# KING PHELPS RIDING INTO SUNSET

True to his word, Michael Phelps is soaking it all up in his Olympic swansong, enjoying some of the sweetest moments of his illustrious career as he turns his farewell into one long lap of honour.

He won his 20th and 21st gold medals in quick succession on Tuesday, averaging one of the rare defeats of his staggered career in winning the men's 200m butterfly at Rio, then anchoring the United States to victory in the 4x200m freestyle relay.

The crowd at the Olympic Aquatics Centre revelled in one of the last few chances to see Phelps swim, and the American egged them on, straddling the lane ropes with his arms raised in the air then planting a big made-for-TV sloppy kiss on his baby son, Boomer.

"I honestly I don't know at this very moment where that stands," Phelps said when asked how it compared to some of his other great nights in the pool.

"It's kind of been a crazy last couple days. I know that was probably one of my most challenging doubles."

"That being my very first Olympic event, to be able to win it at my fifth olympics is pretty special."

For Phelps, winning the 200 fly was one of the sweetest moments of his life. A lung-bursting event that most swimmers hate, it has always been his favorite race, but one in which he still thought he had a point to prove.

Phelps qualified for his first Olympics as a 15-year-old at Sydney in 2000 in the 200 fly. He set his first world record in the same event a year later.

He won the gold medal at Athens in 2004 and again in Beijing in 2008 but suffered a shock defeat to South Africa's Chad le Clos at London in 2012 when he misjudged his final lunge to the wall.

Phelps retired after London with 18 gold medals in his collection - twice as many as any other athlete in any sport - but his loss in the 200 fly kept eating away him and he announced a comeback for Rio, telling his life-long coach Bob Bowman the 200 fly was his priority.

## Iron Lady's 3rd in a row

Hungarian Katinka Hosszu snared her third gold medal at the Rio Olympics on Tuesday with a gut-busting win in the women's 200m individual medley final.

The 27-year-old led from start to finish in the gruelling multi-stroke event in a time of two minutes 06.58 seconds, just 0.46 outside the world record she set at last year's world championships in Russia.

Britain's Siobhan-Marie O'Connor took the silver in 2:06.88 while the bronze medal went to American Maya DiRado in 2:08.79.

Known as the "Iron Lady" of swimming, Hosszu is vying with Michael Phelps and Katie Ledecky as one of the stars of the Rio 2016 Games. She also broke the world record in the 400m medley in 2015.

400 medley in Rio and was a surprise winner of the 100m backstroke, joining an elite group of female swimmers to have won three individual gold medals at a single Olympics.

Hosszu had entered a mind-boggling five events in Rio but withdrew from the heats of 200m butterfly earlier Tuesday, leaving her with four.

If she wins her final event, the 200m backstroke, she will equal the all-time record for a female swimmer in individual events at a single Games set by East Germany's Kristin Otto in Seoul in 1988.

United States star Katie Ledecky bagged her second gold medal of the Olympic Games after powering to victory in the women's 200m freestyle.

Ledecky, who shattered the 400m freestyle world record in winning gold on Sunday, was second at the 100m mark.

but had moved into first at the final turn, holding off Sweden's Sarah Sjöström with Australia's Emma McKeon claiming bronze.

Ledecky touched in 1min 53.73sec and is two-thirds of the way to a rare treble.

She can become the first Olympian since Debbie Meyer in Mexico City in 1968 to sweep the 200m, 400m and 800m freestyles.

The 19-year-old from suburban Washington DC burst onto the international scene with her 800m free triumph in London four years ago.

But she admitted the 200m is her toughest challenge, and Tuesday's race was no exception, but she held on against a determined Sjöström - who came into the race buoyed by her own world record-setting win in the 100m butterfly on Sunday.

Sjöström, whose fly win made her the first Swedish woman to win Olympic swimming gold, was delighted with silver.

## Ashwin, Saha rescue India

Ravichandran Ashwin and Wriddhiman Saha completed centuries before India's lower order caved in and were dismissed for 353 against the West Indies on the second day of the third Test at the Darren Sammy National Stadium in St Lucia on Wednesday.

India missed the opportunity for early success when Lokesh Rahul could not hold on to a diving grip amid at second slip when Johnson edged a delivery from Mohammed Shami in the sixth over of the innings.

West Indies seemed resigned to another session of fruitless toil as Ashwin and Saha, who came together just before tea on day

one with India struggling at 126 for five, pushed their sixth wicket stand beyond the 200-run mark after lunch, reaching hundreds along the way.

Reinforcing his affection for Caribbean bowling, Ashwin reached his fourth Test century and second in three matches in the series with a six off off-spinner Roston Chase. All four of his three-figure scores in the traditional format of the game have come against the West Indies.

Saha followed shortly after in getting to the landmark, his first in Test cricket, but fell shortly after for 104. Chasing a wide delivery from Alzarri Joseph, the wicketkeeper-batsman edged a catch to his West Indian counterpart Shane Dowrich to give the debutant fast bowler his third wicket of the innings.

His 104 occupied just over five hours in which he faced 227 deliveries in an innings embellished with 13 fours. Saha's partnership with Ashwin was worth 213 runs, a new Indian record for the wicket in Tests against the West Indies.

## Armstrong completes hatrick

Veteran American Kristin Armstrong completed a remarkable Olympic cycling hat-trick by winning the women's 29.7km time-trial in Rio on Wednesday.

Just a day before she turns 43, Armstrong added to her gold medals from Beijing and London to become the first cyclist to win three Games titles in the same discipline.

In wet and windy conditions, she posted a time of 44min 26.42sec to edge out Russian Olga Zabelinskaya, who only returned from an 18-month doping suspension last year, by 5.55sec, with Olympic road race champion Anna van der Breggen of the Netherlands third at 1:13.38sec.

Armstrong hit the first time check atop the 1.3km Grumani climb after 10km with a 4.9sec lead over Elisa Longo Borghini of Italy and 6.32sec to Van der Breggen.

## NZ sweep series

Leg-spinner Ish Sodhi finished with seven wickets in the match as New Zealand wrapped up a 2-54-run victory over Zimbabwe in the second Test on Wednesday to sweep the series 2-0.

Although Zimbabwe showed some fight early on day five when nightwatchman Donald Tiripano and first-innings centurion Craig Ervine stood firm for the better part of an hour, they failed to mount so contentious umpiring decisions the hosts folded quickly.

Sodhi claimed three of the last four wickets to go down as Zimbabwe were bowled out for 132 in their second innings, to finish with match figures of 7 for 79.

## Early exit for Argentina

Crisis-struck Argentine football suffered another blow Wednesday when the two-time Olympic gold medalists were dumped out of the Rio Games at the group stages following a 1-1 draw with Honduras.

Argentina needed to win to secure a place in the last eight due to their inferior goal difference with the Hondurans after both had lost to Portugal and beat Algeria in their opening two Group D matches.

However, the Central Americans sprung a huge surprise as Antony Lorenzo's penalty 15 minutes from time put them in front in Brasilia and, despite Mauricio Martinez's equaliser deep into stoppage time, Argentina bowed out in embarrassing fashion.

The Albiceleste's chances were severely hampered by chaotic preparation for the Games.

Coach Julio Olarticoechea was put in charge just weeks before the tournament began after Gerardo Martino resigned citing power squabbles at the Argentine Football Association and clubs not releasing players for the Olympics.

Hosts Brazil hope to avoid the same fate as their eternal rivals later on Wednesday when they take on Denmark in Salvador needing to win to guarantee their place in the last eight.
