New cast named for "Stranger Things" S2



"Stranger Things" season 2 keeps getting stranger. Days after the first photo of the original cast members' return, a batch of new names have been revealed to join the continuation of the tale in Hawkins, Indiana.

Danish actress Linnea Berthelsen will play Roman, "an emotionally damaged, magnetic young woman who suffered a great loss as a child." Sean Astin will play Bob Newby, "a kindhearted former nerd who went to high school with Joyce and Hopper and now manages the local Hawkins RadioShack." Finally, Paul Reiser will play Dr. Owens, "a highranking member within the Department of Energy on a 'clean-up' assignment, tasked with containing the events of last year."

Nothing else official was revealed about these characters.

In addition to the return of Finn Wolfhard, Gaten Matarazzo, Caleb McLaughlin, Noah Schnapps, Natalia Dyer, Charlie Heaton, and Joe Keery, Sadie Sink will play the 'tough and confident' tomboy Max, while Dacre Montgomery will play Billy, her 'hyperconfident' older step-brother.

The new season will premiere on Netflix next year.

Curtain rises for the 2nd Dhaka Int'l Folk Fest today

Curtain for 2nd Dhaka International Folk Festival rises today. Following the grand success of last year's maiden festival, Dhaka International Folk Festival 2016 - organised by Sun Events will feature music performances by folk artistes and troupes from six countries: Bangladesh, India, Pakistan, Spain, UK and Canada. The three-day event, with an aim to introduce the world to the opulent folk music heritage of Bangladesh, will be held from November 10 to 12 at Bangladesh Army Stadium in Dhaka. The festival will run daily from 6pm to 12am.

Bangladeshi artistes - Abdur Rahman Baul, Tuntun Baul and Momtaz Begum will perform on the opening day along with Pakistani artiste Javed Bashir. The inaugural day will also feature performances by Simon Thacker's

Svara-Kanti (UK), Raju Das Baul (India) and Farida Yasmin (Bangladesh).

The second day (November 11) of the festival will feature solo

performances by flautist Jalal (Bangladesh), Latif Sarkar (Bangladesh) and Prosad (Canada). November 11 will also feature duet performances by Bangladeshi artistes

Baul Shafi Mondal and Labik Kamal Gaurob; Spanish artistes Karen Lugo and Ricardo Moro. The line-up also includes Indian Ocean; Kailash Kher (India) will

perform a solo as the showstopper. Bangladeshi artistes – Sunil

Karmakar, Islamuddin Kissakar and Bari Siddiqui - will perform solos while the Nooran Sisters (India), Taposh and Friends (Bangladesh) will present their numbers on the concluding day. The day's proceedings will have Sam Mills (UK) featuring Susheela Raman (UK) and renowned Indo-Franco artiste Paban Das Baul perform as the showstopper at the festival.

Audiences willing to attend cannot enter the venue with any type of bags. Moreover, there will be no parking facilities for private cars at the festival venue.

The Dhaka International Folk Fest is presented by Meril, in association with GP Music, powered by Dhaka Bank and supported by Microsoft. Maasranga Television is the broadcast partner, with The Westin Dhaka as hospitality partner and Square Hospital as medical partner.

Rajeeb's homecoming for the Folk Fest

BANGLADESHI PERCUSSIONIST TO PERFORM WITH PROSAD

On this year's Dhaka International Folk Fest lineup, the name Prosad is a total wild-card entry. This born-and-raised Canadian multiinstrumentalist with a penchant for sitar is probably going to be a surprise element for the festival, but his ensemble has another surprise: one of his band members is a Bangladeshi musician living and working in Toronto.

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Tanveer Alam Rajeeb flew in with Prosad to Bangladesh this week to perform in the Folk Fest, for the first time in seven years. "As a Bangladeshi, it is a huge deal for me to be coming back home to perform, on a stage like this," Rajeeb told The Daily Star. He met Prosad in Toronto many years ago, and performs with him there. They sent their videos to the organisers of

the Folk Fest, and eventually finalised the gig.

But what is a Canadian musician going to play at a folk music festival in Dhaka? "Prosad plays the guitar, flute and sitar, and I will be playing tabla and percussion with him. We will be doing some of his original songs -- countrystyled music, and some reggae, but in a fusion style incorporating the sitar and tabla," Rajeeb says. "It is going to be interesting, and I hope the audience likes it."

Prosad has toured across Canada, Europe and South Pacific, and composed for films in Hollywood. He learned sitar from Shambhu Das (a senior disciple of Pt. Ravi Shankar) and also plays the didgeridoo (a wind instrument developed by indigenous Australians). A hallmark of his music is the use of ancient instruments to create music for the modern age.

6th Oriental Painting Exhibition inaugurated

With a goal to popularise Oriental Art amongst students of FFA (Department of Oriental Art), DU and FFA (Department of Oriental Art) Rajshahi University (RU), the OPSG has declared an 'Oriental Painting Award' this year.

Nipa Rani Sarkar, of DU received the top prize for her artwork "Saga of Celestial Romance" and received a cheque worth Tk50000. Raihan
