Cratered roads, bumpy rides in port city

Commuters' sufferings continue

Majority of the roads in the port city have developed large craters owing to the recent rains, jeopardising vehicular movement and putting commutes in peril.

Moreover, innumerable small to large potholes developed and asphalt eroded away in many parts.

Bayezid Bostami road, CDA avenue, Arakan road, Sursion road, Sheikh Mujib road, SS Khaled road, Hazi Chan Miah Road, Katalanj road, Airport road and KB Aman Ali road are among the roads worst affected.

"It is very difficult to pull rickshaw on

these dilapidated roads," a rickshaw puller, Badsha Mia, told this correspondent on Thursday.

"I remain in constant fear thinking of when the vehicles I ride on will overturn due to the cracks and potholes," said Asik Ahmed, a commuter.

Public sufferings apart, engines of most of the vehicles get damaged as they are to regularly ply the roads, said CNG-run autorickshaw driver Mohammad Rafique, urging the authorities to repair them as soon as possible.

Subhash Barua, an urban planner, however, castigated poor quality of work in road

construction for their terrible state. Repair work of the

roods is going on so that the people can use them for the time being, said Lt Col Mohiuddin Ahamed, chief engineer of Chittagong City Corporation. It is not possible

to start the fullfledged renovation

work during the monsoon, he added. Mentioning that they could not

embark upon major renovation work as such in the last five years primarily due to a shortage of funds, the official said they hoped to start the work at the beginning of next year.

Ctg couple found dead in house

A newly married couple have been found dead in their Chandgaon house in Chittagong city on Friday night. The body of Biplab Mia Bipul, 21, was lying on the floor

while his wife Lima Akter's, 19, was hanging from the ceiling fan, said police, adding that the bodies bore no injury marks. Biplab of Gaibandha and Lima of Patiuakhali -- both RMG workers -- got married three months ago, said Chandgaon Police Station Officer-in-Charge Abu Mohammad Shahjahan Kabir.

Both of their families reside in the same area of Chittagong, said Shahjahan.

Biplab had been suffering from low blood pressure for some days and he took treatment from local quacks, the OC quoted the family members as saying.

Biplab's condition might have worsened in the afternoon and Lima was trying to recover him by pouring water on his head, he said, adding, "The hair of Biplab was wet."

"When Lima realised that Biplab was no more, she committed suicide...," the OC suspects.

The bodies were sent to Chittagong Medical College morgue for autopsies. The reason behind the deaths will be known after getting the post-mortem reports, he said.

Two unnatural death cases were filed.

AL, BNP to join House of Lords seminar on Bangladesh

Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir is leading the BNP delegation, said party sources.

AL five-member delegation is being led by Prime Minister's Political Affairs Adviser HT Imam.

EC's smart nat'l ID card project falters

The Election Commission has failed to initiate the distribution of smart national identity cards (NIDs) among citizens despite its plan to complete it by June EC officials now say the commission will

soon start the distribution of machine readable cards to replace the existing laminated ones, but there is no timeline to launch it. "We will start the distribution of smart

cards very soon, but there is no specific date," said EC Secretary Sirazul Islam.

The EC will provide the high security featured cards in Dhaka and Panchagarh or any northern district first. "It will take at least 18 months to complete the distribution work," he told the news agency.

In January 2015, a French digital security company, 'Oberthur Technologies', got the Tk 796 crore contact for production and

distribution of 90 million smart NID cards with 25 security features within 18 months.

The firm was scheduled to start the smart NID card production in September 2015 with a target to produce six million cards a month. As the commission failed to distribute

the smart cards within the stipulated time,

the IDEA project period was extended to

December 2017 from the July 2016 a few months back. A team of the World Bank, the cofinancer of the project, also reviewed its

overall progress in June last. Besides, an EC team, led by EC Secretary

Sirazul Islam, has recently visited France to gather knowledge about the production and distribution of smart cards.

The 10-digit smart cards will be distributed free under the EC's Identification System for Enhancing Access to Services (IDEA) project.

140 cops promoted to ASP

Some 140 police inspectors have been promoted to the post of assistant superintendent of police (ASP). The home ministry issued a notification signed by Deputy Secretary (Police-1) Md Ilias Ali in this regard yesterday. According to the notification, the promoted police

officers include 100 unarmed police, 22 armed police and 18 traffic police. This is for the first time such a large number of

none-cadre police officers got promotion to the rank of cadre officers. Earlier, 86 police inspectors were promoted to ASP last year.

German Resource Centre launched for teaching German language BSS, Dhaka

German Resource Centre (GRC) has been formally inaugurated to educate Bangladeshi students about German language to ensure their access to higher education in Germany.

SSBCL-Dhaka and Berlin and Germany-based EURASIA Institute for International Education (EIIE) initiated GRC. "From now on, the students will get German Language Education (A1,A2,B1) from GRC in the capital and major cities in Bangladesh, "Chairman and Managing Director of SSBCL Group Sumon Talukder told a meet the press at a hotel in the capital.

GRC Chief Executive Officer Mujtoba Ahmed Murshed and Coordinator Eberhard Sucker also addressed the meet the press.

rather it creates vindictiveness in minds. Bring the suspects to trial and give them an opportunity to return to normal life."

Addressing the programme, SHUJAN Secretary Badiul Alam Majumdar said that to neutralise radicals and prevent youths from being lured into militancy, there was no alternative to launching a massive de-radicalisation campaign.

Use of extra force is not a solution to curb extremism; rather it might compound the problem, he observed.

"When the spread of radicalism and militancy is politically motivated, it becomes a curse. Its roots run deep today despite the government's zero tolerance measures. It proves that the government's policy to fight militancy is wrong because it

is based on only use of force," he added. He said the struggle to get rid of this problem must be all-encompassing and long-term. "As it is a national problem, we have to root out the problem through discussion, debate, and argument."

Majumdar also said a strong unity among all secular and democratic forces beyond partisanship was a must.

It is dangerous to select the content of khutba centrally; local Muslims should decide it."


