Blaze at Benapole land port

Huge quantity of goods, several trucks gutted

A fire that broke out at a shed of Benapole land port in Jessore was brought under control after six hours of frantic efforts yesterday morning.

Thirteen fire fighting units including one from India rushed to the spot and doused the fire around 10:00am, said Parimal Kundu, assistant director of Jessore Fire Service and Civil Defence.

One of the fire fighters was given primary treatment for minor injuries, he added.

Nearly Tk 100 crore worth of goods inside shed 23 as well as several Indian trucks were damaged in the fire, claimed Mafijur Rahman Sajon, president of Benapole C&F Agents' Association.

Nitai Chandra Sen, director of Benapole land port, told this correspondent that the fire originated from an electric short circuit inside shed 23 of the port around 4:00am yesterday.

Shipping Minister Sajahan Khan,

Sheikh Afil Uddin MP of Jessore-1, Jessore Deputy Commissioner Humayun Kabir and Benapole Customs Commissioner Shawkat Hossain visited the spot.

A three-member committee has been formed by shipping ministry with Joint Secretary Shihab Uddin as its chief.

Benapole port authority has formed a five-member committee, headed by Abdul Jalil, assistant director (opera-Additional Commissioner Firoj

Uddin of Benapole customs has been made head of a five-member committee formed by Bangladesh Customs authority.

All the probe committees will have to submit their reports within ten working days.

Police last night released the youth who had entered the Sher-e-Bangla National Cricket Stadium ground

during the third and final ODI between Bangladesh and Afghanistan on Saturday. The youth, Mehedi Hasan,

claimed himself to be a fan of Bangladesh skipper Mashrafe Bin Mortaza, police said. "We released Mehedi Hasan after

taking an undertaking from him around 9:00pm," said Bhuiyan Mahbub Hasan, officer-in-charge of Mirpur Model Police Station.

Police sources said Mehedi gave the undertaking that he would never repeat what he did on Saturday.

Following repeated interrogation, police came to know that the youth entered the ground simply out of "curiosity", said police.

Three friends of Mehedi who had also gone to the stadium that day

were quizzed as well. Police were trying to figure out how Mehedi entered the ground and who was responsible for the

security loophole. Around the 30th over of the match, Mehedi hogged the spotlight when he ran onto the playing surface from the VVIP stands appar-

ently to embrace Mortaza. He was eventually whisked off the ground by the security personnel after big voluntary hug from the Bangladesh skipper.

Two workers killed in city wall collapse

Two construction workers were killed and another was injured when a portion of a boundary wall collapsed on them in the capital's Gulshan yesterday.

The dead are Shamsul Arefin, 28, of Chandpur, and Ariful Islam, 18, of Netrakona, said police.

The identity of the injured who was sent to the National Institute of Traumatology and Orthopaedic Rehabilitaion (Nitor), popularly known as Pongu Hospital, could not be known immediately, added police.

Shamsul and Ariful along with the injured were knocking down a boundary wall of a house at Kalachandpur, opposite to Jamuna

Mohammad Selim, is in the process of buying 1,500 acres of land while another person Sultan Ahmed Mridha, husband of Patuakhali lawmaker Luthfunnessa, has bought 500 acres in Kalapara, said people concerned.

All these have created tension among locals and complicated resettlement. The locals do believe that establishment of the port would create a lot of economic activities and provide them with jobs and higher income.

"Well, the port will bring us fortune because of establishments of mills and factories. But it will not be good if we lose our homes due to land acquisition," said 25-year-old Mohammad Masum.

However, Akkash Ali Mridha, a landless labourer was rather upbeat.

"We will work regularly for the port and will no longer need to go to Dhaka for income," he said.

Monowara Begum, 65, was worried. "These pieces of land have fed us for a long time. How shall we survive if they take away our land," said Monowara standing a few hundred yards away from the area developed by the PPA. It was when the prime minister inaugu-

rated official operation of the port on August 13.

There is a concern whether locals sands of new jobs. will get fair prices for their land to be acquired.

During the video conference to inaugurate the port, Humayun Kabir, chairman of Baliapara union under Kalapara, urged Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina to pay higher prices for the land to be acquired by the government.

Hasina assured him that the demand would be considered.

The PPA officials and locals said the main port, to be built on the west bank of Rabnabad channel, was yet to be set

ing land to build the required infrastructure such as terminals and other facilities in the vicinity. Around the port, according to the government plans, will also be an

exclusive economic zone, development of a tourism zone centring the beach town Kuakata (near the port), and an airport, which is expected to then. bring a new lease of life to the south.

The government expects that it will be possible to create facilities for establishing garment factories, pharmaceuticals, cement, fish process-

ing zone and shipbuilding yards, near the new port and thus generate thou-

Because of the greater depth than that Chittagong and Mongla ports, the new port will allow bigger ships to come through, enabling users to do overseas trade at costs lower than that of Chittagong and Mongla.

However, little visible work has been seen on the ground.

So far, the PPA has acquired 16 acres of land and established its office to facilitate shipments. It has also awarded contract to build a warehouse and a five-storey administrative building on the land. The PPA is in the process of acquir-

As land acquisition is yet to be com plete, it may take several years to build adequate infrastructure for loading and unloading goods from ships, construct a 14km dual carriageway including a bridge to connect the port to the Patuakhali-Kuakata highway. Users would have to rely on waterways to transport goods from the port until

PPA Chairman Saidur said they were at the final stage of the start of land acquisition and building port infrastructure. "We expect to start construction work next year," he said.

duo was taken on a fresh remand on August 13 as police claimed to have gleaned vital information during the previous remand.

This time, the court placed Tahmid on a six-day remand against a police prayer for seven days' while Hasnat was placed on an eight-day remand. In the remand prayer for Tahmid,

Inspector Humayun Kabir said, "He has given vital information about the incident and he needs to be remanded for seven days for interrogation." While Tahmid and Hasnat were

on the first-round remand, some media outlets published several photos of Hasnat and Tahmid with one of the Gulshan attackers, apparently Rohan Imtiaz. In the photographs, "collected from unknown sources", the trio was

seen on the rooftop of the bakery. Tahmid was seen holding a small firearm.

On July 1, five militants stormed

and held diners hostage at gunpoint.

the Holey Artisan Bakery of Gulshan

They murdered 20 hostages -nine Italian, seven Japanese, two Bangladeshis, one Indian and one Bangladesh-born US citizen -- and two police officers who tried to end the standoff soon after it began around 8:40pm.

Tahmid had gone to the restaurant with two female students of a private university.

Hasnat had gone there with his wife and two children for celebrating the birthday of one of his daughters, family members said.

Tahmid and Hasnat were taken in by detectives for interrogation immediately after the bloody siege ended on July 1.

Before August 4, when they were produced in a court for the first time, police kept claiming they had released Hasnat and Tahmid after questioning, but the families insisted that the two never returned home and could not be reached by any means.

successfully holding the summit with participation of all member states," the statement said, adding, "As the current chair of Saarc, Nepal underscores the need for creating a conducive regional environment for the Saarc Summit."

The country's formal announcement came in the wake of six Saarc member states expressing their unwillingness to take part in the summit citing almost identical reason of increasing cross-border terrorist attacks and growing interferences in the internal affairs of member states by one country.

"Nepal strongly believes that an environment of peace and stability is essential for a meaningful regional cooperation," it said.

"Nepal unequivocally condemns terrorism in all its forms and manifestations and expresses its solidarity in the global fight against terrorism.

"Nepal has always condemned all acts of terrorism in our own region. Most recently, Nepal has condemned the terrorist attack on an Indian army base in Uri, Kashmir on September 18,

2016 that resulted in the loss of life of

Indian soldiers." Diplomatic sources have said leaders from most of the Saarc countries will be in Goa, India for the outreach Summit of the Bay of Bengal Initiative for Multi-Sectoral Technical and

Economic Cooperation (Bimstec). Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi on October 16 will meet Bimstec leaders -- Prime Ministers Sheikh Hasina, Sri Lankan President Maithripala Sirisena, Nepalese Prime Minister Pushpa Kamal Dahal Prachanda, Thailand's Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha, Bhutanese Prime Minister Tshering Tobgay and Myanmar's Foreign Minister Aung San

Drives against catching, selling, hoarding and transportation of hilsa would be conducted at fishery ghats, fish markets, bazars and chain shops across the country, the note said.

The fisheries and livestock ministry, department of fisheries, navy, air force, coastguard, police, river police, Border Guard Bangladesh and district administrations will work together to make the government decision successful, it added.

The decisions were taken at a meeting at conference room of the fisheries and livestock ministry yesterday. Fisheries and Livestock Minister Sayedul Hoque chaired the meeting. Earlier, Anisur Rahman, chief

scientific officer at Bangladesh Fisheries Research Institute in Chandpur, said the annual ban, usually 15 days long, was extended this year for ensuring safe spawning of hilsa during its peak breeding season.

The ban was extended as researchers found that spawning hilsas were caught before and after the 15-day

swimming upstream from the sea towards the rivers, weeks before the full moon in October (Ashwin in Bengali calendar), and they return to the sea after spawning, he added.

The government has been imposing fishing bans since 2003-04 to protect hilsa spawning.

The catch of hilsa rose significantly this year due to the successful implementation of ban over the last couple of years, said a fisheries officer in Chandpur.
