





Bangladeshi greats for the first time. Born in a great multicultural city of Istanbul and an accomplished artist herself, the director of the gallery Sara Bilge Caglar's main interest has always been to capture multicultural current of Toronto and explore unity in diverse art production.

The annual summer show of the gallery this year showcasing 16 artists of nine nationalities, has been a rich harvest of diverse artistic expressions and celebration of multiculturalism. Concluded on July 23, the summer show was made rich in colour and texture with the inclusion of three

Bangladeshi artists—Tajuddin Ahmed, Syed Iqbal and Laila Sharmeen. Commenting on the show Sara said, "The inclusion of three artists from Bangladesh makes the show more interesting and colourful." She added, "Syed Iqbal has played a key role in

connecting me to Bangladesh and

its rich artistic tradition."

Though starkly different in their deliberations, the artist trio seems connected at a deeper subliminal level: they all tell personal emotions in coded symbols. And they all have found lyrical expressionism the best way to express themselves.

Tajuddin is a natural colourist. Colour for him has its own volume and texture. His canvas is a celebration of colours and how they guide the forms is an interesting experience for viewers.

For Syed Iqbal, what matters in painting is the emotions it arouses. His images are often disjoined, at times suggestive, still at other times stylised and submerged in apparently abstract compositions. Most of the time, his images reveal themselves to viewers only after close observation. He thwarts the possibility of a narrative emerging from the images.

Delicate splotches of blue, red and grey decorate the impressive yet intricate and lyrical compositions of Laila Sharmeen. Disturbed and dejected by the inequalities and incongruities of life, Sharmeen seeks her inspiration in literature and attempts to construct an ideal landscape all her own.

BIR PROTIK OUDERLAND premieres

A documentary titled, "Bir Protik Ouderland" on William AS Ouderland, the only foreign national who was bestowed with Bir Protik title for his participation in the Liberation War of Bangladesh, is off the ground. Directed by Mahbubur Rahman Babu, it has been jointly produced by P R Placid (Bangladesh) and Horiyoke Nawa (Japan), along with Channel i representative Raju Alim as the project consultant. The documentary was shot in Australia, Netherland, Germany and Bangladesh, and will premiere today (August 10) at 4pm at Liberation War Museum, Segunbagicha, Dhaka.

Information Minister Hasanul Haq Inu will be present as chief guest at the screening. Special guests at the event include Vice Chancellor of University of Dhaka Professor AAMS Arefin Siddique and Dr. A.K. Abdul Momen, former Bangladesh ambassador and permanent representative to the UN; former Bangladesh high commissioner to Australia Lt. Gen. Masud Uddin Chowdhury, BFUJ president Manzurul Ahsan Bulbul, former PSC chairman Ikram Ahmed, Liberation War Museum trustee Mufidul Haque and DIG (Special Branch) of Bangladesh Police Mahbub Hossain.

"Ouderland has contributed much to our country's Liberation War, and we feel it is our responsibility to recognise his contributions. It is also an attempt to document our history and we hope the documentary will attract worldwide attention to this soldier," said Raju Alim.



RETURN TO ROOTS

Gaudiya Nritya, a classical dance of ancient Bengal, has roots in Bangladesh. To uphold this cultural legacy, Music, Dance and Recitation Department of Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy (BSA) arranged a seminar titled "Gaudiya Nritya: Classical Dance of Bengal" along with a dance workshop.

Two seminars were held at the seminar room of National Theatre Hall of BSA on August 6 and 7. Eminent Gaudiya Nritya exponent and Nrityaguru Professor Mahua Mukherjee from India presented the keynote address at the seminars.

Hosted by dancer-choreographer Shamim Ara Nipa, noted and promising dancers -- Rahija Khanam Jhunu, Amanul Haque, Golam Mostafa Khan, Shukla Sarkar, Munmun Ahmed, Soma Momtaz, Deepa Khandaker, Farhana Chowdhury Baby, Anisul Islam Hero, Warda Rihab, Rachel Priyanka Perris, Samina Hossain Prema, Tamanna Rahman, Tabassum Ahmed, Mahfuzur Rahman, Kabirul Islam Ratan, MR Wasek, Benzir Salam, Belayet Hossain Khan, Saju Ahmed, Munira Parveen Happy and Sukomol Iftekhar -- attended the seminars. Liaquat Ali Lucky, director general of BSA presided over the

seminars. Elaborating on the backdrop of Gaudiya Nritya borne out of her 40year research into the dance form, Professor Mahua Mukherjee said, "Many don't have a clear concept of Gaudiya Nritya. Despite being our cultural heritage, the classical dance form is yet to be established. I think, regular practice, patronage and a concerted effort all around are required to revive the dance legacy of Bengal."

Starting from August 8, the Gaudiya Nritya workshop will continue till August 12 daily from 6pm to 9pm at the Rehearsal Room no. 105 of National Music and Dance Building of BSA.

Moutushi and Azad make a joint appearance again





