Man drowns falling from Ctg waterfall

A man drowned after falling from a waterfall in Mirsarai upazila of Chittagong yesterday.

Deceased Animesh Dey, 26, was the son of Nironjan Kumar Dey, of Oxygen area in the port city. He was a former student of Petroleum and Mining Engineering Department at Shahjalal University of Science and Technology (SUST) in Sylhet, police said.

Animesh along with his two friends went to visit the waterfall at Napitta Chhara and started bathing there. Suddenly, he fell 30-40 feet down into the bottom of the waterfall around 3:30pm, witnesses said.

Later, divers from Chittagong and a team of Mirsarai Fire Service and Civil Defence recovered the body around 7:30pm, said Imtiaz Bhuiyan, officerin-charge of Mirsarai Police Station.

Animesh completed his graduation from SUST two years ago and was preparing to go the USA for studies after obtaining a very good score in Graduate Record Examination (GRE), said his friend Sohrab Mostafa Rekon, director of GRE Centre, Chittagong.

He added that Animesh had been working part-time at his centre for the last few months.

Animesh already got into a couple of universities in the USA and was trying for a scholarship, Sohrab added. Sohrab said his friend did not

know how to swim. The body would be handed over to the family without autopsy as the family did not file any complaint, said the OC.

the tendered works." The only hike in budget from the original estimates is as a result of an increase in the scope of works as agreed by all the parties as well as some costs related to national and global inflation affecting the cost of materi-

als, he added. Under the original plan, the renovation was to take 16 months and

cost \$50 million or Tk 400 crore. The renovation, which is part of a 30-year management deal signed in February 2012 between Ruposhi Bangla's owner, the state-run Bangladesh Services Ltd, and InterContinental Hotels Group, was to start on November 1, 2014.

But due to a wide gap between the price quoted by the lowest bidder and the estimated cost, the authorities failed to wrap up the tendering process in time.

However, the issues were settled later through negotiations.

The hotel was shut on September 1, 2014, for early preparation such as asset and equipment disposal and rearrangement and transfer of employees.

InterContinental had earlier run the iconic Dhaka hotel from 1966 to 1983, after which Sheraton took over. Its contract ended in December 2008 but the government requested it to continue the operations until April 30, 2011, for the ICC Cricket World Cup.

Starwood, the parent company of Sheraton, gave Bangladesh Services Ltd a conditional extension offer in 2009, but there was a disagreement between the two sides over the renovation cost and the fate of the

employees. Eventually, Bangladesh Services took over the hotel's operations,

renaming it Ruposhi Bangla Hotel.

inaugurated the chair's display, lifting a curtain.

"As it [chair] is linked to history, it should be preserved," said TSC Director AMM Mohiuzaman Chowdhury.

The chair gathered dust as it had been uncared for a long time, he told The Daily Star.

Talking to this correspondent, the DU VC said the chair would be kept at TSC auditorium for visitors.

Addressing a discussion at the TSC auditorium earlier, he said, Bangabandhu lost his studentship on March 26 in 1949 as he demonstrated for the rights of fourth class employees of DU. He was offered a deal to get his studentship back in exchange for an apology and Tk 15 fine, but he rejected the proposal as he never compromised with injustice."

He urged all to unite against militancy and terrorism following the ideology of Bangabandhu.

Various programmes, including hoisting national flag at half-mast, milad mahfil, special prayers, and

children's art competition, were held on the campus to commemorate Bangabandhu and most of his family members who were killed on August 15 in 1975. Earlier in the day, teachers and

officials of the university, led by Arefin Siddique, placed floral wreaths at the portrait of Bangabandhu on Dhanmondi Road-32. Special prayers were also offered

after Zohr prayers at the university's central mosque and mosques of its dormitories and places of worship of other faiths. Dhaka University Journalists

Meanwhile, Jahangirnagar University observed the National Mourning Day through various programmes, including mourning procession and paying homage to Bangabandhu by placing a floral wreath at his portrait on campus.

Mourning Day. Judges, lawyers and officials of the SC and the High Court attended the programme.

Justice SK Sinha said that after the lower had delivered the verdict, the death reference of Bangabandhu murder case went to the High Court for confirmation of death sentence of the convicts, but the HC faced many hurdles.

Many dramas took place in constituting the HC bench for hearing and disposing of the case, he said.

"Then the trial proceedings were finished. I am lucky as I was a member of the bench of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in hearing the case and in giving its final judgment," Justice SK Sinha said.

The SC also gave judgment in the case filed for the killing of four national

leaders inside the Dhaka Central Jail on November 3, 1975, he added.

The chief justice said the SC scrapped the eighth amendment to the constitution, which had split the SC to make the judiciary paralysed. The apex court had also given judg-

ments cancelling the fifth and 13th amendments to the constitution, he said, adding that an appeal against the HC verdict that scrapped the 16th amendment to the constitution is pending with the Appellate Division.

The chief justice said the judiciary had always played its due role during the transitional periods of the nation and would not backtrack in future.

Trump sidesteps Clinton

Says he's running against 'the crooked media'; Republicans launch campaign in Israel to convince dual citizens

Donald Trump, clearly angered by news reports that he has grown depressed and sullen over his fading presidential prospects, has issued some of his sharpest attacks on the media.

"I am not running against Crooked Hillary Clinton," the Republican presidential candidate said in a speech late Saturday in Fairfield, Connecticut. "I'm running against the crooked media." Trump seemed particularly upset

with a New York Times article that quotes unnamed associates of his as saying that in private "his mood is often sullen and erratic." Republicans close to his campaign were quoted as saying he was "exhausted, frustrated and still bewildered" by the political process.

The real estate tycoon returned to his message on Sunday, tweeting: "My rallies are not covered properly by the media. They never discuss the real message and never show crowd size or

on the subject, he added: "It is not

enthusiasm.' Later, amid a flurry of further tweets

'freedom of the press' when newspapers and others are allowed to say and write whatever they want even if it is completely false!" Trump has complained for months

about media coverage. He has stripped a long list of news organizations -including the New York Times, BuzzFeed, Politico and The Washington Post -- of their credentials, and vowed that as president he would make it easier to sue news outlets, reports AFP.

"Trump is right that most of the media want him to lose," wrote The Wall Street Journal editorial board Sunday, noting that is "true of every Republican presidential nominee. The difference is that Mr Trump has made it so easy for the media and his opponents."

The national news outlet recommended the Republican party "write off the nominee as hopeless" if Trump fails to act more presidential by Labor Day, in which case it said Trump should "turn the nomination over to Mike Pence," the Republican candi-

The shooting appeared to be the most violent attack against local Muslim leaders in recent years, said Ibrahim Hooper, national communications director for the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR).

A report by the CAIR and the University of California at Berkeley said the number of recorded incidents in which mosques were targeted jumped to 78 in last year, the highest since 2009.

Hooper said he could recall incidents in which an imam was pushed, called names or otherwise harassed. "Things like that, but nothing of this nature, nothing where people were killed," he added. CAIR said it was offering a \$10,000

reward for information that would lead to the arrest and conviction of the shooter. The killings have been deeply unset-

tling for the neighborhood and left many worshippers grieving but also fearful. Anowar Miah, who moved to the US from Bangladesh as a child and saw

the political climate intensify, said it has gotten infinitely worse this election. "We're targets now. Our kids are growing up in this environment now --

Marzan, a "top-level militant organiser", was the "operational commander" of the Gulshan café attack.

They claimed that the Gulshan attackers were sending pictures and situation reports to Marzan from inside the café during the siege on the night of July 1.

And he sent those pictures to Tamim Chowdhury, a suspected mastermind of the café attack. The photos were published by propaganda wings of Islamic State. According to DMP's

Counterterrorism and Transnational Crime unit Chief Monirul Islam, Marzan had the overall charge of the Gulshan attack. Police also said Marzan looked after the information and technology affairs and operational issues of "New JMB",

an offshoot of Jama'atul Mujahedeen Bangladesh. A police team visited the house of Marzan in Afuria village around 8:30pm on Monday when reporters

were present. Nazim was later picked up by law enforcers for interrogation, according to his relatives and local police sources. But contacted around 10:00pm, Superintendent of Police Alamgir Kabir said that Pabna police

Second among 10 brothers and sisters, Marzan studied at a local madrasa before his admission to the villager.

Energy cooperation between Dhaka and New Delhi reached a new level in recent years. Bangladesh now imports 600 megawatt of electricity from its neighbour, with discussions to bring in more are underway. In March, India sent its first ship-

ment of diesel to Bangladesh through rail route. Pradhan said, "We have started supplying diesel... there are plans to

supply natural gas as well."

The two countries have plans to install a 135-kilometre cross-border pipeline to help Bangladesh import 10 lakh tonnes of diesel from India a year. Pradhan said he had a very fruitful

discussion on energy cooperation with Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina during his Bangladesh visit in April. Thirteen routes with a total length

of about 6,900 km of pipelines have been proposed for the purpose, reported The Economic Times. Soni said the first high-level meeting was held in Guwahati last week to

finalise the laying of the pipeline to

carry gas, LPG and diesel. The second one is scheduled in Agartala later this year. Currently, large quantities of gas are burned in India's north-eastern region because those cannot be piped to

consumers, he added.

In April last year, Numaligarh Refinery Ltd of India and Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation (BPC) agreed to form a joint venture to set up a Indo-Bangla Friendship Pipeline from NRL's Siliguri marketing terminal in West Bengal to BPC's Parbatipur petroleum product storage depot.

The BPC and Indian Oil Corporation also signed an agreement in April this year to jointly set up a

liquefied petroleum gas terminal plant in Chittagong city which will help pipe gas to India's north-eastern states. The plan to establish a gas pipeline

between Bangladesh and India was

first spelled out during Indian PM Narendra Modi's visit to Bangladesh in June last year. Pradhan said Bangladesh State Minister for Energy Nasrul Hamid

would visit India before the Bangladesh premier tours the country later this year. "Together we will create the ground for more energy cooperation so that the prime ministers of both India and

Bangladesh can ink more deals," added Pradhan. Talking to The Daily Star yesterday, Hamid said India's move to lay the pipeline was a new development in energy cooperation between the two countries. He, however, didn't give any

details. Bangladesh has been facing gas crunch for long. Amid dwindling gas reserves, the government has not given new gas connections, particularly to households, in the last six years. But demands for new connections are grow-

ing in different parts of the country. Bangladesh now produces 2,750 million cubic feet of gas per day, with a shortage of more than 500mmcfd,

according to Petrobangla. At the current pace of consumption, the country's 13.22 trillion cubic feet of proven and probable gas reserves

would last till 2030. On the other hand, Myanmar has about 10 trillion cubic feet of proven gas reserves. The country exports gas to Thailand and China, according to the

Myanmar Times. India holds at least 91 trillion cubic feet of recoverable gas reserves. On top of conventional gas reserves, India holds an estimated 63 trillion cubic feet of recoverable shale gas, according to an estimate by Quartz, a New Yorkbased business news outlet.
