Malaysia may hire thru' 10 agents

Concern over monopoly, higher migration cost; hiring to begin in a couple of months

Transparency in labour recruitment from Bangladesh for Malaysia still remains a major concern though the Southeast Asian nation is going to begin the hiring in a month or two.

The two countries are at the final stage of completing a recruitment process, G2G Plus, said Expatriates' Welfare Minister Nurul Islam after a meeting with Malaysian Human Resources Minister Datuk Seri Richard Riot on November 17.

G2G Plus was undertaken by Malaysia and Bangladesh after the previous state-level labour hiring arrangement, G2G, signed in late 2012, appeared less effective. Nurul Islam, however, did not elaborate the exact mode of operation of

G2G Plus, but emphasised that labour migration cost would not be more than Tk 40,000. Business insiders alleged a Malaysian private IT company, which will manage the overall recruitment process online, has selected a cartel of 10

recruiting agents of Bangladesh to manage the entire process in exchange for huge money. A recruiting agent told The Daily Star he wanted to work under the G2G

Plus and contacted an official of the expatriates' welfare ministry but was advised to contact the 10 agents.

"If the cartel remains, it will fully monopolise the job market. The migration cost will surely be high and it will lead to labour abuses," said the SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

Dhaka, Budapest to boost ties

Hasina meets Hungarian PM, 3 MOUs signed

UNB, Budapest, Hungary

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said Dhaka and Budapest agreed to work together for the common prosperity alongside joining hands with the international community to fight against terrorism and violent extremism.

"We've reached an understanding that there is much scope for Bangladesh and Hungary to deepen bilateral cooperation in trade and investment," she said in a statement during her joint outreach with Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban.

Terming Hungary, which supported the Liberation War, a trusted friend of Bangladesh, Hasina said: "As friendly countries, we can work together and distance between the two countries can't be a barrier. We can shorten this distance as our hearts are close."

She thanked her Hungarian counterpart for his commitment to help Bangladesh. She said high-powered business delegations from both the countries will exchange views and have the chance to look deeper into the trade and investment opportunities available in the two countries.

PLANE CRASH IN COLOMBIA

Brazilian footballers among 75 dead

Six people, including four players, survived; electrical failures blamed for the disaster

A charter plane carrying a Brazilian football team crashed in the mountains in Colombia late Monday, killing as many as 75 people, officials said. But they said six survived, including four players. Brazil's President Michel Temer declared

three days of mourning for the victims.

The LAMIA airlines charter declared an emergency at around 10:00 pm local time, reporting it had suffered "electrical failures," and crashed a short time later near the city of Medellin, officials said.

The plane was carrying members of Chapecoense Real, a Brazilian football club that had risen from obscurity to play in the Copa Sudamericana finals today against Atletico Nacional of Colombia.

"The pain is terrible. Just as we had made it, I will not say to the top, but to have national prominence, a tragedy like this happens. It is very difficult, a very great tragedy," club vicepresident Ivan Tozzo told Globo SportTV.

In all, there were 72 passengers and nine crew on board the British Aerospace 146.

\$81M CYBERHEIST

Philippine bank now blames it on BB

Philippine lender RCBC and a Bangladeshi minister yesterday traded blame over liability for tens of millions of dollars that were looted from a New York bank and then went missing in Manila after one of the biggest bank frauds ever.

Unknown cyber criminals tried to steal nearly \$1 billion from Bangladesh Bank in February and managed to make off with \$81 million via an account at the New York Federal Reserve. That was transferred to four accounts with bogus names at one RCBC branch in Manila before vanishing.

The lawyer for RCBC, or Rizal Commercial Banking Corp (RCBC), said that her client had no reason to compensate Bangladesh Bank, saying that the lender was "negligent" because the initial security breach was its own fault. Bangladesh's Law Minister Anisul Huq


