Padma poised to spoil Eid

Ferry ghats at Daulatdia devoured; travellers spend up to 10 hours to cross the swelled-up river

Eid holidaymakers en route to south and southwestern districts might have to put up with hours of delays if two out-of-service ferry landing stations at Daulatdia ferry terminal are not made operational soon.

This is feared as passengers endured lengthy delays yesterday after three out of the four ferry landing stations at the terminal remained closed due to erosion by the Padma.

However, the authorities managed to resume ferry services at a landing station around 7:00pm yesterday, just a month after it was eroded by the river.

Witnesses said at least 10-kilometre-long tailbacks were created at Daulatdia and Paturia ferry terminals since early yesterday. Hundreds of vehicles, including buses and trucks, were stranded on both sides of the river.

JnU to get new campus in Keraniganj

The government will build a new campus of Jagannath University (JnU) in Keraniganj with all modern facilities, Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid said yesterday.

The decision was made at the cabinet meeting, with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in the chair, the minister told a hurriedly called press briefing at his ministry.

"The new campus will be an addition to the current infrastructure and other resources of the university in Old Dhaka," he said, adding the new campus would have academic buildings, a library, a laboratory, an auditorium,

15% income tax on private univs illegal

Declares High Court

The High Court yesterday declared illegal the government orders that imposed 15 percent income tax on private universities and private medical, dental and engineering colleges.

The court also scrapped the three orders on the imposition of tax issued by the government on these private institutions in 2007 and 2010.

The bench of Justice Sheikh Hassan Arif and Justice Bhishmadev Chakrabortty came up with the verdict after hearing 46 separate writ petitions filed by 12 private universities and a student challenging the legality of the government orders.

The HC also directed the National Board of Revenue to refund the money collected from the writ petitioners from 2007 as income tax.

Private universities, medical, dental and engineering colleges need not to pay income tax now to the government following the HC verdict, Barrister Omar Sadat and Barrister Sakhawat Hossain, two lawyers for the writ petitioners, told The Daily Star.

Illegal fattening regime leaves many cattle with only months to live

Anwar Hossain Ratan, a farmer from Malanchi village of Pabna, bought two bulls for Tk 2.6 lakh a year ago when they weighed 3 to 3.5 maunds each.

Now, the cross-bred bulls -- one 26-month and the other 28-monthold -- weigh around 10 maunds each. Ratan expects to sell them for around Tk 6 lakh before the Eid-ul-Azha.

He claimed that he had fed the bulls with rich fodder like wheat dust, rice and oil cake regularly and administered medicines prescribed by veterinarians.
