Little logic in additions

Will Mehedi Maruf travel to Australia with the squad for the preparation camp in Sydney, Australia and then tour New Zealand? The 28year-old batsman's travelling papers are being prepared but it is not yet certain whether any

additional player will be added to the squad that was earlier announced for the tour.

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) president Nazmul Hassan Papon said three days back in Chittagong that one or two additional performers from the ongoing Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) may be included in Bangladesh's preparatory squad for the New Zealand series. Chief selector Minhajul Abedin however said yesterday that

the selectors were yet to sit to discuss and decide on the inclusion of the additional player(s). "We are yet to discuss the matter. Hopefully we will be able to inform the media about this matter on November 24. I cannot say anything more regarding this issue," Minhajul told The Daily Star over phone last night.

Since the BCB boss made the surprising announcement, three performers' names in the ongoing BPL came to fore. Two of them -- left-handed opener Shahriar Nafees and all-rounder Nasir Hossain -- were already in the stand-by list, so their necessary travelling paperwork is being completed with the other selected players drafted in the 22-member preparatory squad.

First of all it, the wisdom of such an announcement without a special situation arising and after the squad has been announced is questionable. There have also been discussions and criticism about the rationale behind picking additional players for a seven-day camp. Besides that, there is hardly a compelling reason to add any one of the three players being discussed.

Many also believe that it would not be a wise decision to expose a player like Maruf in New Zealand; instead he can get the exposure in subcontinental conditions, such as the tour of Sri Lanka next year.

Moreover, it would make sense and perhaps be more beneficial to the players in question to allow them to play in the National Cricket League instead of being passengers on the tour of New Zealand. As things originally stood, Nafees and Nasir could only have been called up if an injury problem cropped up during the New Zealand tour.

Most importantly, a team has already been announced, presumably with a certain plan and it is not good practice that anybody other than the selectors becomes involved in the specialised task of squad selection.



"We could have got used to the turf had we had a practice here previously. But after today's practice, we have hopefully covered some ground. We will definitely win against Chinese Taipei and will improve day by day," Krishna said hopingly.

New Zealand skipper Kane Williamson guided his team to victory on the fourth day of a low-scoring first Test against Pakistan at Christchurch yesterday.

Kiwis outclass **Pakistan**

A Kane Williamson half century saw New Zealand snap a four-Test losing streak when they beat Pakistan by eight wickets Sunday in the first Test at Hagley Oval, Christchurch.

A low-scoring match was wrapped up inside eight sessions after the first day's washout, with Williamson's second innings 61 -- his 24th Test 50 -- the top score

of the match. Set 105 to win after Pakistan were all out for 171 in their second innings on the morning of the fourth day, Williamson lost his wicket with the scores level, leaving debutant Jeet Raval to seal victory with a boundary off Yasir Shah.

It was a much-needed confidence boost for the home side, coming off a 3-0 series whitewash in India and a comprehensive 204run loss to South Africa.

"It was a nice toss to win," said Williamson who put Pakistan into bat on a seaming wicket and had them all out for 133 in their first innings.

"After a couple of really tough tours in South Africa and India, it was important we learned a lot but at the same time put some of that baggage away."

Azhar Ali, who will take over the Pakistan captaincy with Misbah-ul-Haq having to dash home after the match because of a family illness, said the tourists had no excuses.

Spinners jolt England's chase

Late strikes by Indian spinners jolted England after skipper Alastair Cook's dogged half-

century gave the visitors hope on the fourth day of the second Test in Visakhapatnam on Sunday.

Chasing a mammoth 405 for victory, England were precariously placed at 87 for two at stumps, with Joe Root batting on five as Cook's stubborn resistance came to an end with the close of play.

Left-arm spinner Ravindra Jadeja trapped Cook lbw for 54 and even though the batsman reviewed the decision, the on-field umpires call was upheld.

Cook fought hard with fellow-

opener Haseeb Hameed (25) as the duo put on 75 runs in 50.2 overs before India's premier spinner Ravichandran Ashwin broke through.

Hameed, who impressed on his debut with a well-made 82 in the second innings of the Rajkot Test, batted with grit during his 144-ball stay calls on both occasions. before being trapped leg-before off Ashwin to a delivery that stayed low.

The batting effort came after Stuart Broad shrugged off a right foot injury to claim four wickets and help dismiss India for 204 in their second innings.

England have their backs to the wall with only four teams - West Indies, South Africa, India, Australia getting more than 400 in the fourth innings to win a Test.

Cook, who was castled by

Mohammed Shami for two in England's first innings, showed tremendous application during his 188-ball stay.

Cook did survive a few DRS calls when India decided to review two lbw appeals from Jadeja and Ashwin, but the third umpire upheld the on-field The visitors need to scale a moun-

tain of runs or bat out three sessions for a draw.

Aus make six changes

Crisis-hit Australia included English-born opener Matt Renshaw among six changes to their revamped Test squad Sunday for this week's crucial third day-night

Selectors named the 20-year-old Queensland opener Renshaw alongside two other batting debutants, Peter Handscomb and Nic Maddinson, in a 12-man squad.

Pacemen Chadd Sayers and Jackson Bird return to the national side, and Matthew Wade comes in as wicketkeeper after Peter Nevill was axed.

Australia last made as many as six changes in 1984, when they faced the then

formidable West Indies.

Joe Burns, Adam Voges, Callum Ferguson, Nevill and Joe Mennie paid the price for Australia's wretched innings and 80-run defeat to South Africa in last week's second Hobart Test.

The dramatic team overhaul follows Australia's heavy defeat to the Proteas in Hobart to give the tourists an unassailable
