Govt asked to ensure security at courts

The Supreme Court administration has requested the government to tighten security of judges, lawyers, court officials and litigants at courts across the country in the wake of the recent terrorist attacks at Gulshan and Sholakia.

The SC authorities have discussed the security matters with the lawyers concerned and police officials and requested the government to take necessary measures to that end, SC Registrar General Syed Aminul Islam told The Daily Star yesterday.

He added Chief Justice Surendra Kumar Sinha on Tuesday held a meeting with some lawyers including Supreme Court Bar Association President Yusuf Hossain Humayun and Secretary AM Mahbub Uddin Khokon at his SC office.

Another meeting was held between the SC officials and the police officials yesterday about the security issues. The meeting held at the SC conference room was presided over by the SC registrar gen-

The registrar general said they had decided to tighten security at the residences of the judges of the Appellate Division and the High Court Division and also impose some restrictions on the movement of transports including rickshaws and motorcycles at the SC premises.

A number of scanners would also be installed at the court premises, he said, adding, the SC authorities have decided to send a letter to the local administration and lower courts to ensure sufficient security there.

Criminals hold knife to kid's throat, rob mother

Muggers yesterday robbed a mother of her jewellery, holding a knife to her 7-year-old child's throat.

Two muggers on a motor bike stopped the mother and her child at around 10:00am when the mother was returning home on foot after picking up her daughter from her school at Mominpara, a residential area in the town.

The victim, Sabina Akhter, 28, is wife of Zakir Khan. Zakir's uncle Faruq Khan described the incident saying that the robbers threatened to kill the young girl unless Sabina gave up all the valuable items on her.

The criminals left the scene within a minute after Sabina handed them a gold chain and a ring, added Faruq.

Although no one lodged any formal complaint, the police are investigating the incident and they already visited the crime scene, said Wali Ullah, officer-in-Charge of Chandpur Model Police Station.

Death toll in Italy train crash now 27

The death toll from a high speed train crash in southern Italy rose to 27 yesterday after rescuers worked through the night to try to extract bodies from the tangled wreckage and continued their search in the morning.

With Italian media focusing on the antiquated technology on the singletrack line, prosecutors have opened an investigation and Prime Minister Matteo Renzi has promised that the cause of Tuesday's accident will be

quickly identified. Rescuers were still searching for the driver of one of the trains that collided head-on while travelling down the same stretch of track linking the small towns of Corato and Andria in the southeastern Puglia region in Italy's

The driver of the other train was one of the victims. With dozens of people injured, some seriously, rescuers expected the death toll could rise

It is still unclear whether the acci dent was due to human error or a technical problem on a stretch of track where safety is dependent on telephone calls rather than computer

systems. Amid allegations that European

Union funds available to upgrade the line had been wasted, Transport Minister Graziano Delrio was to address parliament on the accident at 1100 GMT.

While Italy boasts efficient highspeed train links between its main cities of Naples, Rome, Milan and Turin, much of the country is still dependent on slow, outdated and dilapidated services, especially in the undeveloped south.

Govt to scrap allocation of Rajuk plots

The government has decided to cancel the allocation of Rajuk plots given to war criminals during the last BNP-Jamaat tenure.

The Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk) would issue a circular to this end within a very short time, said sources at the city development authority.

Housing and Public Works Minister Mosharraf Hossain disclosed the Rajuk move while talking to reporters at his office in the secretariat yesterday.

"Allocation of plots for war criminals has been cancelled. Some of these war criminals, I will not mention names, gave them [the plots] to real estate developers, who are not at fault here," he said.

He also said if any developer company made buildings on such plots, it would get its share. The rest would be confiscated by the government.

The government would review the matter if anyone purchased from the share of the war criminals. A decision on it would be taken later, he said.

Motiur Rahman Nizami, chief of Jamaat-e-Islami, a key ally of the then BNP-led coalition government, was first made the agriculture minister and then the industries minister.

Ali Ahsan Mohammad Mojaheed, secretary general of Jamaat, was made a technocrat minister and given the charge of social welfare ministry.

Both Nizami and Mojaheed, who were top leaders of Al-Badr, a notorious force mainly responsible for the killings of intellectuals at the fag end of the Liberation War, have been executed for war crimes. During the BNP-Jamaat govern-

ment, Nizami was awarded a fivekatha plot on Road-18 at Banani for his "vital contribution to the state", according to Rajuk sources.

Mojaheed received a five-katha plot on Road-10 of Sector-11 at Uttara Model Town in March, 2006.

The Rajuk allotted the plot to Mojaheed under Section 13/ka of Land Allocation Rules, 1969. According to the rules, a plot can be allotted to an eminent person, who has no accommodation in the capital, in recognition to his vital contribution to the state.

A source in Jamaat told The Daily Star yesterday that a developer company constructed two buildings on the plots given to the two Jamaat leaders.

"They [Nizami and Mojaheed] have sold all the flats [in the buildings] except two flats where their family members are living in," added the source.

May, 59 assumed office after an audience with Queen Elizabeth and drove straight to her new home of 10 Downing Street, vacated hours earlier by David Cameron, whose resignation after the vote to leave the EU brought her to power. "We will rise to the challenge. As we

leave the European Union we will forge a bold new positive role for ourselves in the world, and we will make Britain a country that works not for a privileged few, but for every one of us," she said.

Cameron stepped down after Britons rejected his entreaties to stay in the EU last month with a decision to get out that severely undermines European efforts to forge greater unity and creates economic uncertainty across the 28-nation bloc.

May must now try to limit the damage to British trade and investment as she renegotiates the country's ties with its 27 EU partners. She will also attempt to unite her divided Conservative party and a fractured nation in which many, on the evidence of the vote, feel angry with the political elite and left behind by the forces of

brilliant negotiator, is that we should try to be as close to the European Union as we can be for the benefits of trade, cooperation and of security," Cameron told parliament in his last appearance before resigning.

Appearing later in Downing Street with his wife Samantha and their three children, he delivered his parting remarks to the nation after six years dominated by the Europe question

and the aftermath of the global financial crisis. "It's not been an easy journey and of

course we've not got every decision

right," he said, "but I do believe that today our country is much stronger." In parliament, Cameron took the opportunity to trumpet his government's achievements in generating one

of the fastest growth rates among western economies, chopping the budget deficit, creating 2.5 million jobs and legalising gay marriage. Yet his legacy will be overshadowed by his failed referendum gamble,

which he had hoped would keep Britain at the heart of a reformed EU. May is seen by her supporters as a safe pair of hands to steer the country

through the disruptive Brexit process. Colleagues describe her as cautious, unflappable and intensely private. "I think around the cabinet table yesterday the feeling was that we have

our Angela Merkel," said Jeremy Hunt, health secretary in Cameron's team which met for the last time on Tuesday. "We have an incredibly tough,

FROM PAGE 16 Heavy Electricals Ltd to begin construction of the much-debated Rampal coal power plant. The project location is just 14 kilometres upstream the Sundarbans Reserve Forest, the world's largest remaining contiguous mangrove forest and a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Challenging the government's presumption that nothing harmful would happen to the Sundarbans, eminent economist Prof MM Akash said India's EXIM bank would only give loan to the project related to the country's export.

"We don't know what items will be exported by India. If we have to import coal from India, then there remains the question of coal's quality," he said. If other countries have good quality coal, why

Bangladesh would import it from India, he asked.

The government's assumption is that fly ash would be transported to a cement factory and no pollution would take place as fly ash would be initially stored in a pond, he said.

Saying that the plant is situated on a low-lying area, Akash said if the pond was submerged by flood, fly ash would spread throughout the Sundarbans and jeopardise the flora and fauna.
