Russia, Turkey agree to reset strained ties

Putin, Erdogan meet in Moscow amid tension with the West

Russian President Vladimir Putin and Turkish counterpart Recep Tayyip Erdogan yesterday pledged to reinvigorate ties after their first meeting since Ankara shot down a Russian warplane last November.

Erdogan's visit to Putin's hometown of Saint Petersburg is also his first foreign trip since the failed coup against him last month that sparked a purge of opponents and cast a shadow over Turkey's relations with the West. "We lived through a very complicated moment in the relations between

our states and we very much want, and I feel our Turkish friends want, to overcome the difficulties," Putin told journalists at a joint press conference. He insisted it would take "painstaking work" and "some time" to return

to previous trade levels as Russia rolls back punishing economic sanctions against Ankara, but both sides said they wanted to restart major energy projects hit by the crisis. Erdogan said he hoped relations would become "more robust" and

stressed how important it was that Putin offered his support after the coup. "We will bring our relations back to the old level and even beyond," he said. The shooting down of a Russian fighter jet by a Turkish F-16 on the Syrian

border last November saw Putin slap sanctions on Turkey and launch a blistering war of words that dealt serious damage to burgeoning ties. But in a shock reversal late June, Putin accepted a letter from Erdogan

expressing regret over the incident as an apology.

He quickly rolled back a ban on the sale of package holidays to Turkey and signalled Moscow would end measures against Turkish food imports and construction firms.

12 get death penalty for 2 murders

A Chittagong court yesterday awarded death penalty to six people for killing Krishak League leader Oli Ullah in Chandpur in 2014.

Besides, a Gazipur court yesterday sentenced six people to death and three others to life term imprisonment for killing a schoolboy in 2001.

The six convicts in Chittagong are Md Abdul Hamid, Md Mehedi Hasan alias Shakil, Md Gourob, Md Harun Mridha, Md Abdul Kader Mridha and Nazmul Hasan alias Sharfin. The convicts were also fined Tk 5,000 each.

All six men are fugitives at the moment, reports our Chittagong correspondent.

The court also acquitted four other accused -- Md Aktar Hossain, Md Muazzem Hossain, Abu Taher and Md Jakir Hossain -- as the allegations brought against them were not proved, said court sources. Of them, Abu Taher is still in jail custody.

Spiritual help sought to reduce accidents

Sri Lanka's police sought spiritual help from Buddhist clergy Monday to bless an accident-prone highway in a country that has some of the world's most dangerous roads.

Police at Mawathagama, about 100 kilometres north-east of Colombo, directed three saffronrobed monks to bless a spot where there had been five fatal accidents in a month, a police official said.

"Traffic constables sat by the roadside while monks chanted sacred texts to bless a dangerous double bend," the official told AFP confirming reports of the unusual traffic management effort.

Sri Lanka's police deal with about seven road fatalities each day.
