


One can find solace and inspiration under the open sky at the loneliest of places on earth that not only makes you dream, but encourages you to put them on canvas. The inspiration that makes this exhibition, "Into the Valley of Beauty", a reality sprouted from nature. While going through the paintings by Suman Kumar Sarkar and Zahangir Alom, I was carried away to a distant place where I could hear my thoughts echoing off the walls of ageing hills.

The exhibition opened yesterday at the Zainul Gallery-2 of the Faculty of Fine Arts, Dhaka University. It remains open from 11am-8pm every day, until November 24.

Suman's canvas is a field of rolling energy. The serendipity that lies in the calmness of hills and the vibrancy of nature, as depicted in his paintings, offers onlookers an escape into the world of imagination. The lush greeneries adorning hills, the mountain terrace and the utter earthiness of the downhill villages are in quiet order that creates a sense of longing rightly

touching the ever-present void in our minds.

Suman is a professional painter and teacher. Zahangir, on the other hand, is a man whose whimsical spirit keeps seeking the tune of his soul — sometimes here, sometimes there. A journalist and an art enthusiastturned artist, Zahangir has his inspiration for painting deep-rooted in nature and has taken



Oriental Painting, which belongs to our own geographical terrain, as a medium for expressing his thoughts.

Both artists have fondness for watercolor and their artworks carry that mark.

The paintings tell stories where human beings co-exist symbiotically with nature.

"Amar jomi, amar dhan; tukra khanao dibam nay" -- the call of the Santal people were voiced by the performers of Nagarnat in Sylhet, through an interactive street play "Bhumi Putra" staged in front of Sylhet Central Shaheed Minar on Wednesday.


The 15-minute mime drama with music revolved around the attack on the Santal village that manifested in burning of homes and killing of men. The play ended with the revolt of the Santals against human rights violations in the name of development.

Ujjal Chakrabharty enacted the charac-

ter of Shidhu, a Santal who stood with his men to protect their land, their lives while other performers and musicians played key roles in the play.

About the play, Arup Baul, president of Nagarnat and leading member of the musical team of the play said, "We must remember the golden days of the Santals when they stood up in a revolution against the British rulers to protect their lands and lives".

Nagarnat is a theatre and musical troupe of Sylhet working on and off the stage for years; they have often raised their voice against attacks on human rights through their drama and music.

Metallica releases videos for every track of new album

"Harwired...to Self-Destruct" on YouTube in its entirety

Just ahead of the release of "Hardwired... To Self-Destruct", the first studio album from Metallica in eight years (since 2008's "Death Magnetic"), the band went-on a video-releasing frenzy. Metallica had been teasing the album since August when they suddenly announced the record alongside a music video for the opening song, "Hardwired". With two more tracks out prior to yesterday, the thrashers emptied out everything else they had with a rollout of nine music videos for the remaining songs on the album and, now the entire record is available for streaming on YouTube.

The first three videos, "Hardwired", "Moth Into Flame" and "Atlas, Rise!" were pretty standard with shots of Metallica performing in a rehearsal space. The rest of the videos, however, were just the opposite as each focused on a specific narrative. Overall, the album itself is divided between massive, midtempo grooves and freight train-like speed, offering something for fans of all eras. "Spit Out the Bone" and "Moth Into Flame" both entertain hyper-melodic sections while "Dream No More" and "Murder One" crush



with imposing rhythms.

Earlier in the year, drummer Lars Ulrich revealed that Metallica had recorded a music video for each track, but it's doubtful anyone expected the roll out that took place. Now the big question on everyone's mind is what songs will the band include on upcoming set lists? They've already performed "Hardwired", "Moth Into Flame" and "Atlas, Rise!" live and bassist Robert Trujillo indicated they'll be taking the show on a stadium tour across the

US next summer.

Keeping up with surprises, it was announced today on November 17 that the entire Metallica catalog will be offered on the streaming service Napster. Many, of course, remember the infamous battle between the band and Napster around the turn of the millennium when they rallied against illegal music downloading.

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
