



The inimitable FEROZA BEGUM

It's not possible to consider the evolution of Nazrul Sangeet without considering late Feroza Begum's contributions. She more or less single-handedly repopularised Nazrul Sangeet in the 1960s, when the poet's songs were not finding eager ears.

Accomplishments

For her lifelong contributions to music, Feroza Begum received many awards and honours including the Shadhinata Padak, Netaji Subhash Chandra Award, Satyajit Ray Award, Nasiruddin Gold Medal, Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy Gold Medal, Meril-Prothom Alo Lifetime Honourary Award, The Daily Star Celebrating Life Lifetime Achievement Award, D. Lit from University of Burdwan and Bongo Shomman from West Bengal State Government.

Resolution to repopularise Nazrul Sangeet

In her own words: "In 1962, HMV gave me an offer to record two songs for the Puja season. I told them that I would do it but the songs I want to record are Nazrul Sangeet. They refused but I held my ground. Eventually HMV budged and I recorded Dur Dwipobashini and Momer Putul for them. The songs were huge hits."



The city that saw her rise as an artiste

On the occasion of Nazrul's birth anniversary in 2012, the West Bengal government honoured her with the Bongo Shomman.

The realisation that she was still admired and her music was still appreciated in Kolkata, where her music career began under the guidance of Nazrul himself and composer extraordinaire Kamol Dasgupta, was overwhelming for her, the legendary singer said in an interview previously published in The Daily Star.

She also opened Nazrul Academy in Kolkata on the poet's birth

anniversary.

Never did playback Singing for movies is something she apparently could never do. She sang Adhunik, Urdu Geet, Ghazal, Thumri, even Rabindra Sangeet, but playback was something she could never agree to. This apprehension -- how her song will be used --- always deterred her, she said. My mentor and husband, Kamol Dasgupta, who was one of the most popular music directors of his time, requested her to do playback for him. This was one request from him she couldn't

oblige. Talent hunts and true talents

Here's what the artiste had to say about talent hunts and music competitions: "So many young artistes getting national exposure. Yet, truly talented singers who can demonstrate longevity of their skills are rare. The gifted artistes I know, who are ready, don't get enough opportunities to showcase their talents on a national level. I had trained many aspiring artistes when I used to run a music school at Kobi Bhaban."

86th birth anniversary of the legendary artiste

July 28 marks the 86th birth anniversary of legendary Nazrul singer Feroza Begum. Her legacy lives on. The Swadhinata Padak awardee's sons Shafin and Hamin Ahmed are pioneering musicians in their own right. Today Shafin Ahmed shares some cherished memories of his mother with The Daily Star.

Did your mother support and inspire you in shaping your musical career?

Shafin Ahmed: My mother always believed I could sing traditional songs well, and she thought that if I invested some effort in Mumbai, I would become a well-established playback singer there. But I wanted to pave my own path and she took pride in my aspiration. When I was composing Bangla songs, she listened to them carefully, and gave advice on the making of songs, choice of lyrics, singing techniques and other facets.

Both your parents were legendary figures in Bangla music; how did they react when you veered towards rock and roll?

Shafin Ahmed: Yes, both my parents were legendary names not just in classical Bangla music, but also modern songs and Nazrul Sangeet. Ma used to bring western records from India. I still remember the albums like "Tom Jones" where Ma liked the song "Green Green Grass of Home..." She also listened to Cliff Richard and bought The Beatles' "Rubber Soul" album for us. Her personal favourites were Elvis Presley and Frank Sinatra. I disturbed everyone in the house with loud music from records, instruments set up in living rooms, but even then they didn't discourage me. They probably could see something good coming of it!

What aspects of your mother's personality shaped your life and your decisions?



Shafin Ahmed: Everyone in the music arena knew about Feroza Begum's tough principles. She was highly successful, yet never made compromises. I always find so much to learn from her life which works as my inspiration. There was a lot to learn from aspects of her personality that gained great honour and respect, how she presented herself in performance and in the media. Her commitment to home, family and music was exemplary. Dedication to her chosen subject of Nazrul Sangeet could be a lesson for everyone. I know how tough she was, how she battled many adversities in life and still went on.

What are your fondest memories of your mother?


Shafin Ahmed: Some of the fondest memories would be her cooking. Her scrambled eggs, lamb chops and smoked Hilsa were incomparable. I remember our walks on London streets. I remember her cleaning my single room in London when I went for studies. She brought big packs of cashew nuts from Kolkata, which I

Any new albums on the horizon?

Shafin Ahmed: Yes, I am working on a Nazrul album, where I will sing renditions based on Nazrul's writing, my father's compositions and Feroza Begum's recordings. I am preparing to launch this in the current month. This month is the birth anniversary of both my parents Feroza Begum and Kamol Dasgupta, and amazingly, their wedding anniversary was also on July 28.

I would like to add one important point here, and that is, for anyone wanting to record songs of Kamol Dagupta's composition, be it modern songs or Nazrul songs, they should take written authorisation from their sons, for matters related to copyright laws.
