



Visitors enjoy a live demonstration of pottery-making. To pay tribute to the art, Bangladesh National Museum and students of the Department of Ceramics of Rajshahi University have jointly organised an 11-day Terracotta Art Exhibition 2016 in the capital. Beginning from July 15 the exhibition will end on July 26. At the exhibition the terracotta objects are chosen to represent the artistic, religious and socio-cultural life of medieval Bengal. A total of 150 terracotta works are presented in the exhibition along with the largest of South Asia and the smallest terracotta work in the world. The exhibition has both artefacts crafted by ancient and contemporary generations.

Among those 150 artefacts, 50 of them are crafted by students of Rajshahi University. One insider shared, "We took the opportunity to craft all the tiny elements of our life on a larger scale. The concept is to portray an impression- even though terracotta art is an ancient form of art it still holds a broader vision that we can live by."

Kabali release: Chennai, Bengaluru companies declare July 22 a holiday

It happens only when superstar Rajinikanth has a film release. Several companies in Chennai and Bengaluru have declared holidays on July 22, the day 'thalaiva's' Kabali is releasing. This, after news started trickling in early Monday that employees from various companies were planning to go on mass sick leave (or simply switch off their phones) to catch the first day first show of their favourite star's film.

Companies that have issued notices to that effect include Bangalore-based Opus Waterproofing and Chennai-based Fyndus India Pvt Ltd. Some have even volunteered to provide free tickets in a bid to contain piracy.

Speaking to HT, Manoj Pushparaj of Opus Waterproofing said, "This was an internal company circulation which was sent out on Sunday. I could feel the eagerness in my employees, so instead of dealing with mass bunks and mobile switch offs, I came up with the idea of declaring a holiday on July 22 and be a part of the celebration. It would also serve as a motivation to my employees. Like Diwali bonus, we treated them to Kabali bonus."

Chitra, a business development executive with Fyndus when contacted, confirmed that July 22 had been declared a holiday.

Coldplay launches "A Head Full of Dreams" tour

Vivid colours, multiple stages, Bowie tribute and more

Coldplay opened the North American trek of its worldwide "A Head Full of Dreams" stadium farewell tour in vivid technicolor Saturday, painting the landscapes East Rutherford, New Jersey's MetLife Stadium in vibrant lights, balloons, confetti and a largerthan-life show.

Global inclusion and positivity is the central theme of the British quartet's tour, a vibe concert-goers feel immediately as they enter the stadium and are provided with LED wristbands and a button that reads "Love".

Shortly before Coldplay appeared onstage, Miriam Gauci performed a Puccini aria. A digital roadmap of every country the band has visited- South America, through Europe, England and now America -- filled the screens, accompanied by video of local fans proudly holding their respective flags and introducing the rockers in their native languages.

Coldplay began the show in spectacular fashion, launching into the track "A Head Full of Dreams" with an explosion of effects usually reserved for a concert's finale. As Martin leaped onto a constructed 50-yard runway, confetti cannons blasted the audience with a wide array of color (in a brilliant twist later, the confetti took on different forms, shaped like birds and stars) into the night as the wristbands lit up in red and fireworks blazed



into the sky. The wristband lights -- controlled by backstage wizards timing the lights to the music -- shifted for each song, predictably shining yellow for the song, "Yellow", but in other instances with varying hues.

The group's biggest hits -- from the upbeat "Every Teardrop is a Waterfall" to "Paradise", complete with the Tiesto dance remix, and plenty of opportunities to jump and dance was performed.

There were poignant moments as well, as Martin laid out the French flag on the piano in memory of the 84 people slain in Nice, France. President Barack Obama made an appearance (in spirit) with his version of "Amazing Grace", and a video of an old Muhammad Ali interview was shown on the big screen. Fallen artistes were also honoured with a cover of David Bowie's "Heroes."
