Pandit Hariprasad Chaurasia was euphoric in his recital of another morning Raga Jait on teentaal. Rounds of joyous applause swayed the audience as Pandit Chaurasia styled the pukar of Kirttan. He evoked the mythical nuance of Radha-Krishna in the blissful ambiance of Brindaban.

Pandit Shubhankar Banerjee on tabla and Pandit Bhawani Shankar on pakhawaj produced torrents of beats with beautiful tehai while accompanying the maestro. In the Kirttan part, the marvel of tehai mingled with magical beats of dadra and Kaharba. The maestro's disciples -- Debopriya Chatterjee and Vivek Sonar were masterful in their support within the performance.

Pandit Shiv Kumar Sharma, one of the most influential artistes of Indian Classical Music of the 20th century, performed on the concluding night's musical proceedings.


One of the biggest ambassadors of classical music festivals, conferences and concerts worldwide, the forerunner of the classical santoor began his recital with the Raga "Jog". His vilambit composition was set on Rupaktaal (seven beats) and drut composition was on Teentaal (16 beats). Tabla artiste Pandit Yogesh Samsi accompanied the evocative recital producing sweet melodies and rhythms. The maestro later performed a Pahadi dhun that swayed the audience bliss-

The fourth night of Bengal Classical Music Fest '16 saw Pandit Ajoy Chakraborty on stage. During his interaction with the audience the musical maestro said, "We are from this land, and today two of my paternal uncles and my aunt are here at the festival for the first time. After so many years, we will finally be able to visit our ancestral home in Mymensingh." On that night his uncles, Dinendra Kumar Goswami, Surajit Kumar Chakraborty and

his aunt Minati Mukherjee sat through the enthralling performance of their nephew, after which he descended from the stage to

pay his respects to them. On April 1948, after the Partition of India, the Chakraborty family made their way to Kolkata from Mymensingh, where they remained. "When I close my eyes," said Surajit, "I can still envision our family home as clearly as if I am right there."

"I am simply spellbound by the performances tonight," said Dinendra, "I am 85 years old, and my brother is 78, and with

from home our ailments we are not able to travel as much as we would like. When I was healthier, I would visit my ancestral home every year. But now, thanks to my nephew Ajoy, I am visiting after 10 years." The maestro's aunt however, described this as her first visit: "This is my first time here, although I was born in Mymensingh, and I am looking forward to finally revisiting my roots." Surajit Kumar Chakraborty expressed his love for Bangladesh saying, "Bangladesh is still my country, despite the division it went

through during the Partition."



17TH ASIAN ART BIENNALE 2016

Press meet at Shilpakala Academy

Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy (BSA) is to organise the month long 17th Asian Art Biennale 2016 at National Art Gallery of BSA. Finance minister AMA Muhit will inaugurate the biennale as chief guest at the National Theatre Hall auditorium of BSA at 11am on December 1.

Apart from artists of Asia and Asia-Pacific countries, painters, sculptors, photographers and artists from other artistic branches from 54 countries are taking part in the art fiesta. One hundred and fifty four artworks by 148 Bangladeshi artists have been selected for display. Besides, 53 artworks by 54 notable artists of Bangladesh will be on display at the grand art show. For the first time, the organisers have declared an open call for online artworks submission worldwide. Asian Art Biennale is the pioneering art biennale of Asia and one of the forerunning art biennales of the world. Two hundred and sixty artworks by 150 artists from 53 other countries will be on display at the biennale.

Besides, 145 foreign artists, art

critics and museum curators will attend the grand art event. Apart from the month long exhibition, a seminar on the title "Art and the City," performance art show, international art camp and cultural programmes will be held simultaneously.

A press conference was held at BSA where Cultural Affairs Minister Asaduzzaman Noor, Cultural Affairs Secretary Begum Akhrtari Momtaz, director general of BSA Liaquat Ali Lucky and director of the Department of Fine Arts, BSA Md. Muniruzzaman elaborated on various aspects of the biennale, on Sunday.

Like previous years, the organisers will confer nine awards including three grand and six honourable mention-awards worth Taka eight lakhs. A five-member international jury board from five countries --Bangladesh, Poland, South Korea, Indonesia and Japan—have selected the best works for awards.

The month long (December 1-31) biennale will exclusive showcase the time-honoured artistic and cultural heritage of Bangladesh and the exhibition is open from 11am to 8pm daily.
