Saintfiet back to start the 'real work'



Belgian coach Tom Saintfiet returned to Bangladesh yesterday morning after attending to his pregnant wife in Belgium for the last two weeks.

"I'm very happy to be back in Bangladesh. After my vacation in Belgium, I told my wife I miss Bangladesh. I was looking forward to be back and now we can start working. The real work starts now," said Saintfiet adding that he would sign the agreement with the Bangladesh Football Federation today.

The 43-year-old coach also said that he would announce a 32-member squad on Friday for the Asian Cup Qualifying play-off against Bhutan to be held on September 6 in Dhaka.

The training camp of the national football team will get underway from August 21 after the completion of the sixth round of the ongoing Bangladesh Premier League.

Fabulous four for Biles

Simone Biles bowed out of her fabulous Olympic debut in Rio with a recordequalling fourth gold, short of the record five she sought, but with her name in lights among the gymnastics greats.

"It's been a long journey, but I've enjoyed every moment," said the Texan whose early life struggles had not set her out as the future face of women's gymnastics. The 19-year-old took gold on floor on

Tuesday ahead of US teammate Amy Raisman, muscles flexed and with the steely determination she had shown on her way to the team, all-around and vault titles. The only blip standing between her and

history, a slip on the beam on the penultimate day of competition, which gave her bronze.

She is the fifth woman to win four gold at the same Games after Hungarian Agnes Keleti (1956), Soviet Larissa Latynina (1956), Czech Vera Caslavska (1968) and Romanian Ecaterina Szabo (1984).

But Biles remains unfazed.

"To walk away from your

first Olympics with five medals and four in gold, how can you be disappointed," she said. "It's exciting it's over, but kind of sad too."

Biles missed London 2012 because she was too young to compete but has dominated gymnastics in the four-year cycle since.

Her long-time coach Aimee Boorman believes the sport will never be the same after the Biles whirlwind.

"Right now I would say she's the greatest gymnast," said Boorman, who has coached Biles since she was six years old.

"She has really raised the bar. But then four years ago nobody thought they would see a Simone Biles.'

Her epic Olympic adventure has seen Biles photographed alongside Jamaican sprint star Usain Bolt and US swimming greats Michael Phelps and Katie Ledecky.

Besides that, they will also have meetings regarding our security plans with the concerned authorities."

"We have a security plan prepared. But even if they want something more, we have the permission of the government to provide that. We can fulfil whatever desires they have," added Chowdhury.

It is not the easiest thing to make a comeback into a well-tuned side that has been enjoying a period of success, and Shahriar Nafees is well aware of that reality. So he has been doing the most he can do under the circumstances in the ongoing training camp;

sharing his experiences, gaining some from his colleagues and the coaching staff that is supervising his training for the first time.

The 31-year old left-hander may have been out of international cricket for almost three years but he has followed the team's fortunes closely and is now of the opinion that the Tigers must now take their five-day game to the same heights they have achieved in ODI and T20 cricket. "We have sometimes misread one thing. From the

outside one may think that fielding in Test cricket is easy but the reality is different. If you look at the recent Pakistan-England Test series you would have seen that Pakistan might have won the series had they not dropped a few catches," said Nafees while talking to the

reporters at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur yesterday. "Fielding is very important in Test cricket and you may need to field for two and a half days so fitness is a very crucial

part. We have reached certain positions in one-day and T20 cricket but we cannot match that in our Test performances. If we want to win Tests or do well we must make sure that we are good in all three departments... we can in no way ignore it. And I think we are working in that direction," he continued.

He also said that they were now waiting for the skill training after gruelling fitness sessions over the last one month.

With a third draw, Abahani are now joint-second along with three other teams on nine points each, two behind leaders Chittagong Abahani, while Brothers are ninth with four draws from five matches.

Lankans sweep Aussies off the top

Australia lost their crown as the kings of Test cricket Wednesday after another devastating burst of spin bowling from the veteran Rangana Herath helped Sri Lanka clinch an historic series whitewash.

Set a formidable target of 324 in their second innings of the third and final Test, Australia were all out for just 160 as Herath took seven for 64 at the Sinhalese Sports Club (SSC) in Colombo.

It was the first time that the hosts had ever recorded a clean sweep of a major cricketing nation since they gained Test status in 1981.

Openers David Warner and Shaun Marsh briefly raised Australian hopes of a consolation win as they made a brisk start to their chase before their partnership was broken just before

lunch with the score on 77.

Off-spinner Dilruwan Perera's dismissal of Marsh over. Warner was Perera's second big strike. was the cue for a dramatic collapse by the Australians who lost their last nine wickets for just 60 runs.
