Rab-cop tension reaches its peak to death

The Rapid Action Battalion has complained to the home ministry of police excesses against its members, saying the prevailing situation is so tense that it might go out of hand anytime soon.

It has alleged that police on several occasions assaulted Rab personnel even after knowing the identities of the elite force members.

"In some cases, police hit Rab members with sticks and even rifles," reads a letter from Rab Director General Benazir Ahmed to Senior Home Secretary Mozammel Haque Khan. A list of six such incidents was attached with the letter,

dated September 27.

Benazir Ahmed, himself a top police official, requested the senior home secretary to take action against the persons at fault and other necessary steps to avoid any unwarranted incident.

The letter, a copy of which has been obtained by The Daily Star, reads that the Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) is an independent elite force under Bangladesh Police.


Two alleged robbers were beaten to death by villagers in Laxmipur and Jhalakathi districts early yesterday.

England thrive on hosts' poor batting display to win one-day series opener

What could have been one of the most memorable chases in Bangladesh's cricketing history turned out to be one of their most miserable defeats.

Miserable not because of the margin of the loss, but because of the immense opportunity that the hosts let go at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in

Mirpur yesterday. Looking back at the 21-run loss in the first ODI against England, the Bangladeshi team management will ponder upon a number of moments in the game. The three dropped catches, the brilliant catch at the boundary from David Willey that



dismissed the in-form Sabbir Rahman or even Mosharraf Hossain's poor day on the field, but the one phase that may go on to haunt them for quite some time is the last 10 overs of

the game -- a period which saw the hosts lose their last six wickets for

just 17 runs. Riding on Ben Stokes's maiden century and brilliant half-centuries from debutant Ben Duckett and stand-in captain Jos Buttler, the visitors posted 309 for eight
