Twin blasts kill 80 at Kabul Shia rally

231 wounded; IS claims responsibility

Islamic State group jihadists yesterday claimed responsibility for twin explosions that ripped through crowds of Shia Hazaras in Kabul, killing at least 80 people and wounding 231 others in their first major attack in the Afghan capital.

The bombings, apparently aimed at sowing sectarian discord in a country well known for Shia-Sunni harmony, came as thousands of Hazaras gathered to protest

over a multi-million-dollar power line.

Charred bodies and dismembered limbs littered the scene of the attack, with ambulances struggling to reach the site as authorities had overnight blocked key intersections with stacked shipping containers to control movement of the protesters.

"As a result of the attack 80 people were martyred and 231 others were wounded," the interior ministry said in a statement.

"Based on initial information, the attack

Terrorists specifically targeted foreigners dining



Magura miracle kid doing well

First birthday of the child is special for most parents, but for Magura's Suraiya and her parents it was more than a memorable occasion.

The one-year-old toddler stunned the nation last year by miraculously surviving a bullet wound she suffered while still in her mother's womb.

Suraiya's mother Nazma Khatun was hit by a bullet during a violent clash between two factions of proruling party activists in the

district on July 23, 2015. Both eight-month pregnant Nazma and the unborn baby sustained critical injuries but were saved by the doctors at Magura Sadar Hospital who conducted a two-hour caesarean operation on the injured mother.

The newborn with bullet injuries on her shoulder and right eye was immediately rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital. The nation followed her updates through media reports and was anxiously waiting for her survival. Finally on August 20, she returned home to her mother's lap.

A year later, there were no big celebrations at her parents' poor quarters on the occasion of her first birthday yesterday.

However, the doctors, police officials and district administration officials, who had acted promptly and efficiently to save the mother and the child, came
