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Uber taxis hit Dhaka streets

Mobile app-based worldwide service expected to improve city's transport system

"Boss, my name is Arman. I am at Panthapath. Where should I come to pick you up?" a driver of Uber transport service said, seconds after Shafiul Islam sought the newly introduced taxi service in Dhaka.



When called using the mobile app, the phone screen shows the name of the driver, his photograph and approximate time of his arrival.

The driver was supposed to come in five minutes, as the screen showed. But he came after 20 minutes, thanks to bad traffic, with his Toyota Corolla. Shafiul, a private service holder, got on the car and started for Uttara.


"Amid the evening rush, I reached Uttar Sector-5 in one hour and 15 minutes. The fare was Tk 600," he told The Daily Star by phone. "I am happy with the service."

His experience is starkly different from that of thousands of Dhaka commuters, who face severe transport crisis every day. Capital cities across the world have smooth taxi services but in Bangladesh all attempts in this regard went in vain for a lack of proper planning.

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Hasina raps Osmans

Asks Shamim to work for Ivy or quit; BNP picks Shakhawat for NCC polls

Awami League President and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday came down hard on party lawmaker Shamim Osman for taking position against AL mayoral nominee Selina Hayat Ivy.


The PM was in a meeting with senior Narayanganj AL leaders apparently to settle the long-standing rivalry between

Shamim and Ivy ahead of the December 22 city

Hasina asked Shamim either to support Ivy or quit the party, a meeting source said.

As the two rival leaders became involved in an altercation, Hasina took position in favour of Ivy and said everyone will have to follow party decisions. She asked all to work together for the AL's

victory.



Emerging from the meeting last night, AL General Secretary Obaidul Quader said all the senior leaders from

Narayanganj pledged to the party chief to remain united in favour of Ivy.

"We all are united. We will work together to secure victory. There is no alternative to ensuring victory for boat [electoral symbol of AL]," he said.

On Friday, the AL Parliamentary Board unanimously nominated Ivy for mayor. Her nomination came days after the party's Narayanganj city unit at Stadium. SEE PAGE 10 COL 5

Rohingyas keep trying to get in

With them come the tales of horror; at least 400 more pushed back to Myanmar


Hausher Dweep. It's an island in the middle of the Naf river, which marks the Bangladesh border with Myanmar.

There is a shrimp farming project with an embankment around it. Shrimp farmers go there by small boats.

On Monday morning, over 500 Rohingyas took shelter on this island. Visiting the place yesterday afternoon, this correspondent found around 300 of them near the embankment's sluice gate-1 and another 200 near

gate-5. BGB was guarding them. It is being widely reported that Rohingyas, often dubbed one of the most persecuted minority groups in the world, are trying to flee the military

crackdown in Rakhine state of Myanmar. Though Bangladesh officials say patrolling has been increased, Rohingyas keep arriving, mostly by crossing the Naf river at night, many
