BGB to raise fencing issue

Bangladesh's permission must for fencing within 150 yards

Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB) will raise the issue of India's decision made in July to shift the fence along the border to the zero line in the upcoming meeting of border security forces of the two neighbouring countries.

The meeting to be held from September 30 to October 5 in New Delhi is scheduled to discuss development works within 150 yards of the International Border and violation in the construction design of Single Row Fencing, according to the agenda.

If the Indian authority wants to erect fences within 150 yard of the border, it has to seek permission from Bangladesh, said a top official of the home ministry.

When Bangladesh gave permission to India, it put up a condition that only single row fencing would be allowed, he said, "But sometimes India violates the condition and we will raise the issue at the meeting," he told The Daily Star wishing anonymity.

Indian's decision to shift fences towards Bangladesh will also be discussed at the director-general-level meeting, the ministry official said.

Bangladesh will oppose such a move, said home ministry

Earlier on July 12, the Indian home ministry had made the decision for what it said was to enhance security and mitigate the problems of bordering Indian villages.

Bangladesh will stride into their second one-day international against Afghanistan at Mirpur today with a few things to iron out and a milestone to reach.

While a victory will enable the Tigers to carry on the magnificent home run to their sixth consecutive series success, this particular match that starts at 2.30pm however bears special significance as far as Bangladesh's one-day history is concerned. It will be their 314th ODI and if they win it will be their 100th victory in the 50-over-contest.

But after their seven-run win in the first ODI of the three-match series against Afghanistan on Sunday, which marked the return of the Tigers to international one-day assignments after a gap of ten months, the focus of Mashrafe Bin Mortaza's side was to correct those mistakes they had committed the other day, when they eked out a nervy win from the jaws of defeat against a feisty Afghanistan.

37,000 die from air pollution a year

WHO study says about Bangladesh

Over 37,000 Bangladeshis die annually from diseases related to air pollution, said World Health Organization.

Stroke and ischemic heart diseases are the major factors in the deaths, nearly 21,000, while acute lower respiratory infection, chronic obstructive pulmonary disorder and lung cancer contribute to the rest of the deaths, the UN agency said in a statement yesterday.

The average age of death is 38 years.

The figure for Bangladesh is the third highest in the WHO's Southeast Asian prises 11 Asian countries.

With more than 6.21 lakh deaths, India each year. tops the list in the region, followed by

Indonesia with over 61,000 deaths.

"Air pollution is the world's bigges environmental risk to health and must be addressed on a priority basis as it continues to rise," said Poonam Khetrapal Singh, regional director for WHO South-East Asia.

"The magnitude of the health impact of air

pollution calls for urgent action to prevent these avoidable risks and deaths," she said. The WHO issued the statement after

releasing a report titled "Ambient Air Pollution: A Global Assessment of Exposure and Burden of Disease".

Slum girl dies as dilapidated house crumbles

A teenage girl was killed and a minor boy injured as an adjacent abandoned building partially collapsed early yesterday on their tinroofed shanty in the capital's Shah Ali area of Mirpur.

The deceased is ninthgrader Kulsum Akter Nishi, 16, daughter of late Harunur Rashid from Sherpur while the injured is her nine-year-old nephew Raihan.

Nishi's mother Anwara Begum, sleeping across in the partitioned room, escaped unhurt. Nishi's elder brother Ismail Hossain, father of injured Raihan, was away on night shift work at a garment factory at the time of the incident.

Fire Service and Civil Defence personnel reached the scene within a short time, pulled the two victims out of the rubble and sent them to a hospital nearby. Kulsum was pronounced

dead there while Raihan was given treatment for minor injuries, said Anwar Hossain, officer-in-charge of Shah Ali Police Station. A portion of the aban-

World's first baby born from 3-parent technique

The world's first baby has been born thanks to a controversial new technique employed by US scientists to include DNA from three parents in the embryo, said a report yesterday. The baby boy was born five months ago in

Mexico to Jordanian parents, and is healthy and doing well, said the report in New Scientist magazine, described as an "exclusive."

The boy's mother carried genes for a disorder known as Leigh Syndrome, a fatal nervous system disorder which she had passed on to her two previous children who both died of the disease. She had also suffered four miscarriages.
