Tajuddin Ahmad's birthday today

Today is the 91st birth anniversary of Tajuddin Ahmad, the first prime minister of Bangladesh.

He was born in Dardaria village of Kapasia upazila in Gazipur, says a press release of Tajuddin Ahmad Smrity Sangsad.

One of the architects of the country's independence, Tajuddin was involved in politics from his student life. He played a key role in all the anti-communalism movements after 1947 and the Language Movement in

A key figure in formation of Awami League in 1949, Tajuddin played a significant role in forming the sixpoint demand in 1966. He became the general secretary of AL in the year.

He formed the government for Bangladesh in the most critical moment in 1971 in the absence of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman. He was also the finance and planning minister in the independent Bangladesh.

On November 3, 1975, Tajuddin Ahmad was brutally killed in jail with three other national leaders of the country.

A month-long photo exhibition on his life will begin at Gallery Twenty One on Satmasjid Road in Dhanmondi today.

Commerce Minister Tofail Ahmed and Liberation War Affairs Minister AKM Mozammel Haque will jointly inaugurate the programme at 5:00pm.

The exhibition will remain open from 11:00am to 4:00pm every day.



Reserve forest instills fear Madhupur ethnic minorities

Santu Larma criticises govt at Tangail rally for declaring 9,145 acres of the 'communities' ancestral land' as reserve forest, fears eviction

Criticising the government for publishing the gazette notification that declared the 9,145 acres of land at Arankhola Mauja in Madhupur of Tangail as a reserve forest, Parbatya Chattagram Jana Sanghati Samity leader Jyotirindra Bodhipriya Larma yesterday said the present government is not friendly towards the ethnic minority people.

Larma said this at a rally jointly organised by Garo Student Union and Madhupur Garo Society at Gaira of Tangail, where he attended as the chief guest, protesting an alleged conspiracy of evicting the ethnic minority people from Madhupur in name of a reserve forest.

"Even the peace accord signed for protecting rights of the ethnic minority people of

Chittagong Hill Tracts has not been implemented. The accord is now overlooked and neglected by the ruling force," said the Bangladesh Adivasi Forum president, popularly known as Santu Larma.

The Adivasi leader said the 30 lakh people of the ethnic minority communities in the country are now deprived and tortured in various ways. In the last 45 years, none of the governments solved their problems, he added.

The ethnic minority people will have to remain united to protect their existence, he said.

"We will have to have own leadership, own party to realise our rights. We can not be depended on any other parties to do that for us," he added.

The ethnic minority people of Madhupur said the Ministry of Environment and Forests on

February 15 declared the land in Madhupur Garh as a reserve forest under Section 20 of the Forest Act of 1927.

Following the gazette notification, fear of eviction spread among the Garo, Koch, Bormon, other ethnic minorities and Bangalee people living in the area, they said. Around 15 villages are situated in the Arankhola Mauja area, and the villagers claim that the lands where the villages are located are their ancestral property.

They said even though the gazette did not mention their eviction, but they fear that they might be evicted eventually and expressed their determination to resist the alleged conspiracy of evicting the ethnic minority people from Madhupur in name of the reserve forest at any cost.

The rally was attended by several ethnic minority leaders and rights activists.

Anti-terror khutba read out again at all mosques

'BSF shoots' Bangladeshi cattle trader dead in Rajshahi

A man was shot dead allegedly by Indian Border Security Force (BSF) at Char Kanapara border along Godagari upazila in Rajshahi yesterday.

Abul Kalam, 30, of Char Ashriadaha of Godagari was shot by BSF personnel, while he was trying to enter the Indian territory along with some others for bringing cattle, said SM Forhad Hossain, office -in-charge of Godagari police, quoting the victim's family.

Injured Kalam was brought back to Bangladesh and he succumbed to his injuries at Rajshahi Medical College Hospital around 6:00am. Quoting the inquest report, the OC said Kalam was shot in the head.

Flood situation in Kurigram worsens

Improves in Lalmonirhat; relief insufficient

Flood situation in Kurigram has worsened as the Brahmaputra and Dharla rivers con-

tinue to inundate fresh areas. Around one lakh people of over 300 villages and shoal areas of 40 unions under seven upazilas have been marooned due to downpour and onrush of water from the upstream for the last six days, reports our Kurigram correspondent.

Meanwhile, the overall flood situation in Lalmonirhat, however, has improved, according to our district correspondent.

In Kurigram, the Brahmaputra and Dharla were flowing above the danger levels at 6:00pm yesterday, said Water Development Board officials.

According to the district flood control room, at least 44,311 families have been affected by the flood till now. Besides, use of about 108 kilometres of different roads and 65 educational and religious institutions have been hampered. Crop fields of around 14,000 farmers have been damaged.

Kurigram Deputy Commissioner Khan Mohammad Nurul Amin said, "Ninety-two tonnes of rice and Tk 10.94 lakh were distributed among the flood-hit. A letter seeking 500 more tonnes of rice and Tk 10 lakh

was sent to the ministry concerned." In Lalmonirhat, the day labourers are not getting jobs, prompting them to wait for relief. "I got only 5kg of rice, some dry food items on Wednesday, but it was very insufficient for my six-member family," said farm labourer Soleman Miah, 48, of Bagdora

village in Sadar upazila. Jelal Uddin, 48, of the village, said he has been without jobs since Saturday. "Flood water is going down but we are still facing crisis." "Now we have to take loan on condi-

Aditmari upazila's Mahishkhocha Union Parishad chairman Mosaddeque Hossain said only 200 families of 2,300 badly affected ones were given relief.

District Relief and Rehabilitation Officer Idris Ali said he has already asked for more relief materials.

"After a while they started vandalising the motorbikes left by the BCL activists. When we were taking photos from distance, a group of jail police suddenly attacked us. Beating us with batons and bamboo sticks, they also snatched our cameras," alleged Anis. The other injured journalists -- HM Shahidul Islam of Focus Bangla and Mamun Hossain of Jugabheri --

were hospitalised. After the clash, Tauhidul Islam, deputy inspector general (prisons), said they were not aware of any attack on the journalists. "If any of our jail police
