

Nicholas Hoult to play Tesla

Nicholas Hoult is in negotiations to play Nikolai Tesla in the Weinstein Co.'s "The Current War".

Benedict Cumberbatch is already on board to play Thomas Edison and Michael Shannon will portray George Westinghouse. "Me and Earl and the Dying Girl" director Alfonso Gomez-Rejon will helm the film.

The movie takes place in the late 1880s and revolves around power titans Edison and Westinghouse's battle over the supply of electricity. Edison championed the use of a




direct current for electric power distribution over an alternating current, which was backed by several European companies and Westinghouse Electric.

The movie is one of two centered on this rivalry. Black Bear Pictures is developing "The Last Days of Night" starring Eddie Redmayne as the lawyer caught in the middle of the patent battle that ensued following Edison's

discovery of the electrical current. TWC will finance and distribute the film.

Hoult recently wrapped "Sand Castle" and also finished production on the JD Salinger biopic "Rebel in the Rye".

EMON MAKES BIG STRIDES

Young Bangladeshi filmmaker Abu Shahed Emon, who created quite a buzz in the film festival circuit of the region with his directorial debut "Jalal'er Golpo", has scored a big support from the India's National Film Development Corporation (NFDC) for his upcoming project.

Emon's upcoming film "Opodartho" has been selected in this year's highly competitive NFDC Film Bazaar for coproduction. The film (which was in pipeline even before "Jalal'er Golpo") under its previous working title "Ekjon Police er Golpo", had received funds at the Asian Cinema Fund of the 2011 Busan Film Festival for script development. That same year, it won best pitch at the Göteborg Film Festival, Sweden and best pitch next year at China's Beijing Film Festival 2012. The film also participated in the 'Labs' section of this



year's Locarno Film Festival Open Doors programme.

Mostofa Sarwar Farooki, an ardent supporter of Emon, is producing the film. In a Facebook post, Farooki said he became a fan of the story the first time he heard it, adding that this is his first involvement as a producer in someone else's film.

The NFDC Film Bazaar, in recent years, has produced critically-acclaimed films like "The Lunchbox", "Titli" and

"Masaan" (all from India). This year, the film selected 18 films, of which there is a second film from Bangladesh. Titled "Nonajoler Kabbo", it is directed by Rezwan Shahriar Sumit and produced by Gigi Dement and Laboratory NYC. Most of the other films are from India, although a film from Nepal, a Chinese-Dutch co-production and two jointlyproduced Indian films - one with Sweden and another with Canada, are on the list.

Abu Shahed Emon's directorial debut "Jalal'er Golpo" was Bangladsh's official selection for the foreign language film in the Oscars in 2014, and won a host of awards - including the Avanca International Film Festival (Portugal), SAARC Film Festival in Sri Lanka, Kerala International Film Festival (India) and Jaipur International Film Festival (India), aside from screening in a number of other festivals.

learns local dialect for "Halda"

An actor has to pick up many skills to be convincing in their roles. Tisha has gone that extra mile by learning the local dialect of Chittagong for her role in film "Halda".

This is a first such experience for Tisha. Though a daunting prospect, she tackles the challenge head on. "It's an actor's job to face challenges, and I am trying my best to do just that," said the actor.

For "Halda", Tisha plays a character named Hashu, who hails from a poor village. Her house is located on the Halda riverbanks, and she is eventually married to a powerful man from a different district.

Tisha is training for her character's dialogues with Shakhawat Shiblee, the dialect consultant for the film. "Initially the local dialect seemed very difficult to master," said Tisha, "but eventually I began to see the beauty of the language and also enjoy how it is transforming me for my



role. Off the sets, my co-stars and I often engage in playful banter using the dialect."

The actor has also turned to methodical groundwork to fit into her character's shoes. Playing a village girl, Tisha is often seen clad in simple garments suited for her character. "Hashu comes from a family of fishermen, and so I have been integrating myself completely into her life."

said Tisha. About her experiences on the banks of Halda, the actor replied, "We are always busy shooting, which has enabled us to spend time in various spots. Sometimes we are on the bank, sometimes we are at someone's house, and we have also shot scenes on a boat in the river. I have come to know Halda intimately, through

the filming." The actor has also been busying herself in getting to know the locals, and said, "The locals have showered us with love. I am taking selfies, giving autographs, and storing memories with each person I come across. Meeting new people and gathering new memories along

the way is what I love most about my job." The actor also added, "This is a novel story with an excellent director and talented cast members as its backbone. I look forward to its release so that the audience can enjoy it as well."


"Proborton" is the first album released globally by ArtsistSpread, a digital distributing platform for Bangladeshi music.

RANI MUKERJI to make Bollywood comeback?

Rani Mukerji is ready to emerge out of her long hiatus from acting and has signed on for her next, an untitled film helmed by Siddharth P Malhotra (who directed 2010's "We Are Family"), reports Bollywood Life web site.

The film marks Rani's return two years after Pradeep Sarkar's "Mardaani". As the site quoted a source close to the development, "Rani plays the central lead in Siddharth's film. Like 'Mardaani', this one too will deal with a strong social issue. He narrated the script to Adi (Aditya Chopra, Rani's husband and film producer) first and then Rani. They both loved it and Adi will produce the film. Siddharth, Adi and Rani have been meeting and

working out the project regarding dates and other stuff."

"Since her baby Adira's birth, Rani has become a full-time, hands-on mother, completely immersed in caring for her child, but in December, Adira will be a year old and the actress will find time to work by then. It took time to convince her to act again, but Adi heard the script and felt it would be perfect for her, after 'Mardaani'," the report states.

The film is set to begin rolling in the middle or later half of next year.
