### Two ministers stuck in lift for 20 minutes

Two ministers got stuck in a lift for about 20 minutes after the lift went down several floors at speed in the Ekushey TV building in Karwan Bazar early Friday. State Minister for Power, Energy

and Mineral Resources Nasrul Hamid Bipu and State Minister for Information and Communications Technology Zunaid Ahmed Palak along with several others were leaving the building after taking part in the "Ekusher Raat" programme of the TV station when the incident happened, said sources in the channel.

At 1:05am, the lift dropped (not a free fall) from the seventh-floor to the ground floor at speed, said fire service and civil defence sources.

All the people inside were rescued and they did not have any major injuries. The talk-show anchor Anjan Roy posted in his Facebook page that the state ministers were invited to attend the talk-show on the occasion of Awami League's founding anniversary.

### 'Surge' in searches

reveal actual volumes of searches. On the financial implications, Google Trends said it had recorded the highest-ever search interest in sterling.

During the early hours of the morning, the pound fell by more than 10% -- to a level not seen since 1985 -- before slightly rebounding.

And there was a spike in searches for "Move to Gibraltar" -- from London users -- after the EU referendum polls closed.

Tobias Preis, at Warwick Business School, cautioned that search data should be interpreted with special care as only relative figures are known, so spikes in some specific activity could be caused by a small number of people.

Prof Preis added that the phrase "David Cameron" vastly outperformed searches relating to Irish passports and "what happens if we leave the EU" between the hours of 04:00 and 06:00 BST.

"It could be the case, for example, that people supporting or opposing the idea of leaving the EU are trying to understand the position of the

other party," he also told the BBC. "It's pretty unlikely that all those people who are searching for answers will up sticks and move," added Jonathan Freeman, director of digital consumer insights firm i2 Media

Research. "Certainly a lot of people were pretty shocked, it was very close people would have just been wanting to find as much information as they could," Mr Freeman - who is also a

psychologist at Goldsmiths, University of London - told the BBC. Although it might not immediately be obvious, Google Trends graphs do not track the absolute

volume of searches over time. Instead, they give an indication of

relative search popularity. "To do this, each data point is

divided by the total searches of the geography and time range it represents, to compare relative popularity," explains Google on the Trends website.

"The resulting numbers are then scaled to a range of 0 to 100."

For example, the firm adds, users in Fiji and Canada could have the same value for a given search term if they're equally likely to look for it during the same period - regardless of the actual number of searches made.

"Quite honestly, it should not take ages, that is true, but I would not fight now for a short time frame," Merkel told a news conference.

"The negotiations must take place in a businesslike, good climate," she said "Britain will remain a close partner, with which we are linked economically." In another development, Britain's

representative on the EU executive, Financial Services Commissioner Jonathan Hill, resigned yesterday after campaigning against a British exit.

In a sign of widening division, more than 1.9 million Britons have signed a petition on parliament's website calling for a second EU referendum because Thursday's

"We join together in saying that this was not decisive enough.

The petition will have to be discussed by lawmakers, but it has no legal force.

Tens of thousands are set to pack into Trafalgar Square in the British capital on Tuesday to show "London stands with Europe", the Evening Standard newspaper reported.

populations apparently backed "Brexit". A 12,000-strong survey of referendum voters published by pollster Michael Ashcroft found that 73 percent of 18 to 24-year-olds and 62 percent of 25 to 34year-olds had voted "Remain".

However, 60 percent of people aged over 65 had voted "Leave".

Eurosceptics in other member states applauded Britons' decision to leave the European Union in a referendum that sent shockwaves around the world, with far-right demands for a similar vote in Slovakia underlining the risk of a domino effect.

The UK itself could also now break apart.

Scottish First Minister Nicola Sturgeon said her devolved government was preparing to present legislation allowing a second independence referendum while continuing discussions on its place within the EU after more than 60 percent of its people voted to

son to put him on a school bus.

A CMP official told The Daily Starthey identified from the CCIV footage all the three who directly took part in the murder and had already detained and interrogated them. The murder was initially thought to

be an act of militants who are suspected to have killed some 50 people over the past three years. Responsibility for some of the attacks was claimed by Islamic State and Ansar Al Islam, which claims to be the Bangladesh branch of al-Qaeda in Indian Subcontinent (AQIS).

The government denies any IS presence in the country, and blames the BNP-Jamaat and homegrown militants linked with them for the killings meant to create unrest in the country.

Hours after Mitu's murder, Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal held militants responsible for it, although no groups claimed credit for the killing. On the contrary, Ansar Al Islam criticised the murder.

SP Babul, who was posted in Chittagong for several years, is credited with busting several militant dens and arresting some top militants in the port city. Last night, the home minister told this

newspaper that police took Babul to identify some suspects. But earlier in the day he said the SP was "interrogated" to verify some information given by the detainees. "We were astonished when we found

the involvement of a miscreant in the murder as he was known as Babul Akter's source," said an official of the investigation team. "We have just heard from one side and

we don't know about the authenticity of it," he said, adding, "We are not sure whether the detainees were telling the truth."

Devdas Bhattacharya, CMP additional commissioner, however, said they did not arrest any source of Babul and that they detained only two suspects --Abu Nasar Gunnu and Shah Zaman

Robin.

HOW BABUL WAS PICKED UP

Babul and his family members were attending a programme at Ramna on Friday evening. It was an Iftar party of 24th batch BCS cadres at the officers' mess, where senior police officials, including the inspector general of police, were present.

There, Babul told his father-in-law Mosharraf Hossain, a retired police officer, that the IGP wanted to talk to him, Mosharraf told reporters at his Khilgaon Bhuiyanpara house yester-

Thinking that the talks may last a while, Babul sent his two kids and Mosharraf to the house of a colleague in Ramna area.

"At about 11:30pm, Babul arrived in front of the building [colleague's house] and phoned me to come down. Officer-in-charge of Khilgaon Police Station, who was with Babul, came up to my house," Mosharraf said.

They reached their home around 12:45am. Within 10 minutes, Motijheel Division DMP Deputy Commissioner Anwar Hossain arrived at the house.

Around 1:05am, they took Babul with them saying the police boss would speak to him again for 10 to 15 minutes. As he did not return, family members

called Babul on the phone, but it was found switched off within half an hour, said Mosharraf, adding that the Khilgaon OC did not pick up their calls throughout the day yesterday. Mahbub Alam, deputy commissioner

of DB, dropped Babul off in front of the Banasree house in the afternoon, he said, adding that police asked Babul not to speak with the media about the interrogation. Earlier in the day, family members

had gone to the DB office, looking for Babul. But officials there told them that they did not know where he was, according to Mosharraf, who said his daughter never complained against Babul about anything.

"We think he [Babul] is being victimised out of professional jealousy," he added.

Ahead of Eid-ul-Fitr, the largest Muslim festival, the scene takes a new life: the narrow alleys buzz with people, many of whom are there for a specific purpose -buying sarees and lungis for zakat, the obligatory charity and the third pillar of Islam. People generally choose the month of

Ramadan to pay off zakat, perhaps motivated by the additional rewards promised in afterlife for doing so. Mobarak Hossain, a resident of

Gulhsan-1, goes to Islampur every Ramadan to buy sarees and lungis for distribution to the needy as alms. His incentive for going from one end of the city to another is the bargain price that the dealers of Islampur usually offer. "If the prices are low, I will be able to

buy more and consequently more people will be benefitted," he said as he was paying for 400 sarees. "I bought 380 sarees at Tk 450 each.

The other 20 cost Tk 550 each," he said.

"The cheaper ones are for the mass; others
