## Doctors hopeful after surgery on child rape victim

Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) doctors are hoping for a success following reconstructive surgery yesterday on a five-year-old rape victim of Dinajpur of October.

Being treated free of cost, the child is now in the intensive care unit and, if no infection develops, will be shifted to the One-stop Crisis Centre. Her mother and grandmother are taking care of her along with nurses.

A nine-member medical board and a specialised physician conducted the operation lasting for around four hours, Deputy Director Khwaja Abdul Gofur told The Daily Star.

Prof Ashraf ul Huq Kazal, head of paediatric surgery, said they had to first make sure that her wounds had healed and infections cleared up to a certain extent.

He said they had reconstructed various parts of her genitalia and reproductive organ and hope that she would once again be able to consciously retain urine. Her mother noticed she was missing on the evening of

October 18. She was last seen playing near her home in Parbatipur upazila's Jamirhat village. She was found beaten and raped near a garlic field near

their house the next day with several bite and scratch marks and cigarette burns on her body.

Her father filed a case against two persons. One villager, Saiful Islam, 42, has been arrested.

## PSC examinee dies as scarf gets entangled in wheel CITY DESK

A Primary School Certificate (PSC) examinee died as her scarf got entangled in a wheel of a battery-run auto-rickshaw in Pirgachha upazila of Rangpur on Sunday.

The deceased was Suborna Akter, 13, daughter of Badsha Mia of Kaliganj village under the upazila. She sat for PSC examination from Hasna Government Primary School in the upazila.

Family members said Suborna was critically injured when her scarf got entangled with one of the rear wheels of the vehicle and knotted tightly around her neck while she was returning home after finishing her examination on Sunday afternoon.

Locals rushed her to Rangpur Medical College Hospital where she died in the evening.

## Rampal will displace 40 lakh people

Around 40 lakh people of the coastal belt near the Sundarbans will be displaced and environmental refugees if the proposed Rampal coal-fired power plant is constructed, Prof Anu Muhammad said yesterday.

"If the power plant is set up..., the number of environmental refugees will double..., "said Prof Anu, member secretary of the National Committee to Protect Oil, Gas, Mineral Resources, Power and Ports.

He was addressing a rally held by the National Committee's Dhaka chapter at Shahbagh intersection to garner the people's supports for the "Cholo, Cholo, Dhaka Cholo" (Lets march towards Dhaka) campaign that will be start from the country's seven different points on Thursday. It will hold a

rally at Central Shaheed Minar on November 26. "We will inform the

people once again of what we have told the government in the last five years about the plant," he mentioned, urging all to join the rally. Prof Anu added that they would announce a programme with the Indian people to save the

world's largest mangrove forest that protects around 4 crore people from natural disasters.

Alleging that a section of businessmen are plotting to grab the forest through setting up bill boards and factories, he slammed the individuals and institutions advocating the construc-

tion of the power plant. After the rally, the people present there brought out a procession that marched from Shahbagh to Azimpur.

# Ctg road ravaged by development work

After renovation, following repeated protests by local residents, it had been the best road in Chittagong city. But only for one year. The road started taking on its old look—full of potholes and barely any sign of tarmac on the surface, here and there.

One major reason is Chittagong Water and Sewerage Authority (C'Wasa) started digging Arakan Road just one year into its renovation, carried out by Chittagong Development Authority (CDA). Invariably the ultimate sufferers are the commuters.

Three years ago, locals took to the street with the demand to renovate the portion from Kalurghat to Bahaddarhat of Arakan Road. Locals at that time protested through planting seedlings of paddy and releasing fish in the waterfilled potholes. After the symbolic protest, CDA started the expansion and renovation work.

Apart from the city dwellers, thousands of commuters of Rauzan, Rangunia, and Kaptai upazilas travel this portion, around 5km from Bahaddarhat to Kaptai Rastar Matha. Vehicles from Boalkhali and Patiya upazilas of south Chittagong also enter and exit the city using this road.

Because of its terrible condition, the area is facing increasing traffic congestion, said locals.

In a recent visit, this correspondent found numerous potholes and cracks on the road. Making the situation worse are piles of sands and mud occupying major portions of the road at different spots like Moulabhi Pukur

Par, Bahir Signal and Balur Tal areas. Besides, from Old Chandgaon area to Moulabhi Pukur Par area, there is

barely any existence of tarmac. "We are now facing traffic congestions. We also feel annoyed while riding vehicles due to the cloud of dust produced by excavation work of C'wasa," said Md Mohiuddin, a local of

Bahir Signal area. "Now it takes two to three times more than the usual time to pass this

section," said Md Khairuzzaman, a CNG-run auto-rickshaw driver, adding that different parts of their vehicles got badly damaged for the potholes.

Md Arman Hossain, another local, said, "We thought we will get rid from the dust and misery after renovation of the road. But our expectation faded

Spending Tk 24 crore, CDA completed the expansion and development work of the road on December

C'Wasa Managing Director AKM Fazlullah said for supplying water from their Maduna Ghat Project to the city dwellers, they were doing the excavation. He, however, said taking people's sufferings in mind, they were digging at night and filling it up again.

"We are bound to supply water to the city dwellers. After concluding the project, people's misery would be lessened," he said.

13, 2013. CDA handed over the road to Chittagong City Corporation (CCC) at the end of 2014.

Mahfuzur Rahman, the project director, also executive engineer of CDA, said it was the best road in Chittagong in 2013. But now CCC has given permission to Wasa to excavate the road causing its dilapidated condi-

tion, he added. CCC also took Tk 5 crore from Wasa as compensation for renovating the

road, he said.

"Several times, we talked with them (C'wasa) about the matter," said the CCC engineer, adding that they could not take steps to renovate the road as C'wasa's excavation work was continuing.

## KCC mayor reinstated as per HC order

Khulna City Corporation (KCC) Mayor Moniruzzaman Moni, also the city unit BNP general secretary, yesterday was received with flowers on his return to office following a government order reinstating him as per the High Court's (HC) directive.

Additional Secretary of Local Government Division (LGD) Jyotirmoy Datta informed of the government order, reports UNB. LGD suspended him on

November 2, 2015 as chargesheets were submitted against him in two criminal cases over arson and attacks on law enforcers, reports a Khulna correspondent.

A local court on June 11 accepted chargesheets against 56 people, including

Moniruzzaman. The HC stayed the suspension on June 7 for six months following a plea.

Moniruzzaman filed a writ challenging the government order and the local government, rural development and cooperatives ministry appealed against the HC stay. The Supreme Court's Appellate Division upheld the HC stay on November 14.

Moni was elected mayor defeating ruling Awami League-backed candidate Talukdar Abdul Khaleque in June 2013. Moniruzzaman had handed over the charge to KCC panel mayor-1, Md Anisur Rahman Biswas.
