Tamim, aides were asked to surrender

Says IGP Shahidul

The joint force launched an offensive against the terrorists' hideout in

Narayanganj yesterday because they had not responded to the law enforcers' request to surrender, Inspector General of Police (IGP) AKM Shahidul Hoque said yesterday.

They were given half an hour to surrender, he said, speaking as chief guest at a rally of Ulema-Mashayeks at Rajbari ground in Gazipur.

The police chief said

Tamim Ahmed Chowdhury, the alleged mastermind of the Gulshan cafe attack, and his two aides did not study in madrasas but were raised in ultra-modern culture. Those who carried out attacks in Gulshan and Sholakia grew up in ultramodern culture, he added.

Shahidul Hoque said the militants were members of a suicide squad and were armed. Because they did not surrender, the law enforcers were at death risk, he added.

The IGP said the campaign against militancy would continue for people's safety.

Craft training centre opens at Gazipur jail

Waterways workers end strike 50 injured in KMC

Waterways workers last night called off their work abstention following assurance of the authorities concerned to hike their wages.

The decision came following a tripartite meeting among the government officials, vessel owners and workers at the Department of Labour's conference room in the capital.

"I declare an end to our work abstention...and request all workers to resume their work," announced Bulbul Ahmed, convener of the Nou-Sramik Sangram Parishad, which enforced the work abstention, at around 11:30pm after the meeting.

A deadlock situation in the country's water transport sector was prevailing as waterways transport workers went on an indefinite work abstention since Tuesday to press home their 15point demand including a minimum monthly wage of Tk 10,000.

Currently, the minimum wage of a waterways worker is Tk 3,900. From now on, the minimum wage has been fixed at Tk 7,750, Bulbul told The Daily Star last night.

In the last five consecutive days, cargo handling at Chittagong and Mongla ports remained halted due to the work abstention, though some passenger vessels were operating in different terminals yesterday. Around 38 launches left the capi-

tal's Sadarghat terminal yesterday, where around 65 to 70 launches usually ply daily, said officials of the Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority.

In Chittagong, 32 mother vessels and 95 lighter vessels remained stranded at the port as unloading and transportation of goods remained halted.

The mother vessels were carrying around 7.9 tonnes of goods including wheat, sugar, soybin, salt and raw materials like cement clinker, stone and gypsum, according to the sources at Chittagong port and Water Transport Cell (WTC).

Because of the halt in cargo handling, businessmen were incurring a loss of around Tk 10 crore daily, said WTC's executive director Mahbub Rashid khan.

Transport and unloading of another 8.52 tonnes of goods from 706 lighter vessels at different ghats including Karnaphuli river, Narayanganj, Baghabari, Nagarbari and others also came to a halt, WTC sources said. In Mongla port, around 11 mother

said referring to the port officials. In Barisal, operation of passenger vessels remained almost suspended,

reports our correspondent. Usually, around 50 launches ply from Barisal headquarters to its other upazilas and to different districts including Bhola, Barguna and

Patuakhali. Taking a chance, many small boats were plying the big rivers posing risk to passengers. Around two or three launches were plying the Dhaka-Barisal route, where some five to six launches used to ply daily.

BCL infighting UNB, Khulna

At least 50 people were injured in a series of clashes between two factions of Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) at Khulna Medical College yesterday.

Police and witnesses said some supporters of a leader of the BCL college unit swooped on those of another and beat them up when they went to the college canteen, leaving 20 to 25 leaders and activists injured.

Hearing the news of the attack, others of the group first coming under attack, equipped with homemade weapons, chased the activists of their rival group around 1:00pm.

At one stage, the groups chased each other which left 15 to 20 students injured.

The BCL men also vandalised two motorcycles and the windows of different rooms of the college and hospital during the clash.

On information, police and Rapid Action Battalion members rushed in and brought the situation under control.

Of the injured, 20 students were admitted to Khulna Medical College Hospital (KMCH) from where four critically injured ones were shifted to Dhaka as their condition deteriorated.

The clash took place while the prime minister's personal secretary, Dr Namita Halder, was visiting the burn and plastic surgery unit of KMCH.

Dr Namita managed to leave the hospital under police protection.

Today is the 10th death anniversary of prominent journalist, writer and




valiant freedom fighter Sunil Banerjee. He worked at the Daily Janakantha and the Dainik Bangla during his career
