"Industry kids have certain advantages"

Bollywood actress Parineeti Chopra feels that the beauty of the Hindi film industry is that - talent, and to some extent luck, are the only things that work here. For ages, a debate has been constantly raging about 'insiders' and 'outsiders'; and that how insiders get things easily. Conversely, insiders have always maintained that the advantage remains only till their first film gets released.

"Kids who are from the industry have certain advantages," Parineeti feels. "They understand the business more because they have either parents, brothers or sisters who are film-makers, actors, etc. They have been around scripts all their lives. Plus, they know how a movie set functions and, in fact, they get to visit many of them," she says.

"The beauty of the industry is that talent, and to some extent luck, are the only things that work. So, wherein it's easy to get the first break, it's the audiences liking that decides the rest. It's a catch-22



But is nepotism a reality in Bollywood? "Honestly, I am not sure. I have a 50-50 opinion about it. Sometimes, you see it happening around you. Other times, when you're a non-film person and don't have contacts and still get work, you are like, 'No, decisions are taken based on who you are and what you are,'" she adds.

Like Parineeti, there are other 'outsiders' such as Sushant Singh Rajput, Sidharth Malhotra, Deepika Padukone and Ranveer Singh doing well. "But you also have Varun (Dhawan), Arjun (Kapoor), Shraddha (Kapoor) and Alia

(Bhatt), who have grown up in film families, so they understand movies very well. But actors like me, who are from outside, have reached a position due to our hard work and because audiences have accepted us. So, ultimately somewhere the equation ends up getting equalised," she says.

IS"DOOB" THE STORY OF HUMAYUN AHMED?

Farooki clarifies after rumors spread

"Doob", Mostofa Sarwar Farooki's latest big screen venture has been on the radar since it was announced in March, most prominently because of its leading cast: Irrfan Khan, one of the most recognisable faces of world cinema right now, is not only starring it, but he was so impressed with the story that he is coproducing it. Yesterday, Kolkata-based newspaper Anandabazar reported that the film was based on the iconic Bangladeshi novelist Humayun Ahmed's life, with Irrfan playing the role of the wordsmith. With the social media exploding with reaction over the news, The Daily Star got hold of Farooki on his official statement over the film.

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"I have made a film where I told the story of a family, love, fallout and reunion. It's not a Humayun Ahmed biopic. We have never claimed that. My protagonist's name in the film is Javed Hasan," Farooki tells me. But is it

inspired from his life? I ask. "Most great stories are inspired by life in our surroundings, and we explain it in our way. Many of Humayun Ahmed's stories are inspired from real incidents around him, from the Liberation War, and the middle class life. I have been inspired, too. Whether I was inspired from his life, and if so, to what extent and how I have interpreted it, you can tell after you see the film."

Anandabazar also pinpointed that the other members of the central cast -Rokeya Prachi, Tisha and Kolkata's Parno Mitra - have played the roles shadowing Gultekin Ahmed (Humayun's first wife), Shila Ahmed (Humayun's daughter) and Meher Afroz Shaon (Humayun's second wife). When I asked about the parallels, the director refused to give away the character details, saying that he has just told the story of a Bangalee family's emotions. "We grew up in Humayun Ahmed's aura; his life, his happiness and struggles had affected all of us. Anyone

can make a film inspired by that. If I made a factual biopic then the question of meeting his family and permissions would come. I did not do that. I am not even saying it is inspired by him. You have to go watch the film to see what it

Farooki also cited a Facebook post by him on the same day where he spoke of his admiration for the author, and said Humayun's widow Shaon was 'misunderstanding' him. He wanted Humayun Ahmed's fans to be assured that he would never make someone a villain even if they think the film is inspired from the author's life.

About potential release dates, Farooki informed that the film is ready, with some final touch-ups pending. A private screening of the film was held at Irrfan's house, he informed, adding that they are looking for a suitable date to release it in Bangladesh, India and North America/Australia/UK simultaneously, so

the release date is yet to be decided.

Promising artist Promiti Hossain's maiden solo art exhibi-

ences together with the vulnerable state of women in our society. The artworks displayed at the show represent shades and shapes of gloom, frustration, tormented facets and sinister aspects of humanity.

Women are insecure and vulnerable in our society. They frequently fall victim to rape, assault and injustice. The artist symbolically presented dead insects like flies, mosquitoes, cockroach, grasshoppers, butterflies, bumblebees, ants and crickets coupled with the fragmented forms of human limbs to signify the dominated and assaulted




state of the womenfolk. The artist closely observes the dominated minorities living in Bangladesh and in India while she was studying at Kala Bhabana, Visva-Bharati, India.

Coming of a duel religious background, the artist often feel like an individual with a neutral religious identity. She regards herself as a humanist and feels disquiet about the injustice over the minorities. In her words, "From both the experiences, I learnt that the oppression over the weak is a common practice by the powerful in the world. In such manner I have always commiserated with the women, subjected to male chauvinism which has been a burning issue of our society."

This personal state of mind always haunts her and she renders her feelings into canvas. Promiti uses both organic and inorganic objects within her compositions. The material she has used for making the artworks include coffee, ink, earth colour, acrylic gouache, watercolour. She often uses the accidental effect that takes place naturally. She deliberately keeps these effects to represent the chaotic and confused state of her mind.

The exhibition, jointly curated by Wakilur Rahman and Kehkasha Sabah, was inaugurated on October 22 and is open from 5pm-8pm daily till November 10.

Tarantino insists he'll retire after 10 films

Quentin Tarantino is close to taking his final bow.

Tarantino sat down with Ann Lewnes, CMO of Adobe, at Adobe Max — The Creativity Conference in San Diego on Thursday, discussing his start in the industry, from screenwriting to directing, followed by his inspirations that led him into the field. The conference was targeted to people working in entertainment, film, fashion and design.

Towards the end of the panel, Tarantino reiterated that he plans to retire following his tenth feature film. "Drop the mic. Boom. Tell everybody, 'Match that sh-t!" said the Tennesseeborn director.

Tarantino, who has directed and written eight films, feels content with his career. He also described the trust he has within his own artistic process, stating that he finds pleasure in creating projects from scratch and watching them develop.

Though the end of his filmmaking career is nigh, Tarantino hopes that he will leave a lasting impression in cinema for future generations.

He has previously teased that his next film could be a 1930s gangster movie set in Australia. But he's also working on an undefined project revolving around his fascination with the year 1970.
