Sundarbans risks

FROM PAGE 1 sent a 63-page letter to M Shahidul Islam, permanent representative of Bangladesh to the Unesco.

Contacted, Nasrul Hamid, state minister for power, energy and mineral resources, yesterday told The Daily Star, "They [Unesco] did not include our reply in their report. They have prepared the report from their own point of view."

Asked whether the government would change its decision to implement the project at Rampal which is barely 14 kilometres off the forest, he said the construction work of the power plant has already

"We are going to use the ultrasupercritical technologies at the Rampal power plant. It is not going to harm the Sundarbans."

THE REPORT In the report, the Unesco also requested the government to submit a report on the state of conservation of the Sundarbans to the

World Heritage Centre within December 1. The World Heritage Committee will examine the report at its 41st general session in 2017, and decide on the listing of the property (the Sundarbans) on the "World

Heritage in Danger" list. A joint team of experts from the United Nations Education Scientific Cultural Organisations (Unesco) and IUCN (International Union for Conservation of Nature) prepared the report following a

visit to Bangladesh from March 22

to 28. The mission was tasked with reviewing potential impacts from the construction of the Rampal power plant, assessing risks from climate change, and evaluating the overall management system of the Sundarbans, including provisions around shipping safety, says the

In the report, the expert team identified four key concerns related to the construction of the plant. The concerns include pollution from coal ash by air, pollution from wastewater and waste ash, increased shipping and dredging, and the cumulative impact of industrial and related development infrastructure on the forest.

It said the plant's construction would result in a substantial increase in shipping and dredging in the area.

Mentioning the Sundarbans with a fragile ecosystem, the report also expressed concerns over the issue, saying the freshwater flow into the forest has been drastically reduced, resulting in substantial increases in siltation and salinity that are threatening the overall balance of the eco-

The report recommended the government's immediate action to secure adequate freshwater flow to the Sundarbans. It also calls for preparing a new integrated management plan that would consist how much pressure of development the fragile ecosystem the Sundarbans may bear.

The report also said though the government assured the Unesco that the power plant project of Orion had been cancelled, the Orion Group website states that Orion Power Khulna Ltd has already started implementation of the project at the site.

The Unesco inscribed the Sundarbans, the world's largest mangrove forests, home to the famous Bengal Tiger and a hotspot for dolphins, turtles, and birds, on their world heritage list in 1997. Millions of people depend on this labyrinth of tidal rivers for food,

homes, and flood protection. Asked, Anwar Hossain Manju, minister for environment and forest, yesterday said he was not updated everything about the project as the ministry of energy and

power was dealing with the matter. "If they request for a conservancy

plan for the Sundarbans, we will make it," he said. Meanwhile, the National com-

mittee for Saving the Sundarbans, which is fighting to save the forest, issued a statement yesterday, hailing the report posted on the Unesco website.

"It would be a matter of shame for Bangladesh, a country that is vulnerable to climate change, if the Unesco inscribes the Sundarbans on the World Heritage in Danger list," said the statement, signed by the committee's Secretary General

Abdul Matin. It also demanded that the Indian government do not collaborate with Bangladesh in constructing the "second class" coal-fired power plant in Bangladesh that would harm the forest and also the people of Bangladesh.

treatments at Bahubal Health Complex, said Abdul Kuddus, on duty physician of the health complex.

Assistant teachers of Bahubal Din Nath Model School, Ashok Das and Golam Mohiuddin said the Upazila Education Office enlisted many newer schools for nationalisation already. This reputed school should have been nationalised ahead of other schools since it was established over sixty years ago.

The students, on way back to school, became agitated and engaged in a scuffle with police after they saw SI Delwar Hossain assault their teacher Ashok Das in front of Bahubal Police Station, said Golam Mohiuddin, adding that at one stage the police started firing from inside the police station without warning.

Police detained six of the students, yet to be identified, during the clashes, said locals.

Abdul Karim Kim, convenor of Songkhubdho Nagorik Andolon, said the police action was uncalled for and absolutely illegal as every citizen of the country has right to protest. "The students attacked and vanda-

lised the police station while they were returning from their programme and several of our personnel sustained injuries [during the attack]. We fired rubber bullets to bring the situation under control," said Moniruzzaman, officer-in-charge of Bahubal Police Station.

"A sub-inspector has been withdrawn for misbehaving with the students," he added.

Joydeb Kumar Bhadra, superintendent of Habiganj police, said police fired about a hundred rounds of rubber bullets and tear gas to control the situation. SI Delwar has been withdrawn after the incident.

Deputy Commissioner of Habiganj Sabina Alam visited the scene and assured of resolving the matter at the earliest.

Saudi prince executed

"After investigations, the authorities charged him of committing the crime and his indictment was sent to the General Court. He was charged with what was attributed to him and sentenced to death," the statement said.

The Court of Appeal and the Supreme Court both agreed on the death penalty. A Royal Decree was issued for the implementation of the court's order. The victim's family refused offers of

'blood money' and demanded justice be carried out. The ministry confirmed to every-

body that the government of Custodian of the Two Holy Mosques King Salman is keen on enforcement of security and justice by implementing the rules prescribed by Allah Almighty on whoever violates the sanctity of civilians and commits bloodshed. It also warned that legitimate

punishment would be the fate of whoever dares to commit such a crime, the statement added. Tuesday's execution was the first time that a member of the royal family had been put to death for murder by

the state since 1975, when Prince Faisal bin Musaid was beheaded in Riyadh for assassinating King Faisal. A New York Times article about that event said that some 10,000 people "watched silently as the executioner swung a sword with a golden hilt, but then thousands broke into chants of

'God is great!' and 'Justice is done!'" A couple of years later, a princess and her husband were accused of adultery and executed after the princess refused to marry a man selected by the family. The princess, Mishael, was shot as her husband, Khalid Muhallal, watched. He was then beheaded, according to a New York Times obituary of her grandfather, Prince

It was unclear how many people watched the execution of Prince Turki on Tuesday or what their immediate reaction was. The state news media report did not

family, Prince Faisal bin Farhan al-Saud, said by telephone from Riyadh that Prince Turki was from one of the most prominent branches of the royal family after that of the direct descendants of King Abdulaziz, who founded the modern Saudi state in 1932. That genealogy earned Prince Turki

no extra credit with the courts or with the king, Prince Faisal said.

"The king has always said that there is no difference in the law between princes and others, and I think that this is clear manifestation of the reality of

that fact," he said.

According to Saudi reports, Prince Turki shot a man during "a group fight" that occurred a few years ago.

Prince Turki's execution rocketed around the kingdom's social media networks, with some Saudis saying they never imagined such a thing would happen and others arguing that it showed the quality of their justice system, which follows a strict interpretation of Shariah law and is often criticized by human rights groups and Western governments for what they consider harsh and arbitrary punish-
