricoloured munias which were once classified as the same species and only recently divided into two. They look

similar with a black head and dark reddish brown body, except for a white chest patch on the tricoloured one. The Indian silverbill is our fifth munia species, a beige coloured bird named for its shiny beak. It is delightful to watch a flock of

munias eating grass seeds. They land together in the grass and frolic away, jumping hither and thither, chirping busily with each other. Individuals then swing from stalks of grass by their feet. They lean towards an adjacent strand of seeds and slide their beak along it, eating all the seeds and leaving the strand clean. Sometimes two munias quarrel. One of them springs up a foot or two and hovers effortlessly before landing on a different spot where it resumes feasting.

Munias live year-round in our country. They breed during summer and monsoon. Hence, this time of year they are out showing off and looking for mates. Because of their appearance and sweet nature, munias are popular as pets worldwide. The black-headed munia was the national bird of the Philippines before being replaced by the Philippines eagle.

When the winter migrants are gone, munias are a joy to watch as they fly synchronously, undulating like a graceful wave. Rain brings fresh grass in fields that dried over winter. You can find munias in such fields as well as in wooded areas. I have seen them in the fields of Bashundhara, Purbachol and Keraniganj, as well as in parks such as the Botanical Garden and Baridhara Lakeside Park.

AL, JSD trade gunfire, clash in Kushtia

Two JSD men bullet-hit among 10 injured

At least 10 persons were injured, two of them shot, as the activists of the ruling Awami League and Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal exchanged fire and clashed over establishing supremacy in Chandgram of Bheramara upazila in Kushtia yesterday. Initially, a team from Bheramara Police

Station failed to bring the situation under control, Kamrul Hassan, assistant superintendent of police (Bheramara circle), told The Daily Star. Police, later, fired four rounds of bullets

and dispersed both the groups, he said. The clash ensued between the supporters

of JSD activist Minhaj Uddin and AL activist Enamul Haq, the ASP added.

Enam is also a former member of Chandgram Union Parishad while Minhaj is a local influential person, said police and locals.

Both of the groups traded gunfire and used

various weapons during the clash, which continued for about an hour, said the ASP. JSD activists Saiful Islam, 32, who was

shot in the foot, while Afil Malitha, 44, in the thigh; and AL men Nazrul Islam, 25, and Sohag Hossain, 23, are undergoing treatment at Kushtia General Hospital. The other injured took treatment at dif-

ferent hospitals and private clinics.

Neither Minhaj nor Enamul could be contacted despite repeated attempts as their cellphones were found switched-off. Locals said there had been a long stand-

ing dispute between AL and JSD in the area since the last national election. At least eight clashes took place between them till now.

When contacted, Golam Mohsin, president of Kushtia district unit of JSD, and Akteruzzaman, president of Bheramara upazila unit of AL, blamed each other for the clashes.

Govt moves to set up model pharmacies

The government has taken an initiative to set up "model pharmacies" across the country, to stop the sale of counterfeit, fake and substandard medicines.

Each divisional headquarters, district and upazila will get the pharmacies with technical assistance from Accredited Drug Seller project of the US-based Management Science for Health (MSH). According to an official document

obtained by the news agency, a process is underway to make a monogram for this "model pharmacy", divided in Level-1 and Level-2, considering its size, type and activities. The Level-1 pharmacy will be con-

ducted by Grade-A pharmacists while the Level-2 pharmacy will be run by Grade-B and C pharmacists. There will be separate counselling sections to give people correct idea

about the medicines and its usage apart

from purchasing medicines. The government has also started a project for online-based reporting on web portal and mobile application regarding the adverse effects of medicines, counterfeit medicines and excessive

prices, with assistance of Access to

Information (a2i) programme. Technovista Limited taking assistance from a2i programme is developing the software, which will be available soon, enabling people to report on the adverse impacts of medicines, amongn others, according to the official document.

Six people, including a couple and two physicians, were killed and 33 others injured in road accidents in three districts yesterday.

In Narsingdi, three people, including two physicians, were killed and five others injured after a microbus carrying them collided head-on with a truck on Dhaka-Sylhet highway in Pahari area of Shibpur upazila.

The deceased were Kolimullah, 55, and Smritykona, 45, and microbus driver Monir Hossain, 35.

Among the injured Mostafizur Rahman, 32, is a cardiologist of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University, Tanbir, 40, works at the National Institute of Cardiovascular Disease and Bijon Kumar Saha, 35,

is a cardiologist of Bhairab Padma General Hospital. They were admitted to the National Institute of Traumatology and Orthopaedic Rehabilitation Hospital.
