Kangaroo born for first time in country

Meet Moni.

She is barely six-month-old, yet she hops and follows her mother around on her hind legs in the Gazipur's Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Safari Park. For the first time a kangaroo has given birth in the country.

"Although the baby kangaroo, or joey, was born in May the park authorities kept the news of the birth, first time in the country, a secret for fear of diseases and security," said Md Sahabuddin, assistant conservator of forests.

"The baby is in good health and has coped with the environment," he told The Daily Star yesterday. Sahabuddin said they have named her "Moni". "Moni's mother gave birth on May 4 and she got out of her

pouch towards the end of August," he said, adding, the baby kangaroo was 3 to 4 centimetres in length at the time of birth and weighed around 5kg.

Two females and one male of the red kangaroo species were brought to the park from South Africa in 2014, he said.

According to Live Science, kangaroos are marsupials, meaning they give birth to young who are not fully developed. A newborn joey continues to grow inside the mother's pouch where it gains nourishment from milk and is sheltered and kept warm and protected for 120 to 400 days. Kangaroos are native to Australia, but are adaptable to other climates.



19pc urban poor suffer from diabetes

Says collaborative study of Nagoya University of Japan, BSMMU, others

At least 19 percent of the urban poor, including 22.2 percent of women and 15.3 percent of men aged between 18 and 64 years, suffer from diabetes, over double the national rate of nine percent, reveals a new collaborative

"Childhood undernutrition could be attributed to such a high rate," said one of the authors, Assistant Prof Khalequzzaman of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU).

Conducted between 2014 and 2016, this study changes the perception that only the rich are affected by non-communicable diseases, that is those not caused by infectious agents, he said.

The Nagoya University of Japan, BSMMU, National Heart Foundation Hospital & Research Institute, and Environment and Population Research Centre conducted the "NCD risk factor survey in Urban

Poor Population of Bangladesh".

Over 21,000 people of Bauniabadh, an urban low-income community in the capital's Mirpur, came under the epidemiological study, representing the country's underserved urban poor, said Dr Khalequzzaman.

The study, disseminated at a symposium at the BSMMU auditorium yesterday, revealed that 39.3 percent of the women and 19.4 percent of the men were overweight or obese. Moreover, 20.6 percent of the

women and 18.6 percent of the men suffered from hypertension. The amount of HDL cholesterol,

which unclogs arteries and protects the heart, was low, that is less than 40mg/dL, in 73.3 percent of men and 56 percent of women.

LDL cholesterol, which clogs arteries and increases risks of heart diseases, was found to be high, that is over 130 gm/dL, in 11.6 percent of men and 12.8 percent of women. The researchers said the findings

reveal that the community was in quite a high risk of developing noncommunicable diseases and that it could be linked to certain behaviours and food habits. For example, 60 percent of the men and 22 percent of the women are tobacco users, said another author, Prof Sohel Reza Chowdhury of the heart foundation. Besides, 92 percent of the partici-

pants consume only one serving of fruits and vegetables a day whereas only 2 percent had over five servings as recommended by World Health Organization, he said.

Around 80 percent of the people added table salt to their meals, a habit raising the risk of hypertension, he said.

"I take some salt when I eat rice...some people do not find rice tasty if they do not take it with any salt," said a female participant in the

dents as saying that presence of artificial preservatives prompted them to refrain from eating fruits or to eat less. They, however, said they ate oily street food and in restaurants for often being unable to cook at home. Even those who are financially

insolvent mentioned that they often cannot buy good food and face stress due to financial constraints, said Prof Akiko. National Heart Foundation

President Prof Brig (retd) Abdul Malik said non-communicable diseases have become the top cause of the burden brunt from diseases and deaths in developing countries like Bangladesh. "We need prevention

programmes as well as modern treatment facilities to combat the threat," he said.

Brandishing Firearms

Police sue 2 expelled **BCL** leaders

Police filed a case against two expelled Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) leaders yesterday, four days after they were seen brandishing firearms during a hawker eviction drive in the capital's Gulistan, as per photos pub-

lished by several Bangla dailies. Moreover, a hawker, Md Siraj, filed another case with Paltan Police Station saying 150 unnamed staff of Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) and outsiders attacked the hawkers with hockey sticks and local arms and their shops were vandalised and looted.

The pro-ruling student organisation on Monday expelled the general secretaries of BCL Dhaka south and Wari thana units, Md Sabbir Hossain and Md Ashigur Rahman, for, what they said, breaching organisational discipline.

Sub-inspector Abdul Mannan of Shahbagh Police Station filed the first case against the two and over 50 to 60 unnamed persons. He said they "gathered illegally

wielding sticks and lethal weapons and opened fire on the procession (of hawkers) with an intent to kill". During the drive on October 27, a clash had broken out between the hawkers and a DSCC eviction

team. Stating that the duo had gone into hiding, Assistant Commissioner of police (Ramna zone) Ihsanul Ferdaus told The Daily Star that the delay occurred as they needed to scrutinise the media photos and information.

LACK OF ALTERNATIVES AFTER BAN ON BATTERY-RUN RICKSHAWS IN BARISAL CITY

Commuters' sufferings on

With the authorities banning battery-run auto-rickshaws from plying the Sadar road in Barisal city without deciding on an alternative means, commuters are

now undergoing untold sufferings. "We barred the vehicles from running on road in line with a recent High Court directive. Initially the road was made off-limits to the auto-rickshaws. We will remove them from the entire city with the course of time," said SM Ruhul Amin, Barisal Metropolitan Police commissioner.

Earlier, in 2014, such auto-rickshaws were banned across the country as the authorities concerned cannot provide them licences for running according to the Traffic Control and Public Vehicle Bye-Laws, 1973.

However, though the ban applies to a limited area in Barisal city, roads in the area, residents say, are of immense importance for them, particularly for students, as many educational institu-College are located there.

tions including Barisal Govt Women's Schools and colleges apart, Barisal

launch terminal, Barisal Judge Court, Deputy Commissioner's Office, branches of various commercial banks, markets, doctors' chambers, Barisal Sadar Hospital, Barisal City Corporation and many more important offices are in the immediate vicinity of the road, through which every day thousands of people move. The students who could directly

travel to their institutions by the autorickshaws costing little for their easy availability and affordable fares, they now have to pay three times more to reach the institutions.

"Previously I needed Tk 20 for going to college from my Rupatoli residence, but now I have to spend at least Tk 60," said Nishat Jahan Ria, a student of Barisal Govt Women's College.

"I have to spend Tk 100 as rickshaw fare every day to take my son from Vatikhana area to Barisal Zilla School intersection, whereas in the past I could go to the area by the battery-run autorickshaws spending only Tk 40 or Tk 50," said Rashida Aktar, mother of a

fifth-grader of the school. Some 5,000 such rickshaws ply the

city roads with permission from Barisal City Corporation (BCC), according to Barisal Mahanagar Auto-rickshaw Owners' Association and BCC Mayor Md Ahasan Habib Kamal.

The rickshaws' drivers and owners are counting a huge financial loss thanks to the sudden ban since the lion's share of their incomes came from the vehicles plying the road used by nearly all of the residents, said Abu Saleh Ronny, general secretary of Auto-rickshaw Sramik Union of the

Although the ban was meant to relieve traffic congestion in the city, it now seems paradoxical as many roads constantly remain clogged with slowpaced rickshaws, compounding their sufferings, said commuters. The commuters are facing difficulties

due to the ban, the police commissioner conceded, adding that their sufferings will disappear soon, as the number of gas-run auto-rickshaws is increasing. Asked, the mayor said they would

hold a meeting with relevant stakeholders in this regard.
