# Missing youths under spotlight

Police asked to collect information, make a list, then seek people's help to find them

- Unauthorised establishments in Gulshan area to be shut
- Friday Juma sermons to be monitored
- Educational institutions to inform authorities concerned if student remains absent for 10 days
- Judges requested to be more rigid in granting bail to militant suspects

The home ministry yesterday directed the Inspector General of Police to instruct all police stations across the country to collect information about missing youths, who may have been involved in religious extremism away from home.

It will make a list based on the information and publish the details and photos of those youths, seeking people's help for their arrest.

Police across the country, however, have started collecting such information upon a directive by the Police Headquarters two days ago.

Yesterday's decision came at a cabinet committee meeting on law and order in the wake of two deadly terror attacks on a Gulshan café and at Sholakia in Kishoreganj in a span of just six days.

Several of the attackers, who are from affluent families and had gone to reputed educational institutions at home and abroad, had been missing for months from their houses. It is believed that these men in their 20s took training and planned those attacks.

"We have unverified information about 60 to 70 youths who went missing," said a top official at the Police Headquarters, adding that they were trying to learn more about

Earlier on Saturday, the police HQ on its own instructed police stations across the country to send information about the missing youths.

"We have also instructed them to gather personal information of the teachers at some private universities and trustee members," he added asking not to be named.

## Confusion follows death of 2 staff

The death of two Holey Artisan Bakery staff has led to confusion, as their colleagues who were at the Gulshan eatery during the bloody siege as well as families claim the duo was not associated with the gunmen.

One of the two, Saiful Chowkidar, 34, was a pizza chef at the bakery in the diplomatic zone of Gulshan, Dhaka.

He was named as an accused in a case filed on July 4 over the terror incident.

Apart from Saiful, the five youths -- widely identified as the gunmen who stormed the bakery and held diners hostage on the night of July 1 -- were also made accused in the case. According to the case statement, Saiful died in the

commando operation launched in the morning of July 2 to end the siege. The five youths too were killed in the operation after they

butchered nine Italians, seven Japanese, one Indian and three Bangladeshis.

### Portugal stun hosts France to win Euros

Cristiano Ronaldo was stretchered off in tears but an extra-time goal by Eder saw Portugal beat hosts France 1-0 in Sunday's Euro 2016 final to win their first major tournament. The victim of a heavy

challenge by Dimitri Payet, Ronaldo went off in the first half, but returned to the touchline to see Lille striker Eder settle the game with a low 25-yard strike at Stade de France.

Twelve years after losing 1-0 to Greece as hosts of Euro 2004, Portugal inflicted the same fate on France, who were seeking a cathartic victory eight months on from the Paris attacks that left 130 people dead.

## Not blinded by anger but guided by nobility

Family of a Japanese victim wants Jica to finish what he started in Bangladesh

They suffered a loss so heavy that they may never be able to recover from it. Yet one family of a Japanese national killed by terrorists in the Gulshan café wants that the development project he was working for never fails.

"I was asked by the bereaved family to make the project a success, without fail," Japan International Cooperation Agency (Jica) President Shinichi Kitaoka told reporters while attending the funeral.

He was referring to the family of Koyo Ogasawara.

"We will continue the work while raising the security level," The Japan Times quoted him as saying.

Funerals were held in Tokyo on Friday for Hiroshi Tanaka, 80, and Koyo Ogasawara, 56, two of the seven Japanese victims of last weekend's terrorist attack. All the seven were working on a Jica project in Bangladesh. During Tanaka's funeral, attended by some 500 people,

his younger brother said in a speech that he could not accept his brother's sudden and unreasonable death, according to a participant.
