Designed to be a game changer?

Building new Silk Road trade routes -- an ambitious project masterminded by Chinese President Xi Jinping -- appears a game changer in South Asia's regional politics.

During his landmark visit, Dhaka agreed to give full support to his initiative. Earlier, Pakistan, Sri Lanka and the Maldives, three Saarc members, agreed to the plan.

In 2014-15, the Chinese leader visited India and the three countries, and China inked deals worth billions of dollars for development projects in those countries. At the time, Beijing signed deals worth \$46 billion with Pakistan, \$20 billion with India, \$1.4 billion with Sri Lanka and worth \$500 million with the Maldives.

India, however, still remains hesitant about joining the bandwagon as many of its policymakers think that China wants to increase its influence in the region through this initiative.

"A rising China has steadily used its economic and military clout to woo Indian's neighbours and incorporate them in its ambitious One Belt, One Road project," said Pinak Ranjan Chakroborty, a former Indian diplomat. Pinak, a distinguished fellow of Delhi-based think-tank

Tiny plastic, huge risk

Study finds new polluter in personal care products

After a day out in the dirt and dust, you might want to use a face wash to clean up but such cleansing products are dirtying up the environment. And the culprits are tiny plastic beads in the products known as microbeads. Microbeads are non-biodegradable, cheap tiny

plastic particles, that pose serious threat to the environment, and human and animal health, experts

A study, titled "Microbeads Pollution Scenario in Bangladesh", published yesterday, says the particles might have revolutionised your home beauty care, but they have that dark side.

Environment and Social Development Organisation (ESDO), a body working on environment and development, conducted the study which says 60 most popular and commonly used beauty and cleaning products in Bangladesh, including face wash, detergent, body wash, nail polish, toothpaste, and face and body scrub contain these harmful microbeads.

Every month, around 8,000 billion microbeads flow to the water bodies in and around three major cities -- Dhaka, Chittagong and Sylhet, according to



the study.

In Dhaka city alone, approximately 7,000 billion microbeads get in the surrounding water bodies and wastelands. In Chittagong city, the number is some 1,000 billion while it is around 200 billion in Sylhet

The particles flow through the sewers and make their way into canals and rivers and finally reach the seas and oceans, where they contribute to the so called Plastic Soup.

This washed-down plastics fragment into smaller particles, polluting ocean water at many places giving rise to the term plastic soup. In addition,

Tragedy at DMCH

Pregnant woman among 4 killed as ambulance runs them over on the hospital premises

Four people, including a pregnant woman, were killed and three others injured when an ambulance ran them over inside Dhaka Medical College Hospital yesterday.

Three of the deceased were identified as Gulenur Begum, 26, her son Shakib, 7 and six-month pregnant Amena Begum, 28. The fourth victim, a beggar aged about 60, could not be identified.

Doctors performed a caesarean on Amena around noon but could not save the baby. She too died of her injuries in the evening, hospital sources said.

The injured are Amena's eight-year-old son Sajib, Gulenur's six-month-old son Akash, and Ramzan Ali, 40.

Police seized the ambulance and detained its driver Sohag and his assistant Sohel Mia.

According to hospital sources, a hospital staff and his relative are the owners of the ambulance. Sohel was behind the wheel when the incident occurred

near the hospital's emergency gate around 9:15am, police and witnesses said. The ambulance had been hired to carry a corpse from the

emergency unit of the hospital. Sohag asked Sohel to take the vehicle in front of the unit, they added. "Instead of hitting the brakes, he [Sohel] accelerated while entering the hospital's premises," Shahbagh Police

Station's Sub-inspector Mahfuzur Rahman quoted the

detainees as saying. Shakib and the beggar died on the spot.

Amena's son Sajib, who suffered a fracture in his left leg, said his father Zakir Hossain suffered injuries in a road accident a few months ago and was undergoing treatment at the hospital. He and his mother were taking care of Zakir.
