REVIEW: The revenge plot has been written by Iftakar Chowdhury, who fails to narrate the story effectively. The build-up to the climax was somewhat clumsy, making the plot obvious as to where it was headed. Actor Anisur Rahman Milon, who usually adapts to every role given to him and performs admirably, had lacking in his performance for which he could not stand out. He had plenty of segments where he could have displayed his talents, but unfortunately did not do so. Bobby, who portrayed Ivy, looked pretty glamorous from the beginning. She did an admirable job in the film however, her acting needed improvement. The role portrayed by Bappy was quite vague; it was confusing as to what exactly the character was assigned to do in the film. The young protagonist portrayed by Shimul Khan was one of the few things good about the movie. He fully utilized his character in the amount of screen time given to him.

The costumes selected for the actors did not suit them well, which is another negative aspect of the film. The music provided by Adit was commendable, and the songs were quite enjoyable.

Overall, the movie fails to hit the mark, which could have been easily taken care of with proper storytelling and acting.

THE PIANIST (2002)

PLOT: A musician of Polish-German descendant struggles for survival in the

destruction of the Warsaw ghetto of World War II.

REVIEW: The story of a classical musician who survives the Holocaust through endurance and the best of lucks, is more than just a thriller and an attempt to light up suspense or

emotion; it is a clear vision of what a pianist witnessed in those days and what happened to him. His survival was not considered a victory by the musician. Based on the autobiography of Wladyslaw Szpilmand, the movie depicts his incredible journey of survival in the war by hiding in Warsaw, with some

assistance from the Polish resistance.

The closing sequences of the film involve Szpilman's confrontation with a German captain Wilm Hosenfeld, portrayed by Thomas Kretschmann, who finds the survivor by accident. Director Polanski's direction in this segment is

pure class, displaying his masterful technique of using silence and nuance. The film shows
Szpilman as a survivor rather than a fighter, which is essential since deep down Polaski is reflecting his own survival as he was an ordinary man

who did all that was possible to save himself and that he would have died definitely had there not been few non-Jews.

A critical storytelling effort that does not get any better, and does not have a more profound impact than it did.
