They wore new clothes and had special food on Eid day but that did not make them feel any good at the Old Rehabilitation Centre in Gazipur.

Away from family and children, the day was like any other day of the year, said the old home's residents, many of whom were not visited by their dear ones on the special occasion.

"I cannot meet my family members even on this Eid day. This is not life," said octogenarian Tafazzal Hossain.

He came to the rehabilitation centre at Bishya Kuribari in Gazipur sadar upazila two years back after the death of his

Tafazzal badly missed his grandchildren, son, daughterin-law, daughter and relatives at the centre and so went back home in Haatpagla village of Mymensingh after three

But his destiny brought him to the old home again two months back.

Tafazzal's son Ruhul Amin, a worker of a ready-made garment factory in Gazipur, said no one was there to look after his elderly father at home, which was why he had left him at the old home.

"My sister Parul was admitted to a private clinic in Mymensingh a week before Eid. Had I taken my father home, who would have looked after him? Besides, he might have a heart attack if he got to know about Parul," Ruhul said.

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Sholakia: an attack on tradition

With the exception of four years when he was abroad, 62-year-old Ashrafuzzaman Mohabbat had offered every single Eid prayer at Sholakia Eidgah since the country was liberated in 1971. Offering Eid prayers at Sholakia, the largest Eid congregation in the coun-

try, is an integral part of the yearly plan of the businessman. On this Eid, like previous years, he offered his prayers with tens of thou-

sands of Muslims. But what he heard immediately after was beyond his wildest imagination.

First he was in denial and then stunned.

"I didn't believe when my daughter first told me about the attack," said Ashrafuzzaman, whose home is virtually on the prayer ground.

Like him, people of Kishoreganj, around 130km away from the capital, were taken aback by the brutal attack near the Eidgah that left four people dead, including two policemen, a woman and a suspected assailant.

According to locals, the first Eid congregation at the ground of Sholakia was held in 1828. Nearly 1.25 lakh (Soa lakh in Bangla) devotees had joined the Eid prayers then. The ground was then renamed "Soa Lakhi country. Math" which became Sholakia later on, locals said. The gathering of people has increased over the years. According to the

official website of Kishoreganj district, some three to four lakh people offer Eid prayers on the ground every year, making it the largest Eid congregation of Asia.

As time passed, holding the largest Eid congregation of the country became a matter of pride for the people of Kishoreganj and they have become emotionally attached to the event.

When this newspaper sought comment from M Sanaul Huq, a former inspector general of police from Kishoreganj, he first said, "It's an attack on our pride ... an attack on our tradition."

2 suspects in Mitu murder case killed

Two suspects in the Mitu murder case have been killed in a "gunfight" with police in Rangunia upazila of Chittagong. The dead are Nurul Islam alias Rashed,

27, of Islampur and Mohammad Nurunnabi alias Nabi, 28, of the upazila's Rajanagar area. However, Rashed's family alleged that

police had picked up the two last month and "cooked up the shootout story after murdering them".

Officer-in-Charge Humayun Kabir of Rangunia Police Station said acting on a tip off, the Detective Branch (DB) of Chittagong Metropolitan Police (CMP) raided Ranirhat around 3:10am on Tuesday to arrest the "killers" of Mitu, wife of SP Babul Akter.

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Kerala slaps 'fat tax' on junk food

India's peaceful tourist hotspot Kerala has become the first state in the country to impose a "fat tax" on junk food in a bid to counter rising obesity.

The state's finance minister Thomas Isaac announced a 14.5 percent tax on food including burgers, pizzas and sandwiches sold at restaurants and fast-food chains, as part of the local government's annual budget.

The government said it hopes that the move will not only generate additional revenue for the state but also deter people from consuming junk food.

"There has been an alarming trend in growth of unhealthy eating habits among Keralites and we hope the fat tax will be a deterrent," Rajan N Khobragade, the state's commissioner of commercial taxes, told The Times of India newspaper.

Police 'robot bomb' kills Dallas shooter

A suspect in the Dallas police shootings who holed himself up in a multi-story car park was killed by a police bomb after an hours-long standoff. Police sources said the

suspect had threatened to kill more police and was alternating between exchanging gunfire with officers and attempting negotiations. When negotiations

broke down, police sent in a robot armed with an explosive device. It was detonated, and the explosion killed the suspect.

The 'robot-bomb' incident may be the first lethal use of an automated device by American police, and underscores the growing role of technology in law enforcement. City police chief David

Brown told reporters Friday that officials "saw no other option but to use our bomb robot" to detonate to avoid any further danger after sniper fire killed five SEE PAGE 10 COL 4
