China pledges to continue development work

China will continue to support the development of Bangladesh as both the countries have a long standing relation, Chinese Ambassador in Bangladesh Ma Mingqiang said yesterday.

China never intervened in any country's internal issues, said Mingqiang, addressing the youth from both China and Bangladesh at an event on 'Reimagining Bangladesh China Relations' at Sonargaon Hotel in Dhaka.

"We want to be a development partner for Bangladesh. The nation has huge potential to become a developed country. Our relationship is coming closer and closer."

Bangladesh-China Foundation for Future, a platform of strengthening bilateral relations organised the programme.

The recent visit of Chinese President Xi Jingping and signing of 28 documents indicate the strong relationship between the two countries, he said. There are so many similarities in culture as well, he added.

ects and many companies are in the line to invest in sectors such as energy and infrastructure.

Chinese investment has been increasing in Bangladesh at 30 percent year-onyear, he said.

Being a development partner, China has constructed some vital infrastructure here like bridges and conference centres, the ambassador said. China is now constructing the multi-billion dollar Padma bridge in Bangladesh.

Currently, China is the largest trading

partner for Bangladesh as it is a major source of Bangladesh's import of capital machinery, electronic gadgets, spare parts and food items.

Bangladesh has been achieving more than 6 percent economic growth over the last 10 years. This growth is commendable, he said.

The ambassador has also expressed interest in working to develop the blue economy at the sea.

Chinese investment in the development of infrastructure in Bangladesh is very important, said Saber Hossain Chowdhury, a parliamentarian and chairman of the Bangladesh-China Foundation for Future.

The mutuality in relations between the two countries is vital, as it ensures peaceful co-existence, Chowdhury said.

He also underscored the importance of Chinese cooperation on the path to becoming a middle income country by Bangladesh by 2021.

Italian lawmakers defy Brussels, back spending budget

Italian deputies on Friday voted overwhelmingly in favour of a draft 2017 budget that the European Commission has warned will breach EU rules on the management of public finances.

A vote of confidence designed to curtail debate on the first reading of the budget bill was carried by 348-144 votes, making its definitive approval by the lower house of parliament on Monday a formality.

Italy was one of eight eurozone countries warned last week that they could face fines and restricted access to funds from Brussels over their failure to stick to the EU's Stability Pact rules. Under centre-left premier Matteo Renzi, Italy has been the

most upfront about its intention to defy the Commission with growth-orientated spending plans for next year. Italy is proposing to run a budget deficit of 2.4 percent of

GDP for the year, significantly higher than the 1.8 percent level it had promised to deliver earlier this year.

Renzi says the slippage is justified as Italy needs to spend to get its economy moving after years of stagnation or worse.

He also wants costs incurred over the migrant crisis and recent earthquakes stripped out of the calculation of how Italy is doing against the standards set by the EU. The issue has provoked sharp exchanges in recent weeks

with Renzi seen in some quarters as Brussels-bashing in the run-up to a December 4 referendum on constitutional reform, on which he has staked his political future. New spending plans in the budget include two billion euros

more for healthcare, one billion for education and measues to help small companies and poorer families.

Renzi said earlier this month that he would no longer bow to "diktats" from Brussels over fiscal restraints he regards as counterproductive at a time when most of the eurozone is struggling.

He has also threatened to block the approval of the EU institutions' collective budget if other countries do not offer Italy more help in coping with the arrival of thousands of migrants on its southern shores.

He gave a pen picture of how the ideas of SDGs were floated, formulated and approved by the United Nations last year.

Tax Week picking up the pace

To help taxpayers submit returns, most field offices have opened booths on the ground floors of their offices.

Along with receiving tax returns, taxmen are also issuing taxpayer identification numbers, and providing user IDs and passwords to the taxpayers to facilitate online income tax returns.

Mostafa, a banker, came to the tax office with a filled-out tax form and got his job done after waiting in a queue. Like him, hundreds of taxpayers submitted their returns.

However, the presence of taxpayers was thin with some taxmen and taxpayers saying the crowd would have been bigger if the banks had remained open to facilitate payment.

As a result, only those taxpayers, who deposited the tax to the banks earlier, were able to submit their

returns in the last two weekends. The crowd is expected to swell

today.

Taxpayers could have completed all formalities yesterday, if a bank had received the payments, said Farooq Hossan, assistant professor and head of the marketing department of Hamdard University Bangladesh, who came to Tax Zone 11. It is a good thing that the Tax Week

is being held early, he added. "This arrangement is helpful. Taxpayers usually faced many hassles and undue demands when they visited the offices." New taxpayer Zahora Saboni, a

physician, however was not too happy. She expected that someone from the tax office would assist her in filling out the form. She sought assistance, but no-one helped.

Later, Saboni completed the form

with the help of some of her peers. "Except this, everything was fine. They should have some arrangement to help new taxpayers file returns." It is still difficult for a person to

complete the tax return form alone. The tax authority should make it easier, said Mohammad Rezaur Rahman, who works for a private company, while filling out the form along with his colleague at Tax Zone 10. NBR is yet to compile data on how many tax returns have been submitted this fiscal year.

Abdur Razzaque, member of tax administration of NBR, said the total return submission would be counted on November 30.

The tax authority will take an initiative to keep the banks open to facilitate tax collection during the Tax Week next year, he added.

Private banks' bad loans swell on reckless lenders

FROM PAGE B1 The private banks' default loans may soar for several reasons, with one of them being aggressive banking, said Nurul Amin, managing direc-

tor of Meghna Bank.

"If loans are given without proper due diligence, they will turn bad. If supervision and monitoring are not done properly, the loan may turn into defaults."

But many loans may turn bad for genuine reasons too, he said, while expressing hope that the figures will improve in December.

To curtail default loans, continuous monitoring has to be ensured, according to Amin.

"We understand that the bandwidth is only one of the components of the total cost but it is a pricey one and there should be some impact at the end user level when we reduce it. But the telecom companies seem to disagree, so we decided to do a cost modelling for that."


The government reduced the internet bandwidth price to as low as Tk 625 a megabyte last year, which was Tk 72,000 eight years back.

In its cost modelling for the voice segment, the BTRC has fixed Tk 2 per minute as the upper limit and Tk 0.25 as the lower limit. For SMS, the BTRC has set the ceiling of Tk 0.50. Operators can play between the prices. Mahmood said since they have a cost modelling method for voice segment, they can change some of the benchmarks and amend the charges from time

to time as per demand.
