Dhaka Mariner Youngs Club became champions of the Premier Division Hockey League for the first time after staging a come-from-behind 3-2

victory against title rivals Usha KC in the last and title-deciding match of the Super-Six stage at the Maulana Bhasani Hockey Stadium yesterday.

A draw would have been enough to see the Motijheel outfit clinch their first toptier title in their 27-year journey, but Gerhard Peter Rach's charges showed character as they came from two goals down to beat Usha and become the seventh team to win the league title after Mahuttuli SC, Abahani, Mohammedan SC, Shadharan Bima KS, Ajax SC and Usha KC.

The name Mariner Youngs has been more synonymous with "rowdy hockey team" over the years, but this time they

"I am sorry for what took place at the gallery. It happened on the spur of the moment. We won five out of six decisions which were referred, which only shows the low standard of foreign umpires. Schedule worries Lehmann

Australia coach Darren Lehmann has urged cricket's governing body to help reduce the workload on players competing in all three forms of the game as he fears the current packed schedule is unsustainable.

"If it keeps going like this, with players playing IPL as well, they are inevitably going to break down," Lehmann said Friday.

"Hopefully changes will happen at the ICC and then you will see a refined schedule which will be better."

Zim, SL react to proposed two-tier system

Test cricket's newest nations are in despair at plans to split the format into two divisions, fearing it could undo decades of hard-fought progress on the field and kill interest in the game.

Cricket's governing body the International Cricket Council (ICC) is meeting in Edinburgh this week to debate proposals for the seven top-ranked teams to establish

a de facto premier league in a bid to boost waning interest in Tests. Under the scheme being considered by the ICC, the other three countries with Test status would join a five-strong second division along with Afghanistan and Ireland.

As things stand, the two latest arrivals at cricket's top table --Bangladesh and Zimbabwe -- will be doomed to the second tier and could be joined by another relative newcomer Sri Lanka.

Alistair Campbell, a former director of Zimbabwe's board, appreciated the arguments for a split because of the gulf in class

between the top and bottom sides. But Campbell said it would be heartbreaking if current players would never be able to compete against the best.

"It's going to be a tragedy if you are growing up in a country

like Zimbabwe or Bangladesh," he told AFP. "It means you might never get the opportunity to play with top

tier sides. That might drive players to go and seek greener pastures." There are similar fears in Sri Lanka, currently ranked seventh and in danger of being overtaken by an improving West Indies by the time the proposed split comes into force.

Sidath Wettimuny, who scored Sri Lanka's first Test century, warned the architects of the split were playing with fire.

"It's okay to make some tweaks but what is proposed is going to be a disaster in every sense of the word," he said.

Sri Lanka's cash-strapped board is hugely dependent on TV money and ticket revenue from tours by the likes of India and Australia. But neither broadcasters nor spectators will pay significant

amounts for matches involving minnows such as Ireland. "If you club the weakest teams in one league, who'll be interested in watching those games? This will lead to financial ruin,"

Sports Minister Dayasiri Jayasekera told AFP. Earlier in the week in Dhaka, Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) directors also expressed consternation about the pro-

posed Test divisions. "This will spell the death of international cricket as we've known it," said BCB director Ahmed Sazzadul Alam.

BCB vice president Mahbubul Anam warned Bangladesh "would go backwards" if they stop playing teams such as England and India, both of whom they are due to play later this year.

"The resulting downturn in revenues would undermine development programmes and funding of domestic leagues.

"It will effectively mean the end of cricket for countries like us."

into the third round. It was a day of hard-earned success for both the Williams sisters as fivetime champion Venus Williams reached the last-16, seeing off Russian teenager Daria Kasatkina 7-5, 4-6, 10-8 in a tie featuring a rain stoppage

when she held match point. In another rain-interrupted encounter, Australian Nick Kyrgios survived a warning for bad language and a third-set sulk to clinch a 6-7

explosive second-round clash. Both players are known for their entertaining styles and they did not disappoint with a five-setter replete with quality shot-making.

Kyrgios, who famously shocked Rafael Nadal en route to the Wimbledon quarter-finals two years ago, spent most of the match ranting, drawing a code violation for an audible obscenity and appearing to give minimal effort in protest as he sulked his way through the third set against the man who shocked Nadal last year.

Hammering aces and winners with abandon, it took Brown and Kyrgios just one hour and 40 minutes to reach a fifth set. Kyrgios lost his temper again in the decider over more debatable line-calls, but in between the theatrics he finally (3), 6-1, 2-6, 6-4, 6-4 victory over came out on top.

Krishnapada banned

Krishnapada, a player of Brothers Union, was handed a one-year ban from all football competitions arranged by the Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) after the disciplinary committee found him guilty of assaulting an assistant referee during their Federation Cup match against Abahani on June 19.

Brothers Union's assistant manager Hashem Mollah was also handed a three-match stadium ban for his unruly behaviour towards the referees. Krishnaeda and Hashem were fined Tk 100,000 and Tk 20,000 respectively and were asked to pay the fine within 30 days.

Meanwhile, Rahmatganj MFS coach Kamal Babu and the club's player Faisal Ahmed were fined Tk 5,000 each for using abusive words against the referee during their Federation Cup match against Sheikh Russel KC on June 18.

Shastri quits ICC post

Former India captain and team director Ravi Shastri resigned from his post as media representative in ICC's Cricket Committee.

"I have already submitted my resignation. There are personal commitments and I have been there for six years," Shastri told PTI.

The official reason is his busy media commitments as commentator, TV expert and columnist, but there is speculation that he may have resigned as he is yet to come to terms with rejection that led to a widely publicised spat with Cricket Advisory Committee member Sourav Ganguly.
