CCC suspends doctor over death of baby in womb

The authorities of Chittagong City Corporation yesterday suspended a doctor for her alleged negligence in duty during delivery of a baby at Memon Maternity Hospital under the city corporation.

The suspended is Dr Ishrat Jahan Begum, a medical officer, said Dr Selim Akter Chowdhury, chief health officer of CCC.

Moreover, the authorities formed a threemember committee to inquire into the allegation.

The committee headed by Dr Selim Muhammad Jahangir, principal of Chittagong Medical College, was asked to submit a report in three working days, said Dr Selim.

Shah Newaz, a businessman, alleged that his baby died in his wife's womb due to negligent treatment at the hospital.

"We frequently asked the doctors to go for caesarian section, if necessary but they were waiting," he said, SEE PAGE 4 COL 1

DEATH OF 'DRUG PEDDLER'

A case was filed yesterday against a suspended police official in connection with the death of a betel leaf shopkeeper at Raisdia village in Sonargaon upazila of Narayanganj on August 3.

Nurtaz Begum, wife of dead Matin, filed the case with the court of Narayanganj Judicial Magistrate Ashek Imam against Fakhrul Islam, assistant sub-inspector of Sonargaon Police Station, who is now suspended.

After taking into cognisance of the case, the court ordered the police station to submit a report on the incident by October 3, said Anwar Hossain, a lawyer for the plaintiff.

On August 3, Matin was drowned allegedly by Constable Arifur Rahman of the police station when Fakhrul and Arifur were chasing Matin to nab suspecting him of being a drug peddler. SEE PAGE 4 COL 6

Bureaucratic tangles encroaching hope

THIRD REPORT on **DHAKA CANALS**

An initiative to widening some of the city's choked up canals and digging a new one has stirred hope of giving much respite from the menace of waterlogging in some parts of the capital.

However, the initiative taken back in 2012 by Dhaka Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) is still far from being implemented due to a bureaucratic tangle over land acquisition issue, which remained unresolved over the past four years since the project's inception.

A list of 43 canals was prepared by a committee formed in 2004 to identify, recover and reopen the canals, where the committee identified 26 canals under Wasa as recoverable, says an official of Wasa.

The Wasa had earlier taken initiatives in line with a decision of the last caretaker government to recover the canals from encroachers. However, the initiatives have not yielded proper success. Besides, once the recov-

ery drive is over, many of the canals again get encroached due to lack of excavation, proper demarcation and monitoring, experts say.

On top of that, the concept of box culvert came after the 1988 flood when most of the city came under waterlogging. A high powered committee of the government, formed at that time to mitigate the problem, submitted a report in 1989. After that in the 90s the construction of the box culverts and roads on the canals started significantly.

So, land acquisition is needed for increasing the width of three canals - Hazaribagh, Baishteki-Sangbadik Colony and Manda and for digging a new canal at Kurmitola, according to Wasa officials.

Water-logging problems of the areas like parts of Dhanmondi, Hazaribagh, Mirpur-10, Kalsi, Polasnagar, Kurmitola, Motijheel, Segunbagicha, Santinagar, Kamalapur, Fakirapool and Razarbagh are expected to ease once Wasa succeeds in implementing the project, said an

official of Wasa. Managing Director of Wasa Taqsem A Khan said there are

some canals that do not have continuity that was why they had taken the land acquiring project.

He said they have already submitted a Development Project Proforma (DPP) and hoping to get the approval shortly. "If we can acquire lands for the four canals then we will be able to increase their navigability," he said.

However, another Wasa official said after the project initiation in late 2012, they first submitted a DPP to the planning commission through LGRD ministry in March 2014.

A feasibility study was completed in February last year as per the direction of the planning commission and they submitted

the DPP again in September.

Wasa is working to solve some observations related to the land acquisition and land under the Water Development Board and will submit the DPP again to the planning commission in a month since the commission had asked them to complete some queries based on their requirements, said the official.

PBI Inspector Akram Hossain Mojumder said Sabuj was among the people who tortured the boy after tying him to a tree while Haresa gave them salt to rub on his wounds.

'Raped' girl with baby seeks justice

Arrest warrant issued against accused

A preteen girl was allegedly raped four times by an influential villager, four times older that her in the capital's Badda. The victim, a student of class VI, did not have any idea of what was happening to her and has given birth to a child in April.

Her family filed a case at a Dhaka court accusing Abdul Mannan, 50, of Bamna upazila of Barguna in March. The victim along with her newborn recently came to The

Daily Star office to inform journalists about her misfortune. She said the accused started stalking her on her way to school in her village in Bamna when she was a student of class V early last year.

Mannan's youngest son was also in the same class with her, she said.

"Whenever, my mother and older sister, who are domestic helps in the village, were out of the house, he used to come to our house and often touched me inappropriately, said the 12-year-old.

When the fatherless child told her mother about this, she sent her to live with her paternal aunt at Badda.

In July last year, two months after she came to the capital, Mannan found his way into her aunt's


