Zika risk on rise

Widespread presence of its carrier Aedes exposes the country to the virus

The risk of Zika infection in the country is rising with the strong presence of its transmitter, Aedes mosquito, and its outbreak in Singapore and Malaysia where some eight lakh Bangladeshis work.

The danger is more than what was conceived since 80 percent of Zika cases are asymptomatic, making it difficult for health officials to initiate checkups at ports, and also because the virus is transmitted through sexual intercourse, epidemiologists said.

At least 19 were identified as Bangladeshi among the 369 Zika-infected people in the city state of Singapore until September 18. Six other cases have been found in Malaysia, according to media reports.

Besides, Aedes mosquitoes that transmit dengue virus here are also responsible for the transmission of Zika.

Some 2,757 Dengue cases were reported in Dhaka until September 22, which is the highest during this time since 2007, according to the Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research (IEDCR).

Medical experts earlier said it was mostly the South American countries like Brazil that had cases of Zika, and so Bangladesh had little risk with thin traffic from the region to Bangladesh.

Now that the Asian countries having large numbers of Bangladeshi migrants face Zika outbreaks, some of them are much likely to carry the virus home, they said.

Bangladesh, US officials to meet on October 2

The US and Bangladesh officials are going to discuss enhancing collaboration in countering extremism and terrorism and cooperation in defence in Dhaka on October 2.

The government and military officials of both the countries are having the meeting following the July 1 terror attack that left 22 people, including 17 foreigners, killed in Gulshan.

This will be the fifth dialogue on security issues between Dhaka and Washington.

More than a dozen of US officials from the US Department of State, US Defence. Homeland Security, the Bureau of Political-Military Affairs and other agencies are likely to attend the daylong dialogue.

They would expect updates on the US proposals on countering violent extremism placed after the killing of US embassy's locally hired staff Xulhaz Mannan on April 25 and the July 1 killings at Holey Artisan Bakery.

UNSC meets again as Aleppo bleeds on

Death toll mounts as US, Russia wage war of words; France, Britain decry war crimes

The United States accused Russia of "barbarism" in Syria yesterday as warplanes supporting Syrian government forces pounded Aleppo and Moscow said ending the civil war was almost "impossible".

A diplomatic solution to the fighting looked unlikely as US and Russian diplomats disagreed at a UN Security Council meeting called to discuss the violence, which has escalated since a ceasefire collapsed last week.

Rebels, who are battling President Bashar al-Assad's forces for control of Aleppo, said any peace process would be futile unless the "scorched earth bombing" stopped immediately.

Britain, France and the United States called the emergency meeting to turn up pressure on Russia and press demands that it rein in its ally Syria to halt the intense bombing campaign on Aleppo.

Residents and a monitor reported heavy air raids overnight and early yesterday on the besieged east of the city, which Syria's army has pledged to retake. US Ambassador Samantha Power said more than 150 air strikes had hit the city over the past 72 hours. She accused Russia and Syria of launching an "all-out offensive" to re-take Aleppo.

At least 115 people, mostly civilians, have been killed in Syrian and Russian bombardment of eastern Aleppo since the army on Thursday announced an operation to take it, the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said.

The monitor said at least 19 children were among those killed in the assault, which has included missile strikes, barrel bomb attacks and artillery fire.

Capturing the rebel-held half of Syria's largest city, where more than 250,000 civilians are trapped, would be the biggest victory of the civil war for Assad's forces.

Giant telescope starts search for alien life



The world's largest radio telescope began operating in southwestern China yesterday, a project Beijing says will help humanity search for alien life.

The Five-hundred-metre Aperture Spherical Radio Telescope (FAST), nestled between hills in the mountainous region of Guizhou, began working around noon, the official Xinhua news agency reported.

Built at a cost of 1.2 billion yuan (\$180 million), the telescope dwarfs the Arecibo Observatory in Puerto Rico as the world's largest single-dish radio telescope, with twice the sensitivity and a reflector as SEE PAGE 11 COL 4

Police capture Turkish-born gunman

Authorities have arrested a Turkish-born man suspected of shooting five people dead, including a teenaged cancer survivor, at a shopping mall in the US state of Washington. Police named the suspect

as Arcan Cetin, a 20-year-old resident of the nearby town of Oak Harbor, saying he was arrested late Saturday about 24 hours after the killings. The FBI office in Seattle

said it had no evidence the shooting was terror-related. The gunman opened fire

with a rifle in the makeup section of a Macy's department store late Friday, killing four women and a man, according to police. He later left the store on foot, triggering an intense manhunt. A weapon was recovered

at the scene of the violence, Cascade Mall in Burlington, a town of about 8,000 people some 70 miles north of Seattle. Police are still trying to

establish a motive.

The youngest victim was named as Sarai Lara, 16, who survived cancer as a young girl. Relatives named another victim as 52-yearold Shayla Martin, who worked as a Macy's makeup artist.
