Bangladeshis above 65 to get 5yrs Indian multiple visas OUR CORRESPONDENT, New

India has decided to increase the duration of tourist visas from one year to five years with multiple entry facilities for Bangladeshis aged above 65 years.

The decision has been taken in pursuance of the government's stated policy for easing visa norms for promotion of tourism, said an official statement on Friday night.

Indian Missions in Bangladesh will henceforth extend this facility to the Bangladeshi applicants, it added.

This initiative will further strengthen the bilateral relationship between India and Bangladesh and intensify people-to-people contact, the statement said.

Dhaka bKash outlet looted, staff shot STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Unidentified muggers stormed into a bKash outlet and allegedly looted Tk 4 lakh after shooting a staff in the capital's Bhatara area yesterday.

Jahirul Islam Jahir, 25, an employee of Masud Enterprise at Nurer Chala Bazar, was hospitalised. Jewel Khan, brother of shop owner Selim Khan, said three armed men stormed the shop around 10:30am and opened fire, while three others were outside the shop. They snatched a handbag of a sales representative of bkash, who was at the shop

at that time, added Jewel. Later they shot Jahir in the legs and took away the money, he added.

Ensuring amicable relations between students and teachers and providing moral education can play an important part in keeping the students away from militancy, viewed guardians of private university students yesterday.

The guardians recommended the university authorities provide dormitory facilities to the students coming to the capital city from different parts of the country so that they can closely oversee them.

They made the recommendations at a views-exchange meeting held by Independent University, Bangladesh (IUB) on its campus in the capital's Bashundhara.

"Apart from offering routine courses, the teachers can also teach them moral education on militancy resistance. An academic course could be launched in this regard," opined Abdul Ali, a guardian, adding that
