Fakhrul urges govt STAFF CORRESPONDENT



BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir yesterday

called upon the government to ensure democratic rights of political parties and widen the scope to practice those instead of trying to eliminate the opposition in a bid to defeat militancy.

"A combing operation was conducted to subdue the opposition...we have heard they may launch another drive...you have failed to suppress BNP by unleashing repression over the last eight years. That is why you are now taking fresh repressive measures," he said.

Fakhrul was addressing a discussion Zia Parishad organised in Nayapaltan's Bhasani auditorium in the capital in memory of former Dhaka University vice chancellor Prof

Maniruzzaman Miah who passed away on June 13 at the age of 81.

Fakhrul said, "Do not play with fire and come back from this dangerous path. Walk in the right path of democracy allowing political parties to do politics. Militancy will be defeated to democracy if its (the latter's) closed doors and windows are reopened."

He alleged that the government in the pretext of democracy has established a one-party rule and that the media and government officials were now playing a partisan role forgetting their responsibility towards the country and its people.

He said the government has been suppressing those hold dissident or alternathem to jail or implicating them in false cases.

3 lakh new taxpayers 12pc people still at next year: Muhith

The government aims to increase the number of total taxpayers to 15 lakh by adding 3 lakh new taxpayers in the next fiscal, Finance Minister AMA Muhith said yesterday.

Before end of the tenure of the present government, the taxpaying population should rise to 20-21 lakh, he told a postbudget discussion, organised by Bangladesh Study Trust (BST) at the Jatiya Press Club.

Muhith shared the target after some discussants pointed to the present number of taxpayers of 12 lakh, who account for less than one percent of the total population.

The number should be much higher, said participants.

Mohammed Farashuddin, former governor of Bangladesh Bank, quoted international management firm Boston Consulting Group as saying that the country had more than one crore of population with an annual income over \$5,000.

"Then why is the number of taxpayers so

small?" he said.

"It is shameful for a country," said AK Abdul Momen, chairman of BST, referring to the small taxpaying population.

Muhith said he was very hopeful about the youths whom he saw crowding at tax fairs every year to pay tax. But the problem lies with implementation of

the new VAT law, which envisages an automated VAT administration and collection system. The problem will be solved if business-

men keep records and accounts properly, said Muhith who backtracked from enforcing the law from July this year.

The new timeline is July 2017.

Muhith said the government planned to give electronic cash registers or accounting machines at subsidised rates to businesses so that they could keep records of transactions easily.

He also called for investment, saying entrepreneurs would get required gas by 2019 as the government would LNG terminals to import gas.

Bangladesh, Slovenia agree to cooperate

Bangladesh and Slovenia yesterday agreed to cooperate in areas of trade, energy, science and technology, agriculture and light industries.

Praising Bangladesh's spectacular growth in agriculture, textiles, pharmaceuticals and energy, Slovenian leaders underlined that the two countries could collaborate in renewable energy and power generation, small scale high-tech industries and other sectors.

State Minister for Foreign Affairs Md Shahriar Alam, who is now on a three-day official visit to Slovenia, yesterday called on Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs of Slovenia Karl Erjavee and President of the Slovenian National Assembly Milan Brglez.

He exchanged views with a group of Slovenian businessmen and investors who were already in the process of exploring business opportunities in Bangladesh.

During his meeting, Slovenian Foreign Minister Karl Erjavee termed the visit by the Bangladesh state minister and the signing of the MoU important milestones to consolidate further the relationship between the two friendly countries in the political, economic and other fields.

The Slovenian minister requested Bangladesh to explore using Slovenian port which is a gateway to the Central Europe. The "Copper Port" of Slovenia is currently being used by

Asian countries. Bangladesh Ambassador to Vienna Mohammed Abu Zafar was present during the meetings.

Increase border watch to curb drug trafficking in Ctg

DNC, Promises Medical roundtable told

Speakers at a roundtable yesterday stressed waging a movement against drug abuse to eliminate the menace from the society.

Pointing that most of the drugs are smuggled into Bangladesh from the neighbouring countries, they said instead of considering one or two big hauls as a success it was more essential to increase surveillance at the access points.

Public and private sector collaboration as well as psychological counselling for the abusers are also required, they added.

The Department of Narcotics Control (DNC) in collaboration with Promises Medical Ltd, a centre for rehabilitation, arranged the event in the capital marking International Day against Drug Abuse and

Illicit Trafficking today. DNC Director Nazmul Ahsan Majumder said the Yaba menace has increased alarmingly in the last one year.

Anti-drug campaigner Arup Ratan Chowdhury said most of the illegal drugs are produced in the neighbouring countries.

"It is essential to enhance surveillance at the access points," said Barrister Shamim Haider Patwary.

Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal said they have taken initiatives to re-arrange the DNC. A modern laboratory will be established and the DNC intelligence will be provided with proper training, he said, adding, scanners and dog squads will be provided to Border Guard Bangladesh.

State Minister for Women and Children Affairs Meher Afroze Chumki Gonoshasthaya Kendra Trustee Zafrullah Chowdhury, Khandaker Rakibur Rahman, director general of narcotics, and Shahedul Islam Helal, chairman of Promises Medical Ltd, also spoke.

Adulterated ghee seized

A mobile court of Chittagong District Administration yesterday seized a huge amount of contaminated ghee after conducting a drive at an unauthorised factory in BSCIC Lane at Bayezid of the port city.

During the drive led by Executive Magistrate Md Anisul Islam, the gawa ghee was found inside the factory that had no name of its own.

The factory used to sell the ghee using the brand names "Tasty Gawa Ghee" and "AP-1 Gawa Ghee", said Anisul

A total of 1,118 cans of ghee and about two mounds of chemicals were seized from the factory, which was later sealed off.
