Dhaka to work with 53 countries on marine

conservation BSS, Dhaka

Bangladesh will be working with 53 countries to promote conservation and sustainable use of the oceans, seas and marine resources for sustainable development in Asia and the Pacific.

The announcement came at the third "Our Ocean Conference", held from September 15 to 16 in Washington DC where the participating countries announced over 136 new initiatives on marine conservation and protection pledging more than \$5.24 billion, according to a US State Department press release.

"Bangladesh announced a cooperative effort among 53 countries in the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP)," the release said.

The participants reiterated their commitment to support the initiatives on marine conservation in different countries, including in Bangladesh focusing on the key ocean issues of marine protected areas, sustainable fisheries, marine pollution, and climaterelated impacts on the ocean. The US also announced that it would issue four grants totaling \$1 million to fund projects to reduce nutrient pollution in the Caribbean and marine

debris in Southeast Asia. Referring to the promoting sustainable fisheries initiative launched by Secretary John Kerry at "Our Ocean 2015" conference held in Chile, the state department said the initiative brought together 45 governments and organisations to share knowledge and better coordinate to combat illegal fishing around the world. Bangladesh is one of the partner countries of the initiative.





Dhaka lost city character

Say urban experts mainly blaming unplanned urbanisation

The capital has virtually lost its basic character as a city since shops and markets have sprung up everywhere for its unplanned expansion and development making it harder for the future planners to reshape it, said urban experts.

They observed that now anyone can set up any type of shop in the capital anywhere, including residential areas, on footpaths, lanes and by-lanes, alongside roads and in open spaces for lack of monitoring and enforcement of law, hampering public movement and causing traffic jams and creating public nuisance.

Prof Dr Sarwar Jahan of Urban

and Regional Planning at Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet) and former chairman of the University Grants Commission Prof Nazrul Islam and urban expert and architect Iqbal Habib came up with the remarks while talking to the news agency.

They said Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk), responsible for making city development plans, approving building designs and regulating the unplanned shops and markets, is unable to perform its duty properly.

They also said Dhaka's Detailed Area Plan (DAP) should be followed to ensure a planned city

instead of going for random evictions as there is plot-wise demarcation in the DAP about the type of

establishments to be set up in every city area.

"This is surprising how people are setting up shops and markets everywhere at their own sweet will when there are city authorities to control it," said Dr Sarwar Jahan.

He said the city authorities should work out plans for every residential area based on its number of population and their demands. "No one should be allowed to set up any shop and market without any approval from the city authorities."

Dr Sarwar said the city authorities can also designate some places of an area for markets and shops to ensure a planned urbanisation.

Prof Nazrul Islam said Dhaka city is one of the most unplanned cities in the world thanks to insincerity of Rajuk. He said many plans had been worked out since 1958 to build Dhaka as a planned city, but

no plan has been implemented yet.

He said Rajuk could not implement the DAP though it was taken in the 90s. "Like municipalities, city corporations should have the authority to deal with the city issues. Most of the city corporations in the world have the authority to formulate their city development plans, implement those and enforce the law."

With the Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh (Caab) investigating Friday's chopper crash that killed one person and injured four others including its pilot, the authority yesterday handed over the body of deceased Shah Alam to his family.

Mizanur Rahman, brother-in-law of Shah Alam, of Rajapur village of Satkhira, received the body, said Manas Barua, subinspector of Cox's Bazar Sadar Model Police Station.

The accident happened in Ukhia upazila of Cox's Bazar around 9:45am when the chopper of Meghna Aviation Limited was returning to Dhaka after dropping off cricketer Shakib Al Hasan at a resort

in Cox's Bazar. Asked about the media report that wind pressure, which the chopper faced as a passenger was taking video opening its door, might be the reason behind the accident, Wing Commander Chowdhury M Ziaul Kabir, director (flight safety and regulations) of Caab, said, "It could be said after the completion of the investigation."

Captain Salahuddin M Rahmatullah, head of Aircraft Accident Investigation Group, said a four-member investigation team probing into the incident will submit an initial report within a month as per rules. "We will try to get the report before the deadline," he told The

Daily Star yesterday. "Weather of the day [Friday] was fine. So, we don't think weather was a reason

behind it," said Ziaul Kabir.

No case was filed yet, Md Mainuddin, a sub-inspector of Ukhia Police Station said. The scrapped helicopter was given to the custody of Megna Aviation, he said.

HOLIDAYMAKERS RETURNING TO CAPITAL

Journey almost hassle-free except at Daulatdia, Mawa

The city dwellers have started returning to the hustle and bustle of Dhaka after celebrating Eid-ul-Azha with near and dear ones as workdays in the government offices resume today after the six-

day official holidays. Most of the travellers enjoyed hasslefree journeys more or less; except for the passengers of 21 districts of south and southwestern districts who faced unbearable sufferings at the Daulatdia and Mawa ferry ghats in Rajbari and

Madaripiur, reports our correspondents. People at the Daulatdia ghat had to wait for 10 to 11 hours due to poor management in ferry services.

Many were seen leaving their direct service buses and reached the ferry ghat braving five to six kilometres tailback. After crossing the river either by a speedboat or a launch, travellers

rode another bus to reach their respective destinations in the capital, reports our Manikganj correspondent.

Thousands of people were seen stranded at the Daulatdia ghat for hours due to overflow of buses and disruption in ferry service due to damaged landing stations at the terminal, officials of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Corporation (BIWTC) at the ghat, said.

"I reached the ghat around 2:00am and it's 1:00pm now. But we are yet to cross the ferry ghat," Shoyeb Ahmed, who works at a private company, told The Daily Star.

Shafiqul Islam, manager (commerce) of BIWTC at Daulatdia ghat, said three out of four landing stations at the terminal were in operation as

river erosion damaged the rest. "Out of the total 19 ferries, 14 are in Station and different bus terminals operation and the rest are being

repaired," said Abdus Sattar, manager

(marine) of BIWTC. He also said as there was huge pressure of vehicles, gridlock was created at the ferry ghat and several hundred vehicles got stranded for hours to cross the

Padma river since yesterday morning. On Kawrakandi-Shimulia river route, several hundred passenger vehicles stretching around three kilometres were seen waiting since yesterday noon at the Kawrakandi ghat, reports a corre-

spondent from Madaripur. A BIWTC official at the ghat said around 200 speedboats, 87 launches and 17 ferries are in operation at present which are not sufficient to meet the

huge flow of passengers. Apart from this, passengers were seen entering the capital through Sadarghat launch terminal, Kamalalpur Railway
